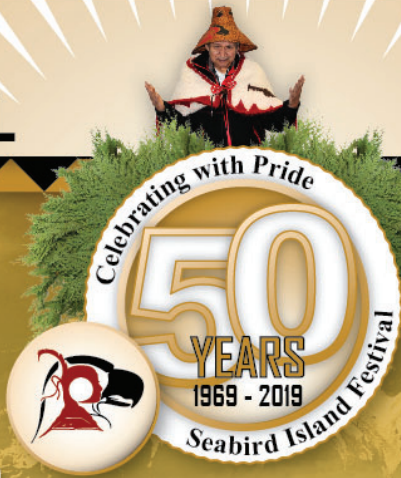

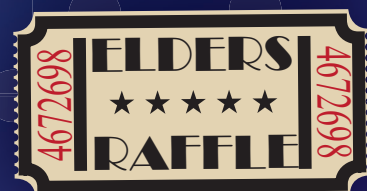

Federal Indian Day School Class Action



Seabird Day School (White/Old School)

Did you attend Seabird Day School September 1923 – June 1968? This settlement includes many schools across Canada, one of which is the Seabird Day School.

This class action is separate from the Indian Residential School Settlement Agreement. Even if you received a Residential School Settlement, those who also attended a Federal Indian Day School are eligible to apply again.

“Compensation ranges from \$10,000 for harms associated with attending a Federal Indian Day School to \$200,000 for repeated sexual abuse and/or physical assault leading to long-term injury. Eligible Class Members will receive a payment reflecting the most severe harms they suffered while attending an Indian Day School, irrespective of the number of schools attended.”

This legal action is regarding the forced attendance of Aboriginal Students at Indian Day Schools across Canada. It is requesting compensation for damage and abuse the students suffered in these schools and as a result of attending these schools. There are a variety of stories listed on their website that describe emotional, physical and/or sexual abuse.

This class action recognizes that harm was experienced not only by the students, but has also been felt by families and communities for years

following. As such this class action also includes a \$200M Legacy Fund to support commemoration projects, health and wellness programs, as well as language and culture initiatives for Indigenous communities.

- If this settlement gets approved in May, you can still apply, forms will be available at that time.
- To check and see if your school is included: <http://indiandayschools.com/en/wp-content/uploads/Schedule-K-List-of-Day-Schools-002.pdf>
- Passed Family Members: If a person has passed away between July 31, 2007 and today, the estate of that person can still make a claim on that person's behalf. Family members are not eligible to receive direct compensation, but the estates can make claims for the family.
- This settlement includes everyone who attended a Federal Indian Day School, but is not limited to, First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples. Everyone who attended a Federal Indian Day School!

Statements of support for this class action are due to Gowling WLG by May 3, 2019. Those who object to this class action are also free to submit objection forms by this date. You can object and still claim compensation if the settlement is approved. The court

date is scheduled for May 13-15 and a decision will be announced following these proceedings.

Students of these schools may attend the hearing starting May 13th at the Federal Court, 363 Broadway, Winnipeg, MB R3C 3N9.

You may contact Gowling WLG if you have further questions, this assistance is free to you.

“Gowling WLG is a national law firm working on behalf of First Nations and Aboriginal Organizations across Canada. They are planning a series of events at a variety of communities to answer any questions you may have about the proposed settlement process. They invite you to attend or schedule a presentation in your area. If you are interested in hosting a presentation in your community, please contact: Vanessa Lessard at vanessa.lessard@gowlingwlg.com.

Note: Registering for the presentation is not the same as making a claim for compensation. If the proposed settlement is approved, you will need to complete an additional form to apply for compensation.”

Youth trailer revitalization

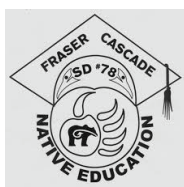
The Youth trailer is undergoing some improvements. We want the trailer to be a welcoming place for the Youth, and one

This request is seeking an Artist/Artist Team for a carved PODIUM for Fraser-Cascade School District #78

1. Introduction

The Aboriginal Education Council consists of the following Bands/First Nations: Boothroyd, Boston Bar, Chawathil, Cheam, Peters, Seabird Island, Shxw'owhámél, Spuzzum, Sq'ewá:lxw, Sq'ewlets, Sts'ailes, Union Bar, Yale, Métis and Off-Reserve.

