Seabird Island Community and Cultural Centre



Final drawings for the Seabird Island Community and Cultural Centre are now on the desks of civil, mechanical, and electrical engineers. The building entrance will face east to welcome the sun. We are almost ready to put in a preload at the building site. We want to share the plans and hear from you.

It has been a long process, with November 2021 heavy weather dictating new flood construction levels and the new building location as a result. The building will be located along Chowat Rd. just past the community core. The intent is to continue Pípehò:m Road to meet Chowat, so that the site will be accessible from both Chowat and Pípehò:m Roads. It will save costs to build on the higher ground. The balance between meeting the project budget and meeting the needs of the community is a careful process. Building costs have increased a great deal in the last few years but we want the best look, feel and functionality we can get. The building will be energy efficient, built to BC 2020 specifications. We will wire the building for solar panels, and for electronic vehicle charging stations, for example. We will have all mechanical infrastructure with climate change and our climate footprint in mind.


The large gathering space is on the main floor, with 10,000 square feet (compared to 8000 the sq ft Band Gym)and the commercial kitchen close at hand for our community dinners, ceremonies and festival events. A closeup snapshot focuses on this space. The Circle Room is 682 square feet, with easy access from outside, the main hall, the Cultural Room and the Elders' Room.

The Elders' Room is 1,200 square feet, with a small kitchenette, accessible washroom, and gathering space that will include storage for projects and materials.


The Cultural Room is 901 square feet. It will be available for sewing and weaving projects. It was suggested that we mount the weaving looms on the wall, as they were traditionally, so that any unfinished work is accessible and provides decorative focus as well.

The Commercial Kitchen is 1084 square feet, with easy access from the main hall and from outside for canning or other food preservation, including wild game processing.

The Youth Room will be on the second floor, with ample space to hang out, to work on projects and host workshops or movie nights. There will also be space up and downstairs for our Child and Family and Mental Health team to provide community services.

New Seabird Road Signs



Seabird received a Vision Zero Grant, with the goals to increase safety on the roads. Seabird Members have reached out to the organization with their concerns and noted that the safety of our children, Elders, and land is a priority. With families moving back to the community we have noticed a high number of families who use bikes, electric scooters, and wheelchairs as modes of transportation. Seabird Island's rapid growth, ongoing safety issues, and liability concerns could be addressed with the Vision Zero Grant. Seabird Island's goal was to purchase and install road signage to reduce risks and improve safety for its members.

Back in October Gary Swan was asked by Khalid Kafi (Infrastructure Director) and Chanea Gabriel to assist ATS Traffic systems, with road and stop sign replacement on Seabird. Gary had only been here for a few months and didn't even know the roads around Seabird at this point! It was a good learning experience for him. Gary drove with ATS staff, and they mapped out all the signs and speed bumps around the community.

Together they replaced the old wooden posts with steel and every sign was replaced with bright new ones complete with the Seabirds logo. The stop signs were replaced with both STOP and tl'élexw, the halq'eméylem word for stop. They had to do a little digging for some road names as Art and Paul in Public Works informed them there were other, unmarked roads on Seabird which required signs.

Jennifer in the Lands Program helped sort out those road names and locations. The spelling and punctuation were checked by Dianna Kay who was invaluable with her expertise in the halq'eméylem language.


Gary was concerned about an expensive spelling mistake! There are some differences in spelling and punctuation on the new signs, and that caused some initial confusion! Seabird Island will address this in coming weeks.



All changes were sent to Jennifer in the Lands Program to make sure all outside agencies are aware of them.

This was Gary's first project here and he hopes people will be happy with the new signs.

Kindergarten Class

We have had a fantastic first term in the Kindergarten. The students have been working hard, learning that language and story can be a source of creativity and joy. We have been playing with language daily to help us discover how language works for listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Mathematical thinking involving such concepts as problem solving, number, space, and time are used in everyday life. Early numeracy grows as children explore the everyday world of shape and space, patterns, and numbers through hands-on materials, games and number activities.

This learning was completed in both English and Halq'eméylem and have authored two books in both languages as well. Better than that, we can integrate our Halq'eméylem language naturally throughout our day.







Grade 10-12 Class

Students in grade 10, 11, and 12 have been busy throughout this first semester engaging in a variety of trades education in the wood shop. This is designed to not only build the skills of the students, but also to have them explore potential career opportunities.

Our grade 10 students have been trying a few different trades in a local trade sampler course. Students have learned some basics of carpentry, electrical, and framing by completing small walls with a working circuit installed, and then expanding on this to build a full-sized room, complete with door, window, and electrical wired throughout. These students are now learning about basic automotive maintenance by completing oil changes, tire rotations, and replacing brakes. Students in grade 11 and 12 have been focusing more on woodwork projects. They have completed a number of tasks that have taken them through the design process having them; design, prototype, adjust, and build various things. Their culminating project was a two-person deck chair with a table between the seats.

