What was your first Job/Position working at Seabird?

Working for the Seabird Island Café – I was 13/14 years old. I was a Dishwasher and got paid \$4.10 per hour. Had many jobs growing up from Dishwasher/ Waitress/Youth Worker/Rec Worker. Was in the WOW Program and the Challenge Programs. Was a Council Member.

How have you grown into your position now? (stages/titles, programs, departments, education,...)

Came home from University (UBC) following dad having a heart attack, while home I figured I'd get a summer job, so I applied for the Data Entry Clerk in the Finance Dept. - Worked at the Seabird Cotton Wood Fields.
- Landscaped the old Band Office before the gym and Health Wing was built.

Do you have a best, worst, or funny memory you would like to share?

Being asked to take a group of student nurses for a tour of Seabird. But when I got on the bus, I found it was Doctors from around the world. I was not prepared for doctors, but it went well.

Art Andrew – 40 years

What was your first Job/Position working for Seabird?

My first job working for Seabird, I was called in to fix broken windows. I was kept on for part-time Maintenance and part-time Janitor.

How have you grown into your position now? (stages/titles, programs, departments, education,...)

- When I started working in Maintenance, we had 4 buildings to look after; Band Office and the School were one building (the old school), the Church, Church Hall and the Community Hall. You were able to count all the Staff in Seabird at that time, on two hands.
- I use to help at the Café when it was needed.
- When the School was built in '92, I became Maintenance Supervisor. It was split in half of taking care of the Band Office and School, my time was split 60-40% on both buildings.
- I also did community services; garbage run, sewer maintenance, water operator and grounds keeper for all the fields and buildings.

What your favourite part about working for Seabird? Why do you enjoy working here?


- Got to work with Edna Bobb, Shirley Noris, Joe Aleck.

Why Stopping Distances Matter More During the Winter

It's pretty simple, really. Stopping distance is the distance it takes your vehicle to come to a complete stop once you apply your brakes. The faster you are travelling, the longer it will take you to come to a complete stop (and being able to stop your vehicle as quickly as possible when you need to is always a good thing).



Stopping distances seen at speeds of 50 km/hr versus 80 km/hr under different road conditions.

"Speed limits are for ideal driving conditions. Winter driving conditions are not ideal. Slow down and drive safely!"

Along with our partners in the Winter Driving Safety Alliance — repeat this mantra many, many times during the winter months. Why? To remind drivers that the road they drove on during the summer is not the same road during winter. Rain, slush, snow, ice and cold temperatures mean your tires have less traction and less traction makes stopping harder. Period.

For example, if you're driving on a set of all-season tires on a rain-covered road at 80 km/h, you'll need nearly twice the distance to stop than you would when driving at 50 km/h. Not surprisingly, snow and ice covered roads create even longer stopping distances.

Rain, slush, snow, ice and cold temperatures are all part of winter driving.

Stopping your passenger vehicle in these conditions can be challenging, as your tires have less traction on cold and often slippery road surfaces.

How winter tires help

All-season tires and summer tires are manufactured with a hard rubber compound designed to increase the tread life of the tire. Unfortunately, as the temperatures drop below 7° C, this compound becomes less flexible and these tires lose their ability to provide traction, even on dry roads.



Winter tires with a 3-peaked mountain and snowflake symbol provide better traction and stopping performance than all-season tires in cold temperatures and on wet, snowy and icy roads.



Tires with the M+S (Mud and Snow) symbol meet the minimum legal requirement for a winter tire in British Columbia.

The improved traction offered by winter tires may be the difference between safely driving or stopping on winter roads and being involved in a potentially serious motor-vehicle incident.

During BC's winter driving season (October 1st – March 31st), most highways require passenger vehicles to have winter tires with either the 3-peaked mountain and snowflake symbol or tires with the mud and snow symbol at a minimum tread depth of 3.5 mm.

More than just pressing on the brake pedal

You need time to see and react before your brakes take effect and slow you down. When you see a hazard ahead while driving, it will take you about three-quarters of a second to make the decision to stop and another three-quarters of a second to brake. Only then will your vehicle begin to slow.

Double the Speed, Quadruple the Braking Distance

When increasing your speed, keep this in mind: Each time you double your speed, your braking distance is multiplied by four. In wet or icy road conditions, it's even more.

Help keep yourself and others safe by slowing down, keeping your distance, and remembering these tips:

- Know the risk posed by winter driving (including darkness, rain). Slow down on wet roads, in bad weather conditions, or on uneven roads.
- Increase your following distance if you are following behind a very large vehicle that could block your vision or a motorcycle that could stop very quickly.
- Prepare yourself and your vehicle.
 Have an emergency kit on hand, make

- sure your car is running well and is equipped with winter tires.
- Be realistic about your travel time.
 Driving is a complex task, especially in poor conditions. Allow extra travel time in wet, icy or snowy weather so you aren't tempted to rush. If you're going to be later than you expected deal with it. Take a deep breath and accept the delay.
- Assess the need for travel. Check DriveBC and if conditions don't look good – don't go.