The Fraser-Cascade School District #78 consist of the following schools: Agassiz Centre for Education, Agassiz Elementary Secondary, Boston Bar Elementary Secondary, Coquilhalla Elementary, Harrision Hot Springs Elementary, Hope Secondary, Kent Elementary, Silver Creek Elementary and Two Rivers Education Centre.

During the fall of 2018, the Aboriginal Education Council supported that we get our own podium, as in the past we always borrowed Yale First Nations' podium.

There are a total of 1760 students in School District #78 Fraser Cascade and 624 Aboriginal Students.

Two Community wellbeing grant opportunities

These grant opportunities have been available since January and there is still time to apply. Both grant opportunities are open until April 30th. Katelyn Moon, Child and Youth Initiatives Supervisor for Seabird Island, is taking the lead on these grants.

The purpose of the grants is to promote community wellbeing. These are child welfare prevention dollars that we have received. We are trying to spread them out throughout the Community to support and strengthen our Youth and families. Our aim is to bolster connections between family members and between Community Members. We are stronger together.

These grants do not provide cash up front. Rather, receipts are reimbursed. Talk to Katelyn if this presents a barrier for you.

Two Grants: Family Well-being Grant & Youth Mentorship Grant

Family Well-being Grant: up to \$1000 per family.

These grants provide opportunities to build skills and connections as a family. Families can take a course, plan an outing, share a meal. This grant can also be applied to purchasing outdoor play equipment to provide the family with continual outdoor play time. Technology based applications will not be approved.

Youth Mentorship Grant: These grants provide opportunities for Youth

to learn from Community Members and for Community Members to share their gifts with Youth. Community Members can have specific Youth in mind, to mentor, or they can choose to have the Youth program help them create opportunities to share their gifts with Youth.

For example:

- Teach your younger sibling to fix a car – the grant could cover supplies and equipment including coverall, car parts, gloves and a lunch.
- Teach the Youth to fish – the grant can cover fishing gear, gas to get Youth to fishing site, lunch for the group.

Please note: capital equipment purchased for group mentorship activities, will belong to Seabird Island Youth program.

The steps for applying for and receiving these grants include:

1. Apply in writing. Grant applications are available through Katelyn Moon and at the Band Office Reception.
2. Submit to Katelyn.
3. Get approval: A committee reviews the grants and makes a decision.
4. Collect and submit your receipts for reimbursement.

Katelyn is available to support and answer questions for anyone who is interested in applying.

The successful applicants thus far have provided really

positive feedback. Stating how it has help families connect in a fun and playful manner that they haven't had available for a while.

Apply today with your ideas for you to support and promote opportunities for connections.

Both **grants** are open until April 30th.