These classes serve as a jumping-off point for students who are interested in pursuing a trade after high school. On February 6, many of our grade 12 students will be attending UFV in the trade sampler program to further explore these trades.

Seabird Island Lands will host an Open House in the gymnasium on all the above dates.

Seabird Island's Members' input is needed on the draft Land Use Plan, development of the Environmental Management Plan, to share input on the Guardianship Program, and more.





Business Permit applications and/or renewals are due.

Business Permits expire at the end of each calendar year.

Seabird Island Band's Business Permit Law is to record and regulate businesses on Seabird Lands. This law applies to the whole area of the reserve and Seabird Lands described in the Land Code and any person who:

- Advertises or indicated by any means as being open for Business of any kind,
- Deals in or buys, sells, barters, rents, or displays any commodity or service or offer by advertisement or otherwise, on behalf of himself or others; to buy, sell, barter, or rent any commodity or service,
- Engages in soliciting or promoting any commodity or service,
- Renders or offers to render professional, personal, contract, or other services service to any person for the purpose of gain or profit.
- Engages in repairing, restoring, or servicing automobiles, appliances, or other commodities not owned or registered in the name of that person or firm, within or on Seabird Lands shall be deemed to be carrying on a business.

Where a business is carried out in or from more than one home, structure, or parcel of land on or within Seabird Lands, the Business carried in or from each premises shall be deemed to be a separate business.

Exemptions include, but are not limited to the following:

- Public schools
- Teaching of music, handicrafts, or art as a home occupation where such teaching involves not more than one class of 5 students at one time
- Garage sales or yard sales fewer than 4 days per year of sales
- Subject to meeting health requirements set out in applicable laws, sales of catered foods or baked goods cooked in the home of a member or occupant of Seabird Lands
- Non-commercial periodic fund-raising events by Seabird Members or organizations or occupants of Seabird Lands
- Creation and sale of carvings, crafts, and other artwork and crafts by Members,
- Small-scale home-based activities by Seabird Members or occupants of Seabird Lands including Avon, Herbalife, Tupperware and locally made crafts.

Pre-Conditions

No business permit shall be granted for Businesses requiring other authorizations until the applicant has demonstrated that the applicable preconditions have been met including the following:


- For any premises, confirmation from the Seabird Lands Department that the proposed use of the land or premises complies with the Seabird Development law, 2015 and the Seabird Land Zoning and Land Use Law 2015, and any other applicable land use or zoning laws
- For any premises, proof of compliance with all applicable fire safety regulations
- For an automobile dealership proof of licensing under the provincial Motor Dealers Act
- For a daycare, proof of licensing under the provincial Child Care Licensing Regulation
- For the **preparation distribution and selling of foods** (e.g., restaurants, grocery stores, hot dog stands, etc.) other than pre-packaged or pre-bottled foodstuffs, **proof of a Food Service Permit under the Provincial Food Premises Regulation**
- For tattoo parlours, piercing or body modification services, and hairdressing and manicure services, proof of approval by a Health Official under the provincial Health Act

Upcoming Church Initiatives & Involvement

Some priorities in our approach:

All our activities come from a desire to help the people of Seabird Island and Sts'áiles. There is no other motivation for our work, it has nothing to do with any expectations of bringing people to the church. During our work we will not mention the "church".

Some of this work includes visiting Elders that would like to talk and have someone to listen to them.

On request we would bring communion to anyone who wishes to receive and is unable to come to church services. For those who wish to come to the church, we offer mass at the Immaculate Conception church every second Sunday. Please see the schedule listed here, "Our Lady of Fatima, Sts'áiles & Immaculate Conception, Seabird Island Schedule of Masses."

We have been in discussions with our food supplier and have been approved to open a food bank at Seabird Island. There have been some issues we are currently working through. We will require volunteers from the community to help with the work.

I have applied for several grants through the Truth and Reconciliation Committee, some have already been granted. We are waiting for the language grant which is the biggest. Our priority here, is to say the Mass in English and Halq'eméylem. We currently say the "Our Father" in the language. When the money comes in, we will hire translators and equipment to aid in teaching.

One of the most important issues we are working on is an addiction program to address an issue that all communities experience. We will work in Partnership with First Nations Health; the program will be led by Elders. Everyone will contribute their expertise

their expertise.

Our priority in the program is to focus on the trauma that caused the addiction. Our view is addiction is a medical issue not a moral one. Our goal is to help people heal from childhood trauma. This starts in February and will be held in Sts'áiles.

