















Wildlife in our community, spring time is near



Managing our living space has an influence on the amount of human-wildlife conflict we experience. We recommend a yearly clean of your outdoor living space.

Manage Potential Food Sources

- Do not store garbage outdoors.
- Pick up fallen fruit.
- Remove bird feeders or hang them so that they are inaccessible to bears and other non-target species.
 - Do not let seed accumulate on the ground which will attract rodents and other species.
- Do not feed pets outdoors. If you must, only provide what they will consume immediately and bring the dishes inside.
- Keep your barbecue clean.

Remove Cover and Access

- Trim trees and shrubs so as to remove branches that could provide ground cover.
- Design your yard with clear sight lines. Don't have trees or shrubs that create blind spots that allow wildlife to hide.
- Avoid planting trees that produce fruit or nuts in bear country.
- Remove or limb trees that are adjacent to your home to prevent access points for arboreal animals (raccoons, rats or squirrels).

Manage Your Compost

Compost is a strong attractant for all types of animals; rats, raccoons, bears and many other types of animals. When this is not possible, make sure to keep your compost well-maintained with the following best practices:

- Use equal amounts of brown and green matter when adding to your compost.
- Turn the compost regularly, all the way to the bottom to avoid rats from nesting.
- Line the bottom of the compost with wire mesh to prevent rodents from digging in through the bottom.
- Use lime to help reduce the acidity and odour.
- Freeze abundant collections of fruit and add slowly to the compost.
- Do not throw food scraps without burying them in the compost.
- Never add meat, dairy, bones, or grease.

Blocking off Access Points

Small animals may seek shelter under decks, porches or even inside homes.

- Block all openings that are greater than 6 mm to exclude mice and rats with durable materials.
- Use 6 mm (1/4") wire mesh for vents where air flow is required.
- Repair cracks in foundations or footings.
- Remove unnecessary wood piles, heavy brush, unused sheds, or equipment.
- Keep the perimeter of your building clear of stored lumber or plantings.
- Store lumber and firewood on stands 30 to 45 cm off the ground.
- Prune overhead branches that may provide access to your balcony, roof and/or attic.
- Build sheds on concrete foundations.
- Do not store old cars or furniture outside.
- When excluding wildlife from under decks or sheds be sure to bury the mesh or metal sheeting and have it angle back outwards.
- When excluding wildlife from attics be sure to provide sufficient overlap of the mesh that is in turn covered.

Before Blocking Off Access

- Ensure no animals are inside an area you are about to close off.
- Use caution when animals are breeding and raising young.

School Bus Street Laws & Rules

Protecting our children and Youth as they wait for the bus and load on and off the bus is a priority! During this time, they may be coming out from behind blind spots and crossing the road. Safety around the bus stops and buses needs to be a top priority for everyone in the community.

VEHICLES:

It is illegal to pass a stopped school bus!

Did you know B.C. School districts are installing video cameras on the outside of their school buses to record evidence for the prosecution of drivers who fail to stop

when the red lights are flashing. The video is turned over to police for investigation and charges to be laid. Police issued 287 tickets for failing to stop for a school bus in 2021.

The Motor Vehicle Act requires drivers to stop when approaching a school bus with red lights flashing. This includes from any direction; drivers must pay more attention and think carefully as the red lights on the bus only face forward and back.

Proper stop distance when waiting for a stopped school bus is 20 meters that's a car and a half from the bus, in all directions.

Penalties for passing a stopped school bus:

- 3 demerit points and;
- First offence: fine of \$368 to \$2000;
- Possibly 30 days license suspension.



When the lights are flashing <u>red</u> and the STOP sign <u>signal</u> is engaged on the left side of the bus, do <u>NOT PASS</u>.

STUDENTS & OTHER PEDESTRIANS:

It is dangerous to be near the road as vehicles approach, including the school bus!

