#### When you are home:

Keeping your home cool can be tricky at times, here are a few hacks I have used over the years when I lived in Bonaparte.

- Open all the windows and doors first thing in the morning, clear out the warm air. Best to do it before you head out for your day. (Don't do this if you don't have screen on your windows/doors).
- Find the coolest spot in your house and place a fan in that area blowing towards the room you would like to cool down.

• Keep all your curtains closed like a dark cave, so heat is not radiating into your home, I know the natural light would be nice, but that is what also heats up the home.

#### **Cooling down your body:**

- Stay hydrated
- Eat light meals, lean towards more fruit and veggies
- Wear light loose fitting clothing
- Keep your head and feet cool
- Place a cold compress at the back of your head just above the neck
- Take a cool shower or run put hand under cold water
- Damp cloth to wipe your face, arms and legs, and having a fan blowing on you
- When outside, cool your feet, step on some ice cubes to get your feet cool

They had the graduates stand in front of their tables and families dressed them, then they were called forward. The grads were led by family members and placed on cedar that was laid down for them, in a straight line. The honouring of the grads had started.

The school then had Blackhawk singers perform a few songs and dances for the grads. After their performance, two of the graduates received names.

The two students who had receive names are Nora Douglas and Adam Birch-Douglas. Nora received the name Qlo'wax:ilet, the name was granted from her mother Diane Silver and grandmother Barbra Silver from Sumas. The name comes from Kilgard. It was Diane's mothers' grandmothers' name, the mother carries the name, and they are sharing it with Nora. Adam received the name Shxwlismaytexw, it was a name created for him, and the name is from Seabird. The name means 'A man who takes care of and defends his people'.

After the naming, they proceeded with the graduation where Josh Webb elected as valedictorian, had great words to share, "I'd like to thank everyone here today and Miss White, and everyone also allowed. Of all of us up here today, to be up here and to be graduating and I'm the valedictorian, I was chosen because my fellow classmates and teachers thought I should be up here." He continued, "I'm proud that I can say I'm native and could even speak the language. I've been at Seabird Island Community School since I was in grade four when I can say that I met some teachers who still try to bug me today. In those nine years, I've really had time to feel like I was actually part of the school as a family, not just so someone who's going here." He continued "So, my takeaway from all this... Is that perseverance, loving and kindness, can get even me, stomping my feet in math class to listen and trust all the teachers here, who care for us so much and I'd really love to thank all the teachers who have got me here, to standing here today." He thanked his family, "to my mom who's taught me to be proud of who I am and persevere of your three even in the hardest times and to be proud of my native heritage and always being there for me, through thick and thin. This has also taught me how important it is to express yourself. So the others can understand and help you get through times that you think is the hardest." He finished off with "And even though I'll be leaving the school, the memories and the things I learned never will be gone. If I could make a list of how much all the teachers, staff and students care about each other, the list would go on and on, to everyone who would yell speech out of word ceremonies in grade seven. I'm doing it right now and if I can do it. So can you and if I can graduate so can anyone else."

At the end of the graduation, the photographer on site, Danica Charles, gladly took family photos for each grad student. Many families where happy to get family photos done with the celebrated graduates.

I come from Christopher Lake, Saskatchewan. I have 6 children, 8 grandchildren and one great grandchild. I come from a large family but both of my parents are deceased.

I am a Cree woman and I speak my language fluently. I have a firm belief that the Indigenous languages hold our world view, our ways of knowing and are in danger of being lost. My people went through the Residential School System and the Indian Day schools. Our sacred ceremonies were outlawed. As a result, many of our people were not able to speak our languages nor were cultural practices a part of our everyday reality for quite a few years.

My nuclear family comprised of my paternal grandfather, uncles and my father went into the deep woods to get away from the Residential School System. When I was taking my Master's of Education classes, I read about the Pagans who were residing in Otter Lake, Saskatchewan, so I come from a family of pagans and for that I am grateful. I entered Pelican Indian Day school speaking Cree fluently. When I asked to go to the washroom in



my language, I was punished by my teacher and was made to stand in the corner in front of the classroom, much to the enjoyment of my older brother.