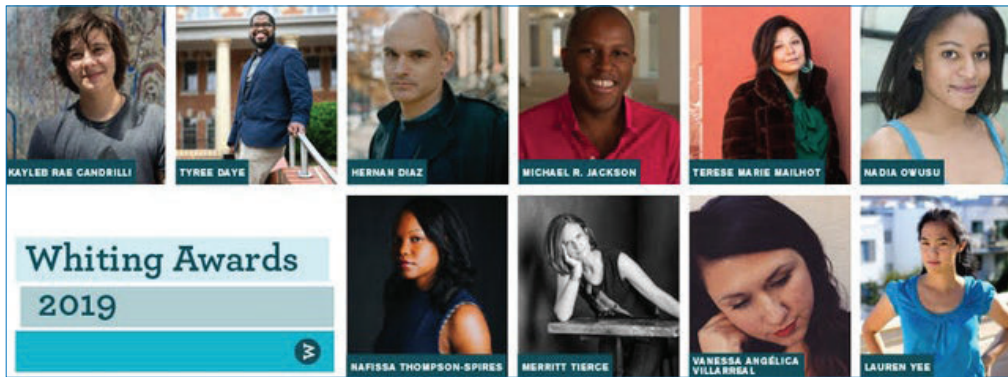

Announcing the 2019 Whiting Award Winners

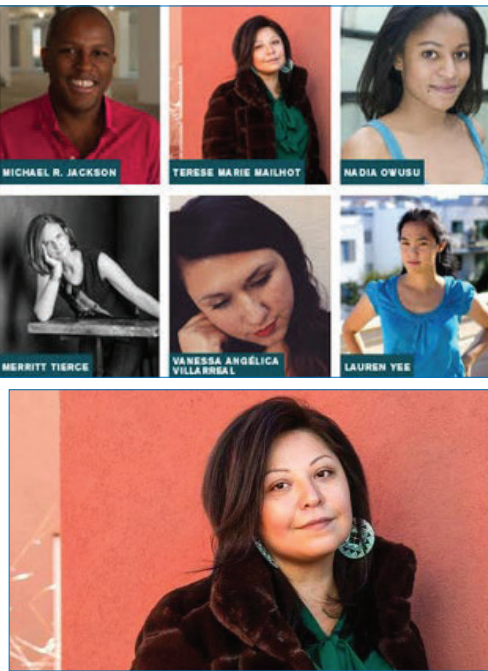


On the 34th anniversary of the Whiting Awards, the Whiting Foundation gives \$50,000 each to ten diverse emerging writers of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and drama; keynote by Adam Johnson

The Whiting Foundation (whiting.org) is pleased to announce the names of its ten new Whiting Award winners, honored on March 20, 2019, at a ceremony at the New-York Historical Society with a keynote by Pulitzer Prize, National Book Award, and Whiting Award winner Adam Johnson.

The 2019 Whiting Award winners included:

- nonfiction writers Terese Marie Mailhot, author of *Heart Berries: A Memoir*, who “writes with a fierce and unyielding commitment to creating an unlikeable—which is to say, fully human—female narrator,” mobilizing her “intelligence, clarity, honesty, and complexity”; and Nadia Owusu (*Aftershocks*), whose “profound meditation on rootlessness, hybridity, and resilience” is constituted of “beautifully restless prose, always in search of music and meaning.”



Terese Marie Mailhot

Graduated from the Institute of American Indian Arts with an M.F.A. in fiction. Mailhot’s work has appeared in *The Rumpus*, the *Los Angeles Times*, *Carve Magazine*, and elsewhere. The recipient of several fellowships - SWAIA Discovery Fellowship, Vermont Studio Center Fellowship, Writing by Writers Fellowship, and the Elk Writer’s Workshop Fellowship - she was recently named the Tecumseh Postdoctoral Fellow at Purdue University and resides in West Lafayette, Indiana. *Heart Berries* (Counterpoint, 2018), her first book, was a *New York Times* bestseller. The Whiting Awards, established by the Whiting Foundation in 1985, remain one of the most esteemed and largest monetary gifts (\$50,000) to emerging writers, and are based on the criteria of early-career achievement and the promise of superior literary work to come. Eight million has been awarded to 340 fiction and nonfiction writers, poets, and playwrights to date.

“Every year, our corps of expert anonymous nominators point us to some of the most exciting and vital work happening today,” said Courtney Hodell, Director of Literary Programs. “These names may be new to us, but they’re writing the future of literature in this country.”

With the Whiting Awards, the Whiting Foundation hopes to identify exceptional new writers who have yet to make their mark in the literary culture. Though the writers may not necessarily be young (talent may emerge at any age), the grant ideally offers recipients a first opportunity to devote themselves fully to writing, and the recognition has a significant impact. Whiting winners have gone on to win numerous prestigious awards and fellowships, including the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award, the National Book Critics Circle Award, the Obie Award, and MacArthur, Guggenheim, and Lannan fellowships, and their work has shaped and advanced literature in this country over the past three decades.

No submissions are accepted; the one hundred nominators who suggest the candidates and the judges who select the winners are all invited by the Foundation, and all work anonymously. The pool of nominators changes annually, and has included writers, professors, editors, agents, critics, booksellers, artistic directors of theaters, dramaturgs, and directors of literary festivals. Winners are chosen by a small group of recognized writers, literary scholars, and editors who meet four times during the course of a year to debate the work and select the final ten.

