Seabird Students Learn the Traditional Use and Methods of harvesting Bark from a Yew Tree

Over a number of days, Students at Lalme'Iwesawtexw had the opportunity to learn about the traditional use and methods of harvesting bark from a yew tree. Deanna (senior school cook) and Yummo (Elder in residence) took the students through the process of properly harvesting the bark and taught them about the benefits of using the bark as tea. Below is an excerpt of an interview conducted with Deanna, as well as some photos of the students working with the tree.

What type of tree did you use and why?

We used the Yew tree, which only grows to a height of about 10 feet. I came to know about this tree because an elder taught me that the yew wood was a medicine tree, 20 years ago. As he taught me how to harvest the bark, he said that I would be doing this myself one day. Little did I know that I would be sharing this knowledge with our children here on Seabird Island.

What did you harvest from the tree?

We harvested the bark off the tree: it must be a clean area and the bark cannot become dirty once removed from tree.

What is the bark used for?

It is use to make tea.

What does the tea help with?

It helps with major illness such as cancer.

How do you make the tea?

It takes three days to dry the bark in preparation for the tea. A stainless steel pot must be used to make the tea: add 4 litres of water, use a cheese cloth to put 2 cups of bark in and tie tight, then place the cheese cloth into boiling water and turn down and simmer for 3 hours.

How often do you drink it?

The tea is used two times a day ($\frac{1}{4}$ cup in the morning and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup in the evening).



Seabird has a Temporary Skate Park at the Lacrosse Box!

The Family Development and the Youth Outreach Program started a skateboard outreach, to start skating with some of the Youth in the Community.

One day a week after school Robert skateboards with the Youth, he has been doing this since November. Which had led to the thought of getting a skate park in Seabird. Robert knows plenty of the skaters in the Community, most, are Youth who can't get a ride to Agassiz on a daily basis. They end up skating to Agassiz, which is not an issue- they do it all the time. So, his thought was to get one in Seabird.

"Since starting here, we've been connecting with Hippie Mike Industries for skate ramps, he has a skate shop and an indoor skate park, we've been using that space throughout the winter for skateboarding. We built a relationship with him, and talked to him about building some ramps for us, ramps that can withstand the rain, and the weather." Says Robert.

Robert said, "There is a core Youth that have the passion for skate boarding. I have noticed since the skateboard park, I have seen more new skateboarders and scooters. It has been cool to see kids I don't know skateboarding around or scootering around. In the last 2 weeks it's seems more Youth have started using the space."

Skating is a great hobby, it's a sport that can keep you active, also a lot of creative skill building. You need balance, it can be difficult.

There has been a sign created and placed at the skate park. It is a safety sign for the

Youth, to wear helmets, protection gear and to take care of the skate park. The idea is, that this is a space for the youth, in hopes that they take ownership over it. Keep it clean, take care of it.

Another thing about the park is, everything is movable. The ramps are really heavy, but you can move them around. Youth use their creativity and imagination, by setting up the ramps in different positions, to allow them to try different tricks. Robert didn't really think about that, but now that it's there, he says it is very cool.

What is also fascinating is not just for skateboarding, it is used for scootering as well.

The skate park will be there as long as it lasts at this point. Everything is movable so if the lacrosse box needs to be used for an event, it can be temporarily moved. Some of the stuff is really heavy, but will still fit through the gate, so it can be moved some other way.

You can only see like the head of someone hopping around in there. It's still a good idea for helmets and stuff, you can't force kids to wear safety. Robert knows he never wore a helmet when he was younger, he says "even a few years ago I didn't, until recently I almost hit my head one time and it's was like a wake up call. I do recommend kids to wear the safety equipement when they are with me, let them know the dangers that could possibly happen".

In the future, Seabird could work towards funding for a skate park. This is like a tester, to see how much interest there is in a skate park for the Youth in the Community. Will it be well used by the kids. This is a place for the local Youth to go, a place they can take ownership of, and take care of it with pride. Hopefully with that happening and it's respected, being used. One day, we could get into a concrete skate park. An actual established park. This is getting many more Youth out being active.

