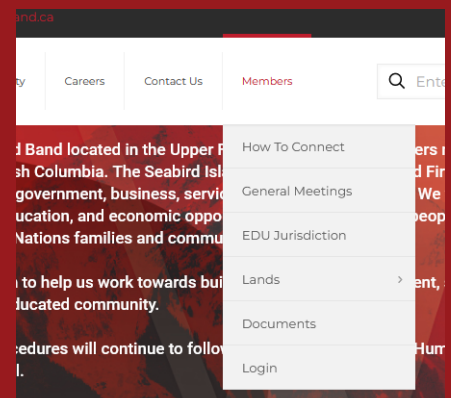

Seabird Island Community School - High School Students

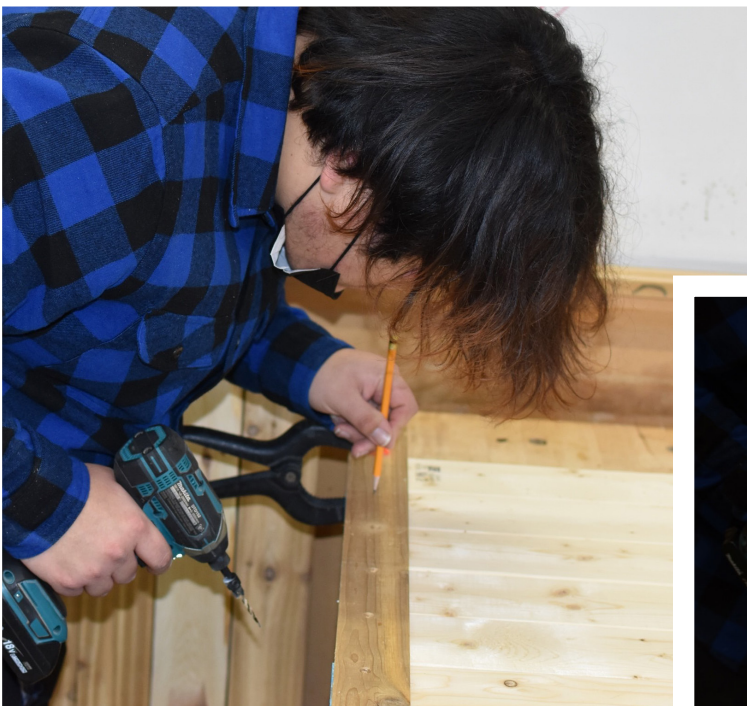
In this last semester, the Seabird Island students learned how to apply Scale from math class.

How do you explain a scale?

The scale is shown as the length in the drawing, then a colon (":"), then the matching length on the real thing. Example: a drawing has a scale of "1:10", so anything drawn with the size of "1" would have a size of "10" in the real world, so a measurement of 150 mm on the drawing would be 1500 mm in reality.

In Apprenticeship Math 12, last semester students learned how 'scale' is used in maps and in construction blueprints, and applied this knowledge to build large garden planter boxes for our school. The students did an excellent job applying their knowledge of measurement and geometry and demonstrated safe and professional behaviour in the wood shop.

Home Adaptations for Independence

Adapting your home in small ways can help you stay safer and more independent. Simply installing handrails and bathtub grab bars can help prevent falls and related injuries.

Home Adaptations for Independence helps low-income seniors and people with disabilities finance home modifications for accessible, safe and independent living. Eligible homeowners, renters and landlords can receive up to \$20,000 per home in the form of a forgivable loan.

I am here to support you and your children access health, social and education supports, including Jordan's Principle funding.

Jordan's Principle is named in memory of Jordan River Anderson, a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba. Jordan's Principle aims to ensure that all First Nations children living in Canada have access to the products, services and supports they need, when they need them.

To support First Nations children, families, and communities Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) BC Region has been working with First Nations partners to develop and implement a made-in-BC Jordan's Principle Enhanced Service Coordination model of care that puts First Nations children and families at the centre of service delivery.

As a Jordan's Principle Service Coordinator, I work with First Nations children and their families residing on reserve, in remote communities and those who live in urban settings. We will work together to identify and facilitate timely access to a whole range of federal and provincial health, social, and education products, services and supports to meet the child's needs. Learn more about on-reserve renovation, repair and renewal funding and financing opportunities for First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities in Canada. Everybody deserves a place to live that protects both their health and safety. So when major repairs are needed to bring on-reserve housing up to minimum health and safety standards, we're here to help.

- **Emergency Repair Program (ERP):** Funding to help low-income on-reserve home owners make emergency home repairs.
- **Home Adaptations for Seniors' Independence Program (HASI):** Funding to help on-reserve home owner seniors adapt their homes so they can keep living independently.
- **Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program (RRAP) – regular:** Funding for major repairs to improve the health and safety of on-reserve affordable housing.
 1. Rental Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program.
 2. Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program – Conversion.
 3. Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program – Secondary and Garden Suites

- **Preservation Funding for community housing:** Financial assistance to help housing providers complete preservation activities related to the sustainability of existing community housing projects.
- **Rental Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program (Rental RRAP):** Funding for mandatory repairs to improve the health and safety of on-reserve affordable housing.
- **Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program – Conversion (RRAP-C):** Funding to help create on-reserve affordable housing units from non-residential property.
- **Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program for Persons with Disabilities (RRAP-D):** Funding to help modify on-reserve housing to accommodate the needs of persons with disabilities.