In addition to the Whiting Awards for emerging writers, the Foundation’s programs in support of literature include the Creative Nonfiction Grant for the completion of deeply researched, imaginatively written works in progress, and the new Literary Magazine Prize, which celebrates the determined and devoted publications that nurture new

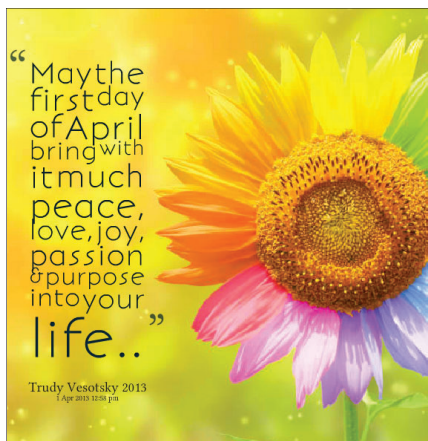

Hill Parking

There are 4 things that will help you determine which way you should turn your wheels when parking on a hill.

- Up hill with a curb
- Up hill without a curb
- Down hill with a curb
- Down hill without a curb

While you are on your road test the examiner might ask you to pull over to the side of the road or street and park

as if you were parking on a hill. The examiner will let you know if it will be an up hill or down hill question.

Remember that up hill with a curb you turn your wheels to the left, up hill without a curb your wheels are to the right, down hill with a curb they turn to the right and down hill without a curb they are turned to the right.

An easy way to remember is “Up HILL with a curb turn to the LEFT, and everything else is to the Right”

The reason you need to do this is because if for some reason your vehicle slips out of park or your emergency brakes give out. Your vehicle will not roll towards the middle of the road or street if you are parked on a hill.

Youth Worker

The Youth Worker will be directly responsible for engaging Band youths (age 12–19) in a variety of activities that will supplement their growth and development. Activities will include local and distant activities that are both large and small scale. The Youth Worker will also connect their clients with needed programs and services such as driver's education, health services, mentor-ship, and social supports.

The Youth Worker will be expected to develop strong and healthy relationships with Youth that will include in-depth discussions/workshops and support related to Youth issues such as suicide, sexual education, gender, mental health, drugs and alcohol, and developing healthy relationships. Some large scale projects will include the creation and continuation of a Youth oriented newsletter, Youth council and conference, and Youth fundraising initiatives. The incumbent must be able to engage and encourage Youth while maintaining an appropriate relationship with all of the youths. This position will require a flexible schedule to meet the needs of the Band Youths. Given the schedule of the client base (school) most shifts will be evenings and weekends.

As part of the Health Team, you may be expected to work up to 12 hours per day, not exceeding 80 hours per pay period at straight time.

High School Social Studies Teacher

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School/High School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures.

Social Studies Teachers must prepare lessons and activities that help students develop knowledge and understanding in concepts of government, geography, history, economics, civic ideals, and current events. Social Studies Teacher will also instruct students on Canadian ideals and cultural heritage; developing proficiency in the use of social studies inquiry skill and concepts; motivate each student to understand and exercise his/her rights, privileges, and responsibilities as a citizen; develop understanding of the geographical, historical, cultural, and political factors which influence the development of the world regions.

College Registrar

Reporting to the Seabird College Senior Administration, the Registrar is responsible for the orderly registration, enrollment, reporting processes and administration of Seabird College and Adult education programs. This is a fast paced, demanding position which has peak times which will focus on student enquiries and registration, nominal roll, securing funding and administrative functions. During slower periods the Registrar will shift his/her focus to maintaining files, program planning activities and preparing for the coming registration period.

Halq'emëylem teacher

Halq'emëylem Teacher will teach Halq'emëylem language courses to students from K-12. The successful candidate may also be expected to teach elective courses of their choice. The School has a strong emphasis of incorporating the traditional Halq'emëylem Language and Stó:ló Culture into the curriculum while meeting the academic needs of First Nation students.

Aboriginal Infant Development Program Consultant

The Aboriginal Infant Development Program (AIDP) Consultant will work in a home visiting program with Aboriginal children and families applying principles of family-centered practice. The AIDP Consultant will set individual program plans and activities for children from birth to the age of 3, and their families. The AIDP Consultant works with related agencies and professionals, and works independently to maintain client caseload and group facilitation as required.

Early Childhood Education Supervisor

The Early Childhood Education & Care Centre Supervisor assumes responsibility for the day to day operation of a fully licensed Child Care Centre for infants, toddlers and preschool age children. This includes providing a safe, welcoming, culturally rich and educational early childhood programs for the children and their families.