Seabird Youth

Seabird Youth, Nick Louis, heard about the skate park late March this year. He likes the skate park here in Seabird, its close and takes time from him having to go further out. The temporary one is nice right now, "the spot it is at is nice and has a great even ground, great place to try new tricks, with it where it is I like the location".

Nick likes skate boarding because it is fun learning, the way it feels rolling around, new tricks and the feeling you get when you land a trick, one that you practised for awhile. It is great to hang with your friends sharing the tricks you have learned. It is a great way to be social, out of the house, and you get to meet new people at parks.

He thinks it would be a great investment in the future getting a pernament skate park here in Seabird, he sees many new Youth using the park. The kids here in Seabird have been loving it. We all together have been taking care of the area, it is our own space.

Fire Restrictions to Reduce Wildfires

Wildfire season is apon us. As of June 22, 2021 we have already seen 337+ forest fires in BC with over 2,595 hectors burnt, 6 of which were human caused and 2 caused by lightening. The closest one at this time being in Hope BC.

How can we help protect against Wildfires?

- Follow the regulations, small camp/food fires only at this time.
- Keep a hose and/or water close on hand when you have a fire.
- Plan your evacuation route, with the whole family.
- DO NOT toss your cigarett butts out the window!
- Keep your lawn cut below 10 cm
- Keep fire wood, propane and gas tanks 10-30 meters from your home.
- Prune your trees so there is a 2 meter distance fron the ground to the lowest branches.
- Reduce flamable landscaping and trees around the exterior of your home.

To report a wildfire or irresponsible behaviour that could start a wildfire in British Columbia, please call **1 800 663-5555 or** (*5555 from a cell phone) as soon as possible.

Wildfires and Air Quality

Forest fire smoke is a complex and dynamic mixture of gases and very small particles that can irritate your breathing and cause inflammation.

Advice to minimize health effects:

If you have a chronic condition, have rescue medication (inhailers, allergy meds,...) on hand at all times and a plan to follow if your medication is not helping.

Look for indoor environments that might be less smoky, such as shopping malls, community centres and libraries.

Avoid physical exertion that causes heavy breathing.

Keep hydrated as it helps your body deal with inflammation.

If you are feeling unwell, remember you can call 8-1-1, for free provincial health information and advice.

If you or a loved one is experiencing a medical emergency, please call 9-1-1.

Cultural Arts Teacher

The Cultural Arts teacher highlights and interweaves Stó:lō and First Nations culture, language and ways of knowing throughout course content to pass on to students essential knowledge about cedar work, Salish weaving, beading, blankets, mask making and various North West Coast forms of art.

Cultural Support Worker

This position assists and supports all aspects of the cultural life of the school including sharing cultural knowledge, drumming, singing, and dancing. This position is also responsible for guiding and engaging families, children, youth, and community members in culture activities in a supportive and ethical manner. The Cultural Support Worker provides opportunities to share knowledge of Stó:lō culture, traditions, history, and protocols.

Education Assistant K4 - Grade 7

EA's will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, record keeping and data collection. At Seabird Island Community School, Education Assistants are valued members of the school community and they make a significant contribution to the work of the school and toward the education of all students.

Grade 4 Teacher - Maternity Coverage Ending June 30, 2022

The start date of this position is August 30, 2021 and will end June 30, 2022. This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School/High School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures.

Grade 5 Teacher

Student Mentor/ Counsellor

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill a position of Student Mentor and Counsellor for K-12 students. Under the supervision of school administration, the Special Education Teacher will work with Students who have a wide range of learning, mental, emotional, physical and learning disabilities. Special Ed. Assistant's adapt general education lessons and teach various subjects, such as reading, writing, and math, to students with mild and moderate disabilities. They also teach basic skills, such as literacy and communication techniques, to students with severe disabilities.

- 1 secondary student, Indigenous Canadian citizen min 15 years, up to 7 week term, 35 hrs per week, minimum wage, end date August 31, 2021

Under the direction of the Records Manager, the primary function of this position is to assist with general administrative Records Management duties such as but not limited to: scanning, data entry, photocopying, filing, inventory.