I am quite honored to work for Seabird Island First Nation as the Director of Education. I plan on working hard for the Band to further education opportunities and employment for the Band membership. I look forward to meeting you.

## Leaving Dogs in Cars: Avoid Heat Exhaustion and Save Lives

It does not take long to put your pet in a harmful situation when left in a vehicle on a warm or hot day. Below are common concerns and tips to advocate for pet safety.



# How long is too long in a hot or warm car?

Owners and caretakers may believe they're doing their furry friend a favour when bringing them along on errands, but if they can't bring their pet into a store they may think a few minutes in the vehicle won't be a big deal.

For a dog, though, harmful, and even life-threatening effects can occur in a short time in a hot car. Dogs can't release heat by sweating, as humans do, so their internal body temperature rises more quickly.

Some dogs, including senior pets and those with flatter faces, experience even more challenges in hot weather. At the end of the day, it's best to simply leave your dog at home where there's more space, water and shade.

## What you should do

If you see an animal in distress in a parked vehicle, here is the steps to take:

- Note the license plate, vehicle colour, make and model and ask managers of nearby businesses to page the owner to return to their vehicle immediately. If the animal is not showing signs of distress, but you are concerned, you may wish to stay by the vehicle to monitor the situation until the owner returns.
- If the animal is showing clear signs of heatstroke or other distress symptoms, call your local animal control agency, police, RCMP or the BC SPCA Call Centre at *1-855-622-7722* as soon as possible. The BC SPCA has a limited number of constables – if one is not available in the area the Call Centre can

advise you about other emergency numbers to call so that help will arrive as quickly as possible.

## What not to do Do NOT break the window

While most people mean well when they say they would be willing to break a glass window to get an animal out of a roasting vehicle, it's strongly recommended you don't.

- Only RCMP, local police, and BC SPCA Special Constables have the authority to enter a vehicle lawfully to help a pet in distress
- Not only are you putting yourself at risk when you break a glass window, but you also risk harming the dog

### Leave the A/C on

You may have seen the sign on a vehicle saying, *"the A/C is on."* Some may think this is an option, but it is not a good one. Your pet can still end up at risk if the air conditioning stops working, it's not a guaranteed solution. It is best to simply leave your dog at home where there's more space, water and shade.

# Dealing with pet heatstroke

### Signs of heatstroke include:

- Exaggerated panting (or the sudden stopping of panting);
- Rapid or erratic pulse
- Salivation, anxious or staring expression
- Weakness and muscle tremors or lack of coordination
- Convulsions or vomiting, and collapse

## What to do if your pet is showing signs of heatstroke:

- Move your pet to a cool, shady place
- Wet the animal with cool water
- Do not apply ice as this will constrict blood flow and discourage cooling
- Fan your pet to promote evaporation. This cools the blood,



## If you need to run errands on a hot day, please leave your pet safely at home

- Allow your pet to drink some cool water (or to lick ice cream if no water is available)
- Take your pet to a veterinarian as soon as possible for further treatment

## How you can help

### Carry a kit

• Keep a kit in your car in case you spot an animal in distress

- This includes bottled water, a small bowl, a small battery-powered fan and a towel that can be soaked in water
- If a window is partially open, hydrate the animal as you wait for an emergency response

## EXERCISE YOUR PET EARLY IN THE MORNING OR LATE AT NIGHT

Exercise your pet when the temperature is at its lowest.



#### **KEEP YOUR PET HYDRATED**

Make sure pets get plenty of water hroughout the day and during walks if needed.



## WATCH OUT FOR SIGNS OF DEHYDRATION

Check for sluggishness, bloodshot eyes and the elasticity of your pet's skin.

## GIVE YOUR PET A SHAVE OR A HAIRCUT

Consider shaving long-haired pets with heavy coats.

#### **REDUCE INTAKE OF DIRECT HEAT**

Close blinds and turn off appliances when you're not home. Remember darker coats absorb more heat.