At Seabird, we are proud of our rich culture that has been passed on to us from our elders and previous generations. We promote/organize many activities that help create awareness, understanding and respect of our culture. Learning to speak in the Halq'emëylem language is one of many cultural activities that happens at the Child Care Center. This is something that all staff are required to participate in, respect and appreciate fully.

Speech & Language Pathologist

The Speech-Language Pathologist provides a range of clinical services that focus on promoting communication, language and speech and that contribute to a client/patient's overall cognitive, physical, social and emotional well-being. The speech and language pathologist works closely with babies, children who have various levels of speech, language and communication problems. The successful candidate will provide assessments to children (0-6 years old) referred to the Ey Qwal Speech and Language Program.

On Call Education Assistant

Under the supervision of school administration the Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of children more rewarding. EAs will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, recording and data collection. The Seabird Island Community School Education Assistants are valued members of the school community and they make a significant contribution to the work of the school and toward the education of all students.

Pre-Employment Support Program (PESP) - Administrative Assistant

The Seabird Island Band Employment Centre is providing an opportunity for a Pre-employment Supports Program (PESP) Administrative Assistant. Responsibilities will include booking appointments for clients, file management, organizing and other PESP clerical and program duties. This position will also require the successful applicant to be able to provide exceptional client and customer service; courteous, friendly, and professional assistance to PESP clients from a broad demographic. Work term is until March 2020.

School Bus Driver - On Call

The School Bus Driver is responsible for the safe transportation of students on the assigned route to and from school. This is an on-call position until June 28, 2019.

Custodian - On Call

The Custodian is responsible for performing custodial duties, minor maintenance and other miscellaneous duties in order to ensure that buildings and facilities are maintained in a healthy, safe and sanitary manner.

Registered Nurse - Maternal Child

Under the direction of the Health Services Manager, the Maternal Child Registered Nurse shall provide Maternity care, leadership and expertise in accordance with Band policies and procedures. This position ensures the delivery and quality of the Maternal Child Health Program and works closely with pre and post-natal mothers, youth and families in the program. The Maternal Child Registered Nurse works closely with the Maternal Health Team Leader and may be required to take training as labour/delivery back-up to the Mid-Wife.

School Cook

The School Cook will be responsible for preparing, cooking and serving food for school breakfast/lunch programs and special events organized and participated by Seabird School as instructed by the Principal / Vice Principal in accordance with current health, safety and hygiene legislation.

Student Counselor Mentor

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill a position of Student Mentor and Counselor for K-12 students. Essentially, your responsibility is to equip students with a variety of strategies for coping with life's challenges: help students establish their personal goals, guiding and helping children make action plans, motivate and inspire children, identifying and providing resources, referrals and follow-ups and providing assistance in crisis situations.

Nutrition Assistant

The Nutritionist Assistant will assist with creating, delivering, and implementing health promotion initiatives across the band including in the community, at the school and for staff. Programs and initiatives will focus around improving the physical health of community Members through increased physical activities and making healthy food choices. This position works under the supervision of the Nutritionist to play a key role in educating people on what physical activities are best suited to their needs, as well as what healthy food choices are right for them and their family; including teaching healthy food selections and preparation. A focus for the education includes traditional teaching and education for traditional food, cooking/ preserving techniques, and healthy activities.

This position is part-time.

Human Resources Manager

The Human Resource (HR) Manager fills a key strategic role with in the Bands corporate structure. The HR Manager is responsible for the supervision and management of the HR Program including all of its staff, and the continuous review and revision of applicable policies.

The HR manager acts as a strategic partner with all programs and departments falling under the Band's umbrella. This partnership includes providing support for Band initiatives, developing and implementing policies that facilitate the setting and accomplishment of Band goals while maintaining compliance to applicable labour laws, and industry best practices, providing input and support on employee discipline and supporting Band training and development initiatives.

Dental Hygienist On-Call

The Dental Hygienist's perform basic dental care tasks, mostly focused on keeping patients' teeth and gums clean and giving instruction in proper dental hygiene. The Dental Hygienist will work under the supervision of licensed Dentist. They are not qualified to make the same kind of diagnostic decisions or perform the same procedures as Dentists. Unlike dental assistants, who work directly with dentists, hygienists often see patients on their own and direct their own tasks.