Join us:

Movie night every Wednesday starting at 6 p.m. to gather in the church on Seabird and enjoy a snack while we watch.



Education Assistant Grade K4-12

Under the supervision of school administration, the EA will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding.

Halq'eméylem Teacher

The Halq'eméylem Language Teacher is responsible for teaching students how to speak, understand, and write Seabird Islands' traditional language – Halq'eméylem. This teacher is an unrelenting advocate for language revitalization and works with staff and administration to promote the language throughout the school. The Case Worker is responsible for working with clients one-on-one and in small groups to assist them to overcome one or more barriers that are inhibiting their ability to gain employment. Clients will range from 19-24 and 25-49 years of age. The successful candidate will provide education, information and assistance to clients on all aspects of employment, education, training, and life career planning. The Case Worker takes a hands on approach to assisting their clients in exploring careers and finding employment including building relationships with potential employers.

Receptionist - School

The Receptionist is responsible for a wide variety of clerical office duties in support of School which Includes communicating office activities, greeting and screening students and parents, answering and transferring telephone calls.

School Bus Driver - on call

You will provide safe transport services to the students who attend our school on an assgined route. You will be a member of an interdisciplinary, collaborative team, liaising with other professionals, students, family members, and community to provide students with a safe and reliable transport to complete their education.

Secondary & Post Secondary Coordinator

Under the direction of the Principal; the Secondary and Post-Secondary Coordinator is primarily responsible for the coordination, promotion, and administration of the Secondary and Post-Secondary Program.

Student Counsellor

You will provide counselling and support for K-12 students. Essentially, your responsibility is to equip students with a variety of strategies for coping with life's challenges: help students establish their personal goals, guiding and helping children make action plans, motivate and inspire children, identifying and providing resources, referrals and follow-ups and providing assistance in crisis situations.

Teacher On Call (TOC)

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures. Individual contracts will govern the specific teaching assignment and number of hours.

Technology Education Teacher

You will provide lessons and activities to help students develop knowledge and understanding of concepts of computers, as well as practical software use, and troubleshooting skills. You'll present a wide variety of beginner to complex lessons that focus on keyboarding, word processing, Microsoft Office and internet basics to software, data processing, hardware and web-design.

Vice Principal - Administration

The Vice Principal assists the Principal in the administration, leadership, supervision and operation of School. The Vice-Principal provides quality B.C. curriculum in a learning environment that promotes language and reinforces the personal values of self-reliance, generosity, honesty, adaptability, and respect for self, others and the environment.

Health & Social Development

Youth Worker - Drop in Program

The Youth Worker will be expected to develop strong and healthy relationships with youth that will include in-depth discussions/workshops and support related to youth issues such as suicide, sexual education, gender, mental health, drugs, alcohol, and developing healthy relationships. The Youth Worker will also connect their clients with needed programs and services such as driver's education, health services, mentorships, and social supports. The Youth Worker will have emotional intelligence and are trauma informed.



Better At Home Support Worker - on call

The Better at Home Program is designed to provide support to Community Members who need additional assistance to continue to reside at home in the community. The Labourer plays a key role in the Better at Home Program, providing the leg work to support the clients. Labourer can expect to perform a very wide variety of tasks to support a wide variety of clients. Assigned responsibilities will include indoor and outdoor activities, including working in high and low temperatures, and inclement weather (rain, snow etc.). Successful Better at Home Labourer should prepare to work long physically demanding hours, will be required to provide their own clothing appropriate to the day's tasks and weather, and may be asked to provide their own personal safety equipment.

Diabetes Nurse

The Registered Nurse (RN) shall provide care, leadership, and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically, the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions within the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

Health Care Assistant

The Health Care Assistant supports Clients and Elder's in their homes. We are looking for a compassionate Home Health Aide to assist in daily living and personal care services in patients homes in accordance with an established care plan.

Family Life Skills Coach (FLSC)

The primary goal of the FLSC is to ensure that the families in the family home are supported in developing healthy parenting and other life skills, with attention to children's needs (helping with homework, structured mealtimes, healthy meals, bedtime routines etc.). The FLSC will ensure strong cultural values, and manage programming that builds family bonds and resilience as well as a grounding in culture and community supports. Approaches to household chores, shopping and finances will also be modeled. The FLSC will ensure that families are directed to health, healing and other services and programs, and encourage them to make choices that are nurturing to self and family. The FLSC ensures that culture is embedded in all services. This position may be required to work the occasional evening or weekend.