#### FIND SHADE

If you are spending time with your pets outside, make sure there is shade available.



### NEVER LEAVE A PET IN THE CAR

The temperature inside a parked car can get very hot, causing dehydration and panic.

## **Caution: High Heats = Wildfire Potential**

With August, comes the heat, wildfires and fire bans. We can all do our part to reduce the wildfires and fire bans by taking extra care outdoors. Dry grasses, bushes and trees can quickly catch fire.

Do: Roast Marshmallows - Do Not: Flick the stick of a burning Marshmallow!

## DO:

- Limit the size of your fires to within a couple feet
- Keep a water hose close by to douse the fire
- Ensure your fire is all the way out before leaving
- Check to make sure the embers are out as well
- Use the firepit away from trees and roots
- Keep debris and bushes 10 ft or more away from your home
- Keep your grass mowed

## **DO NOT:**

- Flick cigarette ashes and butts out the car windows
- Leave a fire unattended
- Have huge open fires
- Drive on flat tires (they cause sparks)
- Keep woodpiles near your home

## Safety at the BBQ



- Never store flammable materials next to the BBQ
- Before covering your BBQ make sure it is off and cool
- Never leave the BBQ unattended
- Keep children and pets away
- Keep loose clothing away
- Don't put water on a grease fire
- Don't operate the BBQ near wooden fences, trees or the home (10 feet away)
- Clean the grill after each meal to reduce wild animals' visits and grease fires. Leave the heat on and let it burn for a few minutes, then scrub the grill with a grill brush.
- Keep a fire extinguisher handy
- NEVER BBQ indoors!

## **BBQ** Tips

There is nothing like cooking outdoors. In my family this is a team effort. I do the prep work and make a salad and Jim does the cooking on the BBQ. While the rest of the family cleans and sets the table. Its nice and rewarding to work as a team.

Make your own burgers – the flavour is so much better than store bought and you can control your own ingredients: Hamburger meat, 1 egg, salt, pepper. Sometimes I also add finely chopped onions, finely ground cracker crumbs, BBQ Sause, mustard, ketchup and some of my other favourite spices.

Marinade – customize your own marinade too. Let the meat soak in a marinade for a minimum of 3 hours (8 hours is even better). The longer you marinade the more tender your meat. Leaner meats with less fat tend to be tougher when cooked too fast with no marinade. I mix everything but the kitchen sink in my marinades:

**Beef Marinade:** Steak spice, salt, pepper, honey, cayenne, BBQ sauce, ketchup, HP sauce, garlic, Worcestershire sauce and a lot of soy sauce.

**Pork Marinade:** Salt, pepper, honey, cayenne, ketchup, mustard, garlic, Worcestershire sauce and a lot of soy sauce.

**Potatoes:** Chop up some potatoes, onions, garlic, add salt & pepper, butter, wrap them in foil and BBQ for 25 per side – nice crispy flavourful potatoes.

Shish-kabobs: A meal on a stick, mmm... good and no dishes! You can do them all veggies, beef or chicken, its all good. I recommend wooden skewers; less burnt fingers – ouch the metal ones are hot!

**Beef:** Stew cubes marinated, peppers cut into squares, cherry tomatoes, mushrooms and mini potatoes.

**Chicken:** Marinade some chicken, pineapple, zucchini and peppers.

Have a safe BBQ!







#### Better At Home Support Worker - on call

The Better at Home Program is designed to provide support to community members who need additional assistance to continue to reside at home in the community. The Labourer plays a key role in the Better at Home Program, providing the leg work to support the clients. Labourer can expect to perform a very wide variety of tasks to support a wide variety of clients. Assigned responsibilities will include indoor and outdoor activities, including working in high and low temperatures, and inclement weather (rain, snow etc.). Successful Better at Home Labourer should prepare to work long physically demanding hours, will be required to provide their own clothing appropriate to the day's tasks and weather, and may be asked to provide their own personal safety equipment.