Government Affairs

Lands Research & Administration Assistant - Post Secondary

The Lands Research and Administration Assistant will support the Lands program staff, including but not limited to everyday tasks like filing, record keeping, report preparation, scheduling, and data entry.

Director of Inter-Government Affairs

The Inter-Government Affairs Director (Director) shall provide leadership and management expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically the Director shall be responsible to the ED for the efficient, effective and productive operation of intergovernmental affairs, providing research, actions and recommendations on First Nations, provincial and federal affairs with impact on Seabird Island Band rights and title.

The Director will be responsible for planning, organizing, directing, controlling and evaluating divisions responsible for First Nations governance, Aboriginal rights and title (AR&T), and the impacts of economic development on rights and title, culture, and land use.

Fisheries Advocacy & Habitat Lead

The Fisheries Advocacy and Habitat Lead will provide technical capacity to manage food, social and ceremonial fisheries, habitat preservation and restoration, and lobbying the issue of rights and title where required and with the agencies that need to hear the First Nations voice and stand. This will include traditional land use parameters, and criteria adherence for development and aquatic habitat restoration.

The position will build important relationships with a range of internal, external and comanagement partners across our region and with federal governing bodies. The position will include research, reporting, documenting, and liaising with staff and professional consultants, to meet deliverables like mitigation plans, community engagement, and environmental sustainability.

Strength of Claim and Tiyt Tribe History Research Project

Research Assistant, Level 1

A 3rd – 4th year student with historical research experience; researching, reviewing, analyzing, collecting, transcribing, and collecting relevent information. Working under supervision. Note taking of meetings, contributing information to a community profile and other task directed by supervisor.

Health & Social Development

(Youth) Elder Apprentice Term Ends June 30, 2021

The Elders Apprentice will be responsible for actively engaging and building a relationship with Elder(s). The purpose of the position is to create a symbiotic relationship between Youth and Elder where both are benefitting. The Elders apprentice will assist in reducing risk of social isolation for Seabird Island Elders. This position will help future generations have an understanding of the past so that it can be transitioned into the future. This is a temporary position that will end June 30, 2021

Chairside Assistant

The Chairside Assistant will greet and prepare patients for dental exams and procedures. The Chair Side Assistant will be trained to use a variety of dental equipment and machines and they will assist the Dentist during dental and oral procedures and instruct patients on postoperative and general oral health care. The Chair Side Assistant will also be responsible for cleaning, polishing, sterilizing and maintaining dental equipment, tools and instruments and ensuring necessary items are stocked.

Driving Instructor

The Driving Instructor is responsible for teaching students the rules of the road and the safe way to handle an automobile. This position will entail providing full service drivers training for students of varying ages and experiences who are looking to acquire their BC Driver's License or to acquire a higher class of license. Students will range in age from teenagers through to elders. Training will include practical sessions and should fully prepare the student for their knowledge and driven tests.

Elder's Mobility Program Coordinator

The Elders Mobility Program Coordinator is a role model for health and wellness, who is passionate about helping elders to pursue overall improvements in health through engagement in activity. This position will design, instruct, schedule and coordinate recreation programming for the elders. Working closely with the Fraser Health's Elders Day Program Coordinator, the Mobility Coordinator will implement impactful mobility programs that will engage elders, in all our partner communities, to participate in activities that benefit their mobility and social interactions.

Recreation Coordinator

The Recreation Coordinator is responsible for creating and leading fitness and recreation activities for the community. The Recreation Coordinator will consult with staff and community members to determine their needs and interests and establish activities in response to those needs. The Recreation Coordinator will report to the Director of Community Development. This is a part-time position of 15 hours per week.

Home Support Worker - on call

The role of the Health Care Aide is to support residents in general care duties, support in self care and medication management.

Nutritionist

The Nutritionist will be primarily responsible for creating, delivering, and implementing health initiatives across. Programs and initiatives will focus around improving the physical health of Community Members through increased physical activities and making healthy food choices. A focus for the education should include traditional teaching and education for traditional food, cooking/ preserving techniques, and healthy activities.

