

Government of Canada Supports Indigenous Youth in BC Through a New Program to Reduce Violence

On March 8th at the Seabird Gym, there was a ceremony to celebrate funding for Youth initiatives. The Minister of Public Safety joined us to announce a 5-year program funding, to be a partner, and to provide funding of 3.1 million dollars over these 5 years. This is consistent with the approach and the values of reconciliation.

Inspiring words from Councilor Alexis Grace included, "I am reminded and filled with thoughts of our origin stories, these origin stories are our very first accounts of what life was and what it is, and I am also filled with thoughts of our transformer stories. Knowing what we have just been through, a global pandemic. In our lifetime, we have lived this before and we have persevered. Our transformer stories tell us that a transformer comes along when the world is not quite right, when people are not behaving as they should or as they could. These transformers come along to try and remind us of how we need to behave and how we need to walk in life. I am hopeful, as a leader of this community that this is our transformer story. That we can emerge, that we can come out of this shadow that we have been in, this fear, this

anxiety, not just in this pandemic. That speaks to this funding and this specific program that has been developed, our overarching education and judicial system our pandemic of systemic racism that our people have endured, our history and our stories. Hoping as leaders in meaningful partnership with federal and provincial partners, that we can look at that this is our transformer. That the Youth are on the right path and empowered to make their own path. That when we look at these calls to action, that we look at how are we empowering our people, to honour the stories and histories of where we have been. This is an opportunity for our Youth to connect and to blaze their own trails and their own path, to have self determination to shift change and perception. This is an opportunity to see a brighter future and to shift the landscape and the story that we have been bound by." She looks forward to this partnership and to the future as well as what transformative change this could be.

This program will work to see positive outcomes, to prevent young people from going on the wrong path and to work towards public safety, for Youth to charter their own path. The goal is to reduce trauma and to strengthen our people.

This program is the first of its kind to try to instill greater public safety, to support and collaborate with the community. There are possibilities of future funding of this type again in the future. The province recognizes that this work needs to be done in the spirit of reconciliation. The benefit is to empower the community to drive forward with the tailored programs that leverage the talents and skills of the Youth.

Announcement of Youth funding for 3.1 million dollars over 5 years.

Press Release:

Helping Indigenous Youth in Canada make positive choices and build their skills will help them live lives free from violence. That is why the Government of Canada is investing in crime prevention projects tailored to the needs of youth, through the National Crime Prevention Strategy (NCPS).

The Minister of Public Safety, the Honourable Marco Mendicino, today announced new federal support to help Indigenous Youth in Canada develop necessary skills to avoid violence, gang involvement, bullying and cyberbullying. With \$3.1 million in federal funding, the

Seabird Island Outdoor After School Indigenous Youth Development Program -"Contented Spirit – Sthalethi seywelh" will help increase awareness and reduce involvement in at-risk activities and violent crime among youth.

The project will help Indigenous youth and their families in Seabird Island and three neighbouring First Nations communities develop skills that are culturally sensitive and consider the Indigenous reality. Seabird Island Band will provide participants with access to culturally adapted recreation and educational activities, as well as case-managed social supports and counseling services. With these direct community interventions, the project aims to reduce overall incidents of violence, bullying and encourage positive social interactions.

The project will help Indigenous youth and their families in Seabird Island and three neighbouring First Nations communities.

- The NCPS supports the implementation and evaluation of local, targeted crime prevention initiatives with the objective of developing and sharing knowledge of what works to prevent and reduce crime among priority populations.
- The National Crime Prevention Strategy (NCPS)'s Crime Prevention Action Fund (CPAF) supports initiatives that address known risk and protective factors associated with crime and respond to priority crime issues.
- The last CPAF Call for Applications closed in October 2021. The call received 266 applications.
- · In fiscal year 2022-23, approximately \$12 million in funding will become available through the CPAF.






Teach Our Elders How to Use Technology

The AIDP System navigator will provide information, advice, support, mentoring, cultural perspectives, and coordination of services to families during the process of obtaining a diagnosis. This position is to advocate for families who require cultural, and community supports while navigating the complex health care system and build family capacity and advocate for the individual family needs.

Education

Driver - College

The College Driver is responsible for the safe transportation of students on the assigned route to and from school.

Education Assistant - College Tutoring

In collaboration with 2 teachers and a youth staff, the Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance student engagement and inspiration for learning. The successful Education Assistant will contribute to a safe, nurturing and dynamic after school tutoring program.

Education Assistant - on call

The Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding. EA's will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, record keeping and data collection.

Education Manager

Provide post-secondary and education leadership and management expertise, in accordance with Seabird Island Community School and Band policies. Specifically, the EM shall be responsible to the school principal for the efficient, effective and productive operation of the education programs of Seabird Island Band, with an emphasis on post-secondary and specifically Seabird College programs and bridging.