Recovery Home Support Worker (RSW) - Women's Home

The Residential Support Worker (RSW) promotes recovery, stabilization, and independence by providing comprehensive support to clients. The RSW supports and promotes the following: client safety, assisting with activities of daily living, and encouraging full participation in community activities included but not limited to cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving, and shopping.

Medical Office Assistant (MOA) - Part time

The MOA will be responsible for providing front line support to employees and patients of the Medical Office. Support will be required at the Seabird Doctors Office.

The MOA provides support to doctors and other health-care professionals. You will perform a wide variety of clerical and administrative tasks. These include scheduling appointments, word processing, billing, data entry, filing, and answering telephone calls. You may also be expected to perform minor medical duties.

The CS Supervisor's primary role is to provide programming and leadership that allow the community to learn and grow together, through recreational programming, community events like the Seabird Festival, cultural celebrations, and opportunities for Community Members to be part of a movement creating community spirit and cohesion.

Laborer - Ecological Restoration (FNIYES SLP)

The 'Laborer – Ecological Restoration' will be tasked with building trails, restoring habitat, and removing invasive species. This position includes visiting indigenous food sites and working with partners to promote, sustain, record, collect data and preserve indigenous species. This person will also support the Lands staff, including but not limited to everyday tasks like filing, record keeping, report preparation, scheduling, and data entry. Term ends March 31st, 2023

Policy Analyst

In this role, you will provide expertise in policy development, analysis, planning, and research in areas aligned with Seabird Island policy agenda including the development of reports, presentations, plans and publications. The Policy Analyst, you will develop strong and effective working relationships with colleagues, First Nations communities, partners, and organizations, and with federal, provincial, and external stakeholders. Collaborating across the organization to conduct research and analysis and preparing briefings, reports, publications, strategies, discussion papers, summaries, and other documents to support policy and planning.

Policy Writer

The Policy Writer will be responsible for the research, analysis of information and consulting with the executive team, stakeholders, internal staff, and technical experts in formulating recommendations on a wide range Policy Development.

The role is privy to sensitive, and private information and requires a high degree of integrity, accountability and confidentiality.

Infrastructure

Building Maintenance Worker

The Building Maintenance Worker is responsible for assisting the most complex and skilled building maintenance work and provide technical maintenance as required. . The Building Maintenance Worker will support the Lead-Hand to repair buildings and facilities; and install and repair various electronic and mechanical equipment. This position is responsible for the effective and safe use of available materials and equipment. The employee is required to operate and maintain power tools, drive vehicles, climb ladders and perform physical activity. This position may require sufficient physical ability and mobility to work; stand and sit for prolonged periods of time.

Finance & Administration

Proposal Writer

In this role, you will provide expertise in seeking funding and grant opportunities, researching needs and writing proposals in areas aligned with Seabird Island strategic goals. The Proposal Writer will work with the Directors, Chief and Council, various committees, external agencies, and other parties, to provide Seabird Island with background research, community input, applicable legal information, and multiple options to resolving concerns or issues facing the Band and Band operations.

The Proposal Writer will be responsible for researching, preparing, and submitting funding proposals for various projects and programs. They will also be responsible for tracking expected funding opportunities and for ensuring that the Director is kept apprised of the status of all funding proposals. The Proposal Writer will regularly be tasked with gathering data, soliciting input, and preparing briefings for the ED, Directors, Committees, and Chief and Council. Through this the expectation will be that all bodies will be provided with the input and information that they require to make informed decisions and choices.

Accounts Payable Assistant

Working within the Finance Department the Accounts Payable Assistant will provide technical services using clerical skills to assure the accurate and timely payment of expenses for Seabird Island Band programs. The successful applicant must maintain confidentiality of all financial records. The Accounts Payable Assistants will be responsible for processing invoices, resolving account discrepancies, managing bank reconciliation, creating expense reports, and updating account information on the company's database.

Records Coordinator

Under general supervision of the Records Manager, this position plans, coordinates and provides records / information management daily support in the development, implementation, and on-going maintenance of corporate information. The Records Coordinator must be responsible, accurate, proficient in the duties assigned, maintain a high degree of independent judgment and personal initiative. At this level, the person understands more than the basic techniques and technologies, has managed, or developed RM projects, and has knowledge of IM life-cycle concepts. In addition, the Practitioner may be developing specialty skills (e.g., analysis, auditing, warehousing, and application technologies) and may also have experience supervising other IM staff.

Human Resources

HR Administrator

The Human Resources Administrator will act as the first point of contact for HR-related queries from employees. Your main administrative duties include maintaining personnel records, managing HR documents (e.g., employment records and on-boarding guides) and updating internal databases. Scheduling and preparing documentation for all HR related Recruitment practices.