Case Manager

The primary goal of the Case Manager is to support residents with a caring and supported environment in which to address addictions and substance use. Through a variety of programs, the Case Manager will ensure that residents can access health, healing and other services and programs, through programming in the home and through broader community services, to address the underlying causes of addiction and substance use, and to make choices that are life sustaining and positive.

Cultural Coordinator

The Cultural Coordinator will assist with the development and delivery of community projects and programs that integrate Stó: lö traditional teachings and Seabird protocols. The Coordinator will work closely with the Sq'ep (Culture and Language) Committee, Elders' group, Seabird College Elders' Group, the Community School's Language and Cultural the Early Childhood Education Program, the Directors Team, and the Seabird Island Community Members to ensure that all Band programs and ventures remain culturally appropriate.

Director of Health

The Health Director shall provide leadership and management expertise, in accordance with Band policies. The Health Director is responsible for leadership, development and implementation of strategic and operational projects(s) and efficient, effective and productive operation of the overall Health Department.

The Director is responsible for providing direction and supervision to programs like the Doctors Office, Dental Office, Community Health Services, Child and Family Services and Mental Health. The Director will ensure that all services provided meet the licensing needs and are consistent with Health Canada and similar organizations requirements.

Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give community members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

Recovery Home Support Worker -On Call

The role of the Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Family Development Worker

This is a one year term contract. The Family Development Worker's primary goal is to support and connect families on their journey to wellness. Support and connection are provided to families who are experiencing mental health and child welfare challenges through one-onone coaching, individual, family, and community education and awareness activities, and referral to other health and social services agencies. This position provides service to families.

Genealogy Project Coordinator

The Genealogy Project Coordinator will work in a variety of settings such as office, home, and one on one with Elders in community. The successful candidate will provide guidance and knowledge to elders to facilitate the creation of a family tree binder to each elder that is interested. The Coordinator will work closely with Stó: Iō archives staff in order to fulfill components of the binder as well as BC archives and any other relevant resources.

Health Administrative Assistant - on call

The Administration Assistant will assist in support to the managers and supervisors of all departments, including but not limited to everyday tasks like filling, record keeping, report preparation, scheduling, creating newsletters and data entry.

Nutritionist Assistant - Maternity Coverage until March 31, 2022

The Nutritionist will be primarily responsible for creating, delivering, and implementing health initiatives across the band. This position will play a key role in educating people on what physical activities are best suited to their needs, as well as what healthy food choices are right for them and their family; including teaching healthy food selections and preparation.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Cook

The cook will be responsible for providing healthy, culturally appropriate meals and snacks to the clients of the Seabird Island Trauma Treatment Center. The cook prepares the menu for six week stay cohorts of ten clients, ensures ingredients are available, and cooks breakfast and lunch.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Cultural Trauma Therapist

The Cultural Trauma Therapist takes a lead role in delivering programming for trauma recovery using land-based methodology and First Nations culture, with an emphasis on cultural attachment, identity and seasonally appropriate activities on the land.

Trauma Treatment Centre -Trauma Counsellor

The Trauma Counselor is responsible for providing counseling to clients towards resolution of their trauma. Counselling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, in groups, and using circles to help clients process trauma during their intensive short stay (six weeks) at the Trauma Centre. The Trauma Counselor will facilitate daytime and evening individual and group sessions, 3 days each week.

Medical Office Assistant (MOA)

The Medical Office Assistant (MOA) will be responsible for providing front line support to employees and patients of the Medical Office. Support will be required primarily at mobile medical offices, but also at the Seabird Doctors Office

Recovery Home Support Worker

Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Youth Worker - Term until September 31, 2021

The Youth Worker is directly responsible for engaging Seabird Island Band youths (age 10 – 19) in youth-led programming. The core of this work will be done through the drop-in program but may also include secondary programs such as gender specific groups, recreational activities groups and outreach programs. Opportunities for youth include local and distant activities that are both large and small scale. The Youth Worker will also connect their clients with needed programs and services such as driver's education, health services, mentor-ships, and social supports.