#### Diabetes Nurse

The RN shall provide care, leadership, and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically, the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions within the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

#### Family Development Worker

Multiple term contacts are available. The Family Development Worker's primary goal is to support and connect families on their journey to wellness. Support and connection are provided to families who are experiencing mental health and child welfare challenges through oneon-one coaching, individual, family, and community education and awareness activities, and referral to other health and social services agencies.

#### Home Support Worker

The role of the Health Care Aide is to support residents in general care duties, support in self care and medication management.

#### Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give community members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

#### Recovery Home Support Worker

The role of the Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Specifically the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions with in the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

#### Targeted Wage Subsidy -Recovery Home Support Worker

The role of the Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

#### Sexual Violence Rapid Response Outreach Worker Term ends March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2023

The SVPC Community Outreach is a central resource for education about sexual violence prevention and response as well as a central support for someone who have experienced or been impacted by sexual violence. The Community Outreach Worker works collaboratively with the SVPC Coordinator and other members of the Band to develop and deliver educational and awareness programming aimed at creating a consent culture. The Community Outreach and Student Support Worker provides guidance on accessing community resources and assists clients with safety planning and with navigating available policies, procedures, and services.

#### Shwx'eyelhtxw Cultural Support Worker

The primary goal of the Shwx'eyelhtxw Trauma Cultural Support Worker is to ensure that the Trauma Treatment Center, and clients are provided with a caring and learning environment. The Shxw'eyelhtexw Trauma Cultural Support Worker will help to facilitate the clients to enable their participation in activities while they work toward their healing from trauma.

Seabird Island Band is an alcohol and drug-free environment – Cultural Support Worker must maintain a reasonable standard of professional practice and will act as a role model.

#### Medical Office Assistant (MOA)

The Medical Office Assistant will be responsible for providing front line support to employees and patients of the Medical Office. Support will be required primarily at mobile medical offices, but also at the Seabird Doctors Office.

#### Education

#### Dean of College

The Dean of College (DC) shall provide post-secondary education and employment program leadership and management expertise. Specifically, the DE shall be responsible to the director for the efficient, effective and productive operation of the education and employment programs of Seabird Island Band, with an emphasis on post-secondary and Seabird College programs and bridging to employment.

#### **Education Assistant**

The Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding.

EA's will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, record keeping and data collection.

#### **Executive Assistant to Principal**

The Executive Assistant shall provide administrative and executive secretarial duties within the SIB Community School. This position assists with all matters of an immediate, administrative and task oriented nature.

#### Grade 7 Teacher

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School/High School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures.

#### Junior Kindergarten Teacher

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill the position of a K4 teacher. We believe that kindergarten readiness requires indicators of success in social, emotional, physical, spiritual and cognitive domains. It also requires a prepped information plan prior to admission to the formal kindergarten program to achieve the greatest success possible for each student.

#### Student Mentor/ Counsellor

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill the position of Student Mentor and Counsellor for K-12 students. Essentially, your responsibility is to equip students with a variety of strategies for coping with life's challenges: help students establish their personal goals, guiding and helping children make action plans, motivate and inspire children, identify and provide resources, referrals and follow-ups and providing assistance in crisis situations.

#### **Registrar** - College

The Registrar is responsible for the orderly registration, enrollment, reporting processes and daily administration of Seabird College and Adult education programs. The Registrar will work with the Data Manager to assist with student registrations and records for Seabird College student intakes and their completion/certifications, all in accordance with the directives set forth by various funding and accreditation bodies, and the philosophies, policies and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management.

#### Summer Worker Employment Program - Administration Assistant/Receptionist

The Receptionist/Student Support Assistant provides linkages to services and support for adult learners in a vocational training institution. The Receptionist/ Student Support Assistant is often the first point of contact for potential students and the general public, and plays a role in general office appearance, organization, and professional impression.

#### **Recreation Worker**

The Recreation Coordinator is responsible for creating and leading recreational activities for the community at large. Will work closely with the Events and Cultural worker in planning activities for the community. A portion of the position will be fitness and recreation activities for the community. The Recreation Coordinator will consult with staff and community members to determine their needs and interests and establish activities in response to those needs. This is a full-time position of 35 hours per week.