Car Emergency Kit List

Keep the below items in a bag in your trunk. Ideally, we'd suggest keeping these items in a clear, plastic container so it's easy to see and locate everything. You can buy a pre-packaged kit or create your own.

Minimum Supplies:

In an emergency situation, in addition to a full tank of gas and fresh antifreeze, the National Safety Council recommends having these with you at all times:

- ☐ Blankets, mittens, socks and hats
- ☐ Ice scraper and snow brush
- ☐ Flashlight, plus extra batteries (or a hand-crank flashlight)
- ☐ Jumper cables
- ☐ First-aid kit
- ☐ Bottled water
- Multi-tool (such as a Leatherman multi-tool or a Swiss Army knife)
- Road flares or reflective warning triangles
- ☐ Windshield cleaner

Extra Supplies for Frigid Weather

- ☐ For those in wintry snowy areas, add the below items to your emergency kit. (If it's balmy all winter where you live, be thankful that you don't need all of this stuff!)
- ☐ A bag of sand to help with traction (or bag of non-clumping cat litter)
- ☐ Collapsible or folding snow shovel
- ☐ Blanket



- ☐ Tire chains and tow strap
- ☐ Hand warmers
- ☐ Winter boots for longer trips
- ☐ Sleeping bag for longer trips

Note: Use salt for de-icing driveways and roads. (Excess salinity can damage

vegetation and contaminate groundwater, however. So, with this in mind, salt your driveway only when you must, and try not to use more than necessary.)

Keeping Warm at Home

The goal is to keep yourself warm, not the entire house. Heating rooms will need to be prioritized, drafts sealed, insulation checked, supplies stocked, and dress in layers.

Your first layer should feel nice against your skin. Second layer should be wool, fleece down, or nylon, these retain body heat. The outer layer needs to protect against wind and water (for outside). Use more layers in-between as needed. Wear hats (that cover your ears), scarves, and gloves as needed. Change any wet or damp clothes as soon as possible and stay bundled up.

There are small things that can help make the home feel warmer before turning up the thermostat. When you have wood/ceramic/concrete floors they can sap heat from your feet and make a room feel a couple degrees cooler. Wearing slippers and placing thick rugs or folded blankets/towels where you frequently walk will create a degree of separation between you and the cold floor. Put tightly folded blankets or towels at the bottom of doors to prevent drafts. Cooking/baking adds heat, while providing you with hot food. Let the water sit after doing dishes or taking a bath, the steam may help a bit, while keeping the air from becoming too dry.

Heat rises, while cool air drops, so turning on the ceiling fan will circulate the air. When you live in a 2-floor building, you can work this to your advantage by staying on the second floor and letting the heat rise to you. Blinds/curtains insulate a bit lessoning the cold seeping in your windows and the rest for your home, adding a layer of plastic an inch or two from the window can help as well.

Drafts

Make sure you wear protective equipment while using most of these methods; gloves and a dust mask will be needed. Check the caulk seals around the windows, doors, and vents for cracking. When there are no visible cracks, there are other ways to detect drafts. Close all windows, doors, and vents, light an incense and hold it near the windows/doors, if the smoke drifts away, then there is a leak in the seal, or it needs weather stripping. Weather stripping can be placed between the window/door and its frame. A low budget option for sealing cracked window/door caulk is sealing heavy duty plastic to the frame.

If you can remove the window/door trim, a non-expanding spray foam, may be used to fill the gaps between the frame and wall. Caulk the trim's edges. Caulk or spray foam can be used to seal the spaces around pipes and cables going into the wall. Duct tape or foam insulation may be placed around gaps and metal housing for lights and ceiling fans. For vents, the holes can be filled with duct sealant and aluminum duct tape at the joints.

Heating

Heating this time of year, can make up about half of your annual hydro bill. Heating costs rise about 5% for every degree above 20°C (68°F) on your thermostat. Set the room to 16°C (61°F) when you are going to sleep or leaving the house to save money. When you are awake set it to 21°C (70°F). Note: raising the temperature on the thermostat higher won't make the room warm up faster, it takes the same amount of time as reaching your intended temperature. Clean dust out of your heater/vents to improve efficiency. Use your vacuum cleaner to remove as much dust as you can from each of your heaters/vents. Baseboard heaters should sit at least 2 cm above the floor or carpet to allow the cooler air on the floor to flow under and through the electrical element. Your drapes should end at least 10 cm above your heaters and at least 5 cm between the back of the drapes and the front of vour heaters.

Portable Heaters, are good for heating small, enclosed spaces, but they use a lot of electricity and can be a fire hazard.

Make sure they can't be tipped over, and that they automatically turn off when tipped over. Place your space heater on a level, hard inflammable surface, such as a concrete or ceramic tile floor. Keep the heater at least 3 ft away from bedding, drapes, clothing, furniture, books, newspapers, and more. Don't fall asleep with it on. Turn it off when you leave the room. Place it the corner of the room. Keep doors to the room shut to keep the heat in. Keep children and pets away from these heaters. If it won't reach a wall outlet, be sure to use a heavy-duty extension cord so it does not overheat.