The EM will be responsible for post-secondary programs and options, in partnership with other post-secondary institutions and according to grant funding success.

The EM will assist in education advocacy, compliance and reporting to the community, governing and funding bodies. The EM will play an integral role in planning, coordination and assistance in the delivery of post-secondary / continuing education / summer education programs: in the implementation and evaluation of changes and new initiatives in the education programs (Education Jurisdiction for example); and ensuring details for successful implementation have been considered, addressed and delivered. This position is expected to manage and oversee a variety of ongoing, annual and one-time projects and activities within the education portfolio at Seabird Island Band.

Executive Assistant to Principal

Under the direction of the Community School Principal, the Executive Assistant shall provide administrative and executive secretarial duties within the SIB Community School. This position assists with all matters of an immediate, administrative and task oriented nature.

Information Technology (IT) Teacher

Information Technology or IT Teachers must prepare lessons and activities that help students develop knowledge and understanding in concepts of computing, software use, troubleshooting, etc. The IT Teacher's daily tasks will depend mostly on the age and ability level of the students. Younger classrooms will focus on keyboarding and understanding basic word processing and other typical office programs, as well as Internet basics. With older students, more advanced classes in software use, data processing, hardware, and even web design.

Special Education Teacher

Under the supervision of school administration, the Special Education Teacher will work with Students who have a wide range of learning, mental, emotional, physical and learning disabilities. Special Ed. Assistant's adapt general education lessons and teach various subjects, such as reading, writing, and math, to students with mild and moderate disabilities. They also teach basic skills, such as literacy and communication techniques, to students with severe disabilities.

NOTE: As we are both a Federal Government Office and a Health Office, COVID vaccinations are required by all staff and masks are still required in the buildings.

Student Mentor/ Counsellor

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill a position of Student Mentor and Counsellor for K-12 students. Essentially, your responsibility is to equip students with a variety of strategies for coping with life's challenges: help students establish their personal goals, guiding and helping children make action plans, motivate and inspire children, identifying and providing resources, referrals and follow-ups and providing assistance in crisis situations.

Teacher on Call

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures. Individual contracts will govern the specific teaching assignment and number of hours. The Salary is inclusive of all teaching duties as detailed below.

Intergovernmental Affairs

Executive Assistant to Director of Inter-Government Affairs

Under the direction of the Inter-Government Affairs Director, the Executive Assistant shall provide administrative and executive secretarial duties in support of the Government Affairs/Lands Department. This position assists with all matters of an immediate, administrative and task-oriented nature.

Finance & Admin

Financial Analyst

The Finance Analyst is part of the Finance and Administration Team and is primarily responsible for analyzing and interpreting the Financial and statistical data of Seabird Island Band. The position must maintain confidentiality of all records.

Coordinates the flow of information from Contracts and Agreements to the various departments within Seabird Island Band. This includes reporting on a timely basis adhering to company policies and procedures as well as contractual requirements and ensuring all deadlines are met within the established time frames.

Health & Social Development

Child Protection Program Coordinator

The Child Protection Program
Coordinator will operate in
accordance with philosophies,
polices, and objectives established by
Seabird Island Health Department.
The primary goal is to coordinate
the work being done within the
Child Protection Team, including
developing and delivering programs
related to child protection prevention
and implementation, administrating
programs, client paperwork, tracking
client activities and working with the
team as directed.

Child Protection Program Supervisor

The Child Protection Program Supervisor will be responsible for mentoring and monitoring staff who are developing and delivering Seabird's Child Protection programs. The supervisor also is responsible for engaging and advocating for Seabird Island Community Members. This role includes establishing relationships with outside agencies to ensure success of the program objectives. The Child Protection Program Supervisor will be expected to develop strong and healthy relationships with staff, clients and their families

Diabetes Nurse

Under the direction and supervision of the Health Manager/Director, the RN shall provide care, leadership, and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically, the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions within the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

Employment and Social Development Manager (ESDM

Under the direction of the Health and Social Development Director, the Employment and Social Development Manager (ESDM) will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management. Programs (with their sub-programs) under the care and supervision of the ESDM

Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give Community Members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

Recovery Home Support Worker

The role of the Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

RN - Maternal Child Health - term until March 28, 2023

Under the direction and supervision of the Health Director, the RN shall provide care, leadership and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions with in the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

Youth Worker

The Youth Worker develops strong and healthy relationships with youth. They have emotional intelligence and are able to respond to the diverse needs of youth; are trauma informed; work efficiently and are able to prioritize competing pressures; have the ability to honour the youth's voice and take their lead in program delivery. The youth worker is able to engage and encourage youth while maintaining an appropriate relationship with all of the youths.

This position requires a flexible schedule to meet the needs of the Band youth. Given the schedule of the client base (school), most shifts will be evenings and weekends.