Tem'elíle Midwifery means Salmonberry Time Midwifery. This is the traditional name given to our practice in the Halq'eméylem language. We are looking for a long-term, full-time practice partner to work primarily with Indigenous families in the beautiful Fraser Valley. Part time positions will also be considered. We would like to acknowledge the land on which we gather is the traditional, unceded territory of the Stó:lō, Coast Salish and Nlaka'pamux people who we are honored to journey with.

Tem'elíle Midwifery is a partnership between Seabird Island Health Centre and Stó:lō Service Agency Health Services. We attend an average of 60 births per year. Our primary site is Chilliwack General Hospital. Clinic sites are located in Seabird Island Health Centre, Sts'ailes Health Centre (Agassiz), and Stó:lō Service Agency Health Services (Chilliwack).

This is a chance to work collaboratively with the Seabird Island Maternal Child Health Team to improve maternity services and revitalize culture through pregnancy and birth. The Maternal Child Health Team engages with families prenatally until their children are 6yrs of age. The MCH team works with family doctors, nurses, Kwiyo:s' (home visitors), educators, and doulas to offer wrap around services in indigenous communities. We support both in-community and away-from-home families, those who identify as indigenous and those who choose primary care through our agencies. Our goal is to provide outreach midwifery that is culturally safe, trauma informed and family centered. Cultural humility is expected and experience working with the health impacts of intergenerational trauma is an asset. This is an opportunity for our families and our diverse team to grow together.

Early Childhood Education

Early Childhood Educator

The Educator will provide hands-on childcare to children in Seabird Island Band's Early Childhood Education Programs, in accordance with all childcare licensing requirements and the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management.

Health & Social Development

Child & Family Service Manager (CFSM)

The CFSM will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management and within the specifications and regulations of the Community Care Facility Act.

The CFSM plays a key role in the delivery and integrity of services in Child Protection, Family Support, Addictions Recovery, Social Work and Counselling, ensuring the mental, physical and spiritual safety of clients and client families.

Child Protection Program Coordinator

The Child Protection Program Coordinator will operate in accordance with philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Health Department. The primary goal is to coordinate the work being done within the Child Protection Team, including developing and delivering programs related to child protection prevention and implementation, administrating programs, client paperwork, tracking client activities and working with the team as directed.

Diabetes Nurse

The Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions within the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

Executive Assistant (EA) to Health Director

The EA shall provide administrative and executive secretarial duties in support of the Health and Social Development Department. This position assists with all matters of an immediate, administrative and task-oriented nature.

Family Development Worker

The Family Development Worker's primary goal is to support and connect families on their journey to wellness. Support and connection are provided to families who are experiencing mental health and child welfare challenges through one-on-one coaching, individual, family, and community education and awareness activities, and referral to other health and social services agencies. This position provides service to families.

Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN)

The LPN will be responsible for providing routine care, observing patients' health, assisting doctors and registered nurses and communicating with patients and their families. This will also include improving the quality of life of the client Community Members by assisting them to make healthier lifestyle choices; promote client dignity, independence, comfort, mobility, personal appearance and safety; and to provide support to the Community Health Nurse and/or Home and Community Care nurse.

Recovery Home Support Worker

The Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give Community Members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Trauma Counsellor

The Trauma Counsellor is responsible for providing counseling to clients towards resolution of their trauma. Counseling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, in groups, and using circles to help clients process trauma during their intensive short stay (six weeks) at the Trauma Centre. The Counsellor must be able to work from a trauma informed perspective, using several trauma therapy modalities. The Trauma Counsellor will facilitate daytime and evening individual and group sessions, 3 days each week.

Youth Worker

The Youth Worker is directly responsible for engaging Seabird Island Band youths (age 10 – 19) in youth-led programming. The core of this work will be done through the drop-in program but may also include secondary programs such as gender specific groups, recreational activities groups and outreach programs. The philosophy of this work is to build the skills and capacities of the youth to be leaders.

This position requires a flexible schedule to meet the needs of the Band youth. Given the schedule of the client base (school), most shifts will be evenings and weekends.

RN - Maternal Child Health

The RN shall provide care, leadership and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. The RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs.

Seabird Island would like to remind pet owners of the **“Seabird Island Dog Licensing and Animal Management Law ,2015”**

Part 6.2 Dogs and Cat control

6.2 No owner of a Dog or Cat shall permit or allow the Dog or Cat to:

(a) trespass on private property;

(b) be on private land where the dog or cat is not contained, either by a fence or gate, a tether, an enclosure, or other effective containment mechanism, unless the dog or cat is under the immediate control of a competent person;

(c) be in a public place unless the dog or cat is kept on a leash or tether not exceeding three meters in length and is under the immediate of a competent person; or

(d) be in a place that is designated as a No Dog or No Cat area or zone by a Seabird law or Council Resolution.

When you keep your dogs leashed while walking or on a run line at home, you are actively preventing potential incidents. Please help us keep the children safe.