Pipes

Wrap pipes in insulation, you can add a PVB cover as well. Pipes freeze at -6°C (20°F). If you need to keep the pipes running, then turn you sink on enough for a trickle of water. It is harder for water to freeze when it is in motion. This is to prevent your pipes from bursting due to the water inside them freezing, you may need to turn off the pipes. Gather what water you need before turning off the pipes to your house and drain any remaining water in them.

Power Outage

Focus most of your efforts into keeping one room heated. It is easier to keep smaller rooms heated. Try to keep all household residents (*including pets*) in one room, body heat can help keep everyone warm. If you are comfortable with it, cuddle your housemates or pets.

Make sure you have:

- A battery-operated radio
- Flashlights
- Batteries
- A week's worth of food & water (2 liters of water, per person, per day)
- DO NOT use barbecues or camp stoves indoors!

Stay safe and bundle up for the rest of this winter.





- Knowledge, respect and understanding of Stó: lō culture, traditions and language is considered an asset.
 Knowledge and understanding of First Nation family dynamics and issues; and ability to develop trusting and positive relationships with Cheam First Nation Band Members and their families.
- Valid BC Driver's License, Class 5 and access to a reliable vehicle.
- Satisfactory Criminal Record Check.

Duties and Responsibilities:

Program and Services Coordination:

- Research and keep informed of new trends, issues, programs and services federally and territorially, and with other First Nation, agencies, organizations and professionals and assess implications to Cheam First Nation.
- Research funding opportunities, draft required proposals for funding and ensure proposals are submitted as required by indicated deadlines.
- Ensure that contracts, contribution agreements, and programs are fully adhered to and reported on within set deadlines.
- Establish and maintain sound working relationships with Band Membership and staff, and representatives of other departments and agencies; such as Indigenous Services Canada, varying educational institutions and their staff, etc.

Health & Social Development

Child Protection Program Supervisor

The Child Protection Program Supervisor will be responsible for mentoring and monitoring staff who are developing and delivering Seabird's Child Protection programs. The supervisor also is responsible for engaging and advocating for Seabird Island Community Members. This role includes establishing relationships with outside agencies to ensure success of the program objectives. The Child Protection Program Supervisor will be expected to develop strong and healthy relationships with staff, clients and their families.

Case Manager

The primary goal of the Case Manager is to support residents with a caring and supported environment in which to address addictions and substance use. Through a variety of programs, the Case Manager will ensure that residents can access health, healing and other services and programs, through programming in the home and through broader community services, to address the underlying causes of addiction and substance use, and to make choices that are life sustaining and positive.

Counsellor

The Family Counsellor is responsible for providing counselling to families, Youth, and children regarding addictions and family issues. Counselling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, families, in groups, circles and couple's counselling. The counsellor must be able to work from a trauma informed perspective. The family counsellor will provide services to Bands in which the Seabird Island Band provides Health Services to and will involve travel to the communities. The Family Counsellor will educate the community through workshops to address issues identified. The Family Counsellor will facilitate daytime and evening education workshops. The Family Counsellor will make referrals for clients to residential treatment centres as required, and help facilitate at the Recovery home.

Recovery Home Support Worker

The role of the Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give Community Members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

Driving Instructor

The Driving Instructor is responsible for teaching students the rules of the road and the safe way to handle an automobile. This position will entail providing full service drivers training for students of varying ages and experiences who are looking to acquire their BC Driver's License or to acquire a higher class of license. Students will range in age from teenagers through to Elders. Training will include practical sessions and should fully prepare the student for their knowledge and driven tests.

Family Development Worker

Multiple term contacts available. The Family Development Worker's primary goal is to support and connect families on their journey to wellness. Support and connection are provided to families who are experiencing mental health and child welfare challenges through one-onone coaching, individual, family, and community education and awareness activities, and referral to other health and social services agencies. This position provides service to families.

Health Quality Officer term ends March 31, 2022

Under the direction and supervision of the Health Director, the Health Quality Officer is responsible for Developing Health and maintaining Health programs infrastructure including: professional practice support, Health Policies and procedures, and service standards which are required for effective programming. This officer will also ensure that the Health Department has a quality assurance program that enables us to continue to achieve excellence in Health Services.

Trauma Treatment Centre Trauma Counsellor

The Trauma Counsellor is responsible for providing counseling to clients towards resolution of their trauma. Counselling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, in groups, and using circles to help clients process trauma during their intensive short stay (six weeks) at the Trauma Centre. The Trauma Counsellor will facilitate daytime and evening individual and group sessions, 3 days each week.

Executive Assistant to Health Director

Under the direction of the Health and Social Development Director, the Executive Assistant shall provide administrative and executive secretarial duties in support of the Health and Social Development Department. This position assists with all matters of an immediate, administrative and task-oriented nature.

We can only provide assistance to those with a status number.