This position requires a flexible schedule to meet the needs of the Band youth. Given the schedule of the client base (school), most shifts will be evenings and weekends. Position end date September 31, 2021.

Infrastructure

Check Point Security

The Checkpoint Security position aims to bolster the COVID-19 efforts Seabird Island Band has already taken. The position will assist with the overall safety of Seabird Island Band's checkpoints and property. A person in this position will instill a strong sense of safety to all community members and employees within Seabird Island Band. The Checkpoint Security position understands their role as an ambassador for Seabird Island Band and aims to provide a positive experience to all community members. The Checkpoint Security position functions within legislative requirements, regulations, policies, and procedures. The position contributes to the mission, vision, and beliefs of the Seabird Island Band.

Under the direction of the Housing Manager, the summer Maintenance Workers will be responsible for assisting in the maintenance and upkeep of Seabird Island Band. Will include clean-up, weed eating, brush cutting, minor landscaping.

We can only provide assistance to those with a status number.



With record temperatures this past week and continuing moving forward we need to be aware and take special care. People can get severely sick when they are not careful. In a heat wave, some of these illnesses can be dangerous; cause seizures, comas and even be life threatening.

Symptoms of heat-related illnesses

These are the top 4 heat health emergencies to keep an eye out for.

- **1. Heat cramps:** muscle spasms, sweating. Cool the body, stretch and drink plenty of fluids.
- 2. **Heat Rash:** tiny red bumps, likely in your armpits, groin, neck and/or elbows. Stay cool and dry.
- **3. Heat exhaustion:** sweating, pale, clammy, tired, week, lightheaded, nausea, headache
- 4. Heat Stroke: This is dangerous and can be life threatening; warm and dry skin, confused, agitated, fast pulse, nausea, and headache.
 Untreated it can cause seizures and comas.

If you or a family member/friend have heat stroke call 911 and try to cool the victim until help arrives. Go to a cool area, drink something, pack ice (or anything frozen) under your arms and between your legs to try to cool down. You need to cool down!

Check on your loved ones, and Elders, who live alone or don't have air conditioning.

Young kids and Elders can suffer from these effects faster and more severely.

Tips to avoid heat-related illnesses

- 1. Drink plenty of water and cool liquids to stay hydrated.
 - Avoid alcohol and caffeine
- 2. Stay out of the sun during hottest time of the day from 2 5 pm.
- 3. Eat more fruit and vegetables.
- 4. Wear light, loose fitting breathable clothing.
- 5. Soaking your feet in a bucket of cool water is refreshing and will cool you down.
- 6. Wet towels or bandannas on your head can also reduce your body temperature.
- 7. Apply sunscreen several times a day.- Sun-burnt, apply aloe often to reduce the pain and peeling. DO NOT POP BLISTERS!
- Use fans or air conditioning when possible.Use a fan in your bedrooms to help you sleep.
- 9. Keep your curtains closed until the sun has moved past, when the sun shines in it raises the temperature of your home.
- 10. Lower floors will be cooler, heat rises, hang out in the basement or bottom floor.
- 11. DO NOT USE items that conduct heat like your oven or lights.
- 12. DO NOT leave your children or pets in vehicles! It only takes a few minutes for the vehicle to heat up and cause heat stroke or worse.

GET YOUR SECOND DOSE OF COVIDE 19 VACCINE

When your 2nd dose of the vaccine is available PLEASE ENSURE YOU GET IT

Most vaccines require a second/booster dose to provide full protection

Monderna and Pfizer Covid 19 vaccines have been developed to provide full immunity only with a second dose

One dose only provides partial immunity that may not last as long

The second dose provides full immunity: 95% confidence that you will not become sick or require hospitalization

Protect others, even after your 2nd dose

It is very unlikely you will get sick from Covid 19 after your 2nd dose but you might still catch the virus

You likely won't know that you have the virus (you're not sick) but you can still pass it on to others

We must protect our vunerable community members