The goal of a Dental Hygienist is to provide the following services as a way to support and promote optimum oral health:

- Education
- Assessment
- Research
- Administrative
- Diagnostic
- Preventive
- Therapeutic

Family Counsellor

The Family Counsellor is responsible for providing counselling and support to families, youth, and/or children regarding mental health concerns and family issues. Counselling is provided in a culturally safe manner on a one-to-one basis, with families, in groups, in circles, in Seabird's Recovery homes and/or as couple's counselling. The Family Counsellor makes referrals for clients to other services including treatment and recovery centers as required. Seabird Health's family counsellors provide services to a variety of Bands in our region, as such, this role may involve travel to other communities. In addition to counselling and support, family counsellors also provide education to communities through workshops to promote mental health and healing. These workshops may occur during the day or evening as appropriate for the community. All work done by the family counsellor is done from a trauma-informed perspective.

This position is for a one-year term of 28 hours per week.

Tutor

Our after-school education program seeks talented, experienced Tutors in all subject areas for students between grades 4 and 12. We help both struggling and gift students reach their full potential by supplementing the instruction they receive in class and guiding them toward study practices and aides that can help them excel. Tutors work with individual students one-on-one, though we occasionally organize group activities for students who are studying the same material. Our team offers compassionate, motivating assistance to students, and we expect our new hires to do the same. If you have experience tutoring children, please submit an application.

Custodian

The Custodian is responsible for performing custodial duties, minor maintenance and other miscellaneous duties in order to ensure that buildings and facilities are maintained in a healthy, safe and sanitary manner.

Teacher on Call (TOC)

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill various positions for On Call Teachers. As a TOC, you will work in the absence of a regular teacher to aid students in understanding a subject matter, as well as to provide skills required for programmed lessons and purposeful training for the assigned classroom.

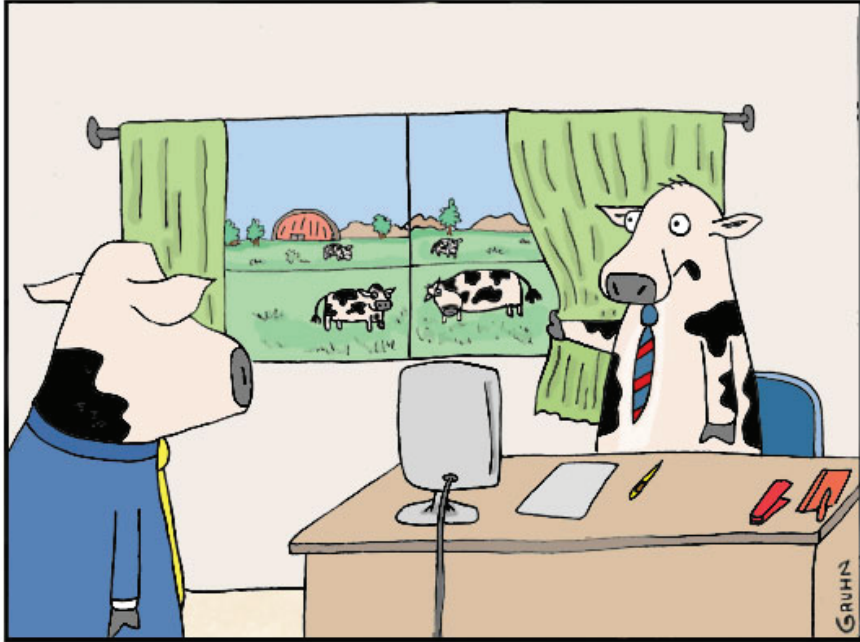

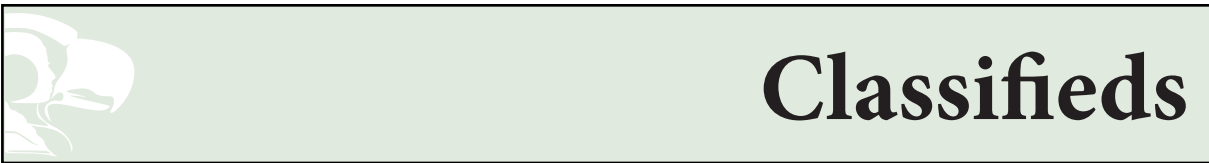