School Bus Safety Tips for Students

- **1. Get there early.** Be at the bus stop at least 5 minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.
- **2. Maintain a safe distance.** Stand or line up at least 6 feet away from the curb (side of the pavement) until the bus comes to a complete stop.
- 3. Remain visible at all times. When you need to cross the street, make sure the driver can see you. Be at least 10 feet in front of the bus and never walk behind the bus. Remember, if you can't see the bus driver's eyes, the driver can't see you!
- **4. Wait for the driver's go-ahead.** Make sure the bus stops, doors open,

and the driver invites you in, before you step forward and onto the bus.

- 5. Use the safety equipment.

 Handrails and seat belts are there for your safety. Use them while using the stairs and settling into your seat.
- 6. Be respectful. Don't make loud noises, stand up, put your head or arms out of the window, or engage in any activity that could distract the driver. Driving takes focus, your bus driver is working hard to get you to school safely, be kind and follow their instructions. When your bus driver is focusing on you, it takes his attention off the road hazards!

Nations Skate Youth

On January 21st, 2023, Youth from Seabird Island and surrounding communities were invited to join a skateboard workshop with Nations Skate Youth. Nations Skate Youth is a group of Indigenous skateboarders based out of Vancouver. There goal is to empower Indigenous Youth to embrace their right to self-determination through the positive impact of skateboarding.

Due to rain, the event happened at the gym at Camp Charis, which is located 10-minutes from Seabird. Camp Charis has a large space with pre-existing skateboard ramps and rails making it a perfect place to skateboard. The event began with drumming and singing from Gabriel Joe and Makayla Sam-Greene, followed by a welcome from Council







member Rodney Peters. Nations Skate Youth consists of Rosie Archie, Joe Buffalo, Dustin Henry, Tristan Henry, Taylor Ross-Robinson, and Cole Chalifoux. Each member shared where they are from and how their culture and skateboarding has impacted them. Afterwards, each kid and Youth received a skateboard and pair of skate shoes. These were donated by Menu Skate Shop in Vancouver.

Kids had the opportunity to learn from the professionals. Nations Skate Youth did an incredible job of teaching the beginners the basics of skateboarding. The older Youth, which consisted of many members of the Seabird Skate Crew (a small crew of dedicated skateboarders from Seabird Island and surrounding communities), were able to showcase their talent while skateboarding alongside the pros.





Overall, the event was a huge success. Youth and kids were set up with brand new skateboard gear. New skills were learned. Kids fell, got back up and continued to push themselves. Indigenous Youth got to see themselves represented in their passion. Tasty food from Camp Charis was handed out to everyone.

Many kids, at the end of the event, were asking when the next skateboard event will be. Stay tuned. The Seabird Youth program is working on it! In the meantime, do you know that the Seabird Hockey Box contains a bunch of skateboard ramps and rails? On a dry day, I encourage you to check it out. It's a great space to learn.



FNHA team members presented a power point with the description on what to do in an emergency when someone is none responsive from an opioid overdose. They had items from the kit laid out on each table for everyone to have hands on training. Everyone had the chance to prepare the needle and jab it into a stress ball for the real feel of how it is using the needle. This was a great training lesson as it gives you a great idea on what should be done and how

to do it, in an emergency state. There were volunteer demonstrations on what steps you need to do when you find someone unresponsive. How to properly roll them over and check to see if they are breathing. There were many great questions and people sharing their experiences of the training, ready to save a life when needed.







WSP wins contract for Seabird Island **Community and Cultural Centre**

SEABIRD ISLAND, B.C. — Seabird Island First Nation has entrusted WSP Global Inc. with the engineering services for its new community and cultural centre.

The new centre will be a 20,000-squarefoot, two-storey building in traditional longhouse style. It will feature timber posts, a second-floor mezzanine that overlooks a large gathering hall and First Nations art throughout, highlights a news release.

"Our team is excited for the opportunity to play a key role in the development of Seabird Island's new cultural centre, working with Patrick Stewart Architects to create a design that is a safe space for the community to gather and embrace the past, present and future of Seabird Island," said William Johnston, senior director of property and buildings with WSP, in the release.

The large gathering space will accommodate 600 people. There will be an Elders Room, a traditional Round Room, multi-purpose areas, a commercial community kitchen, offices and accessible amenities.

The centre will also serve as a temporary sheltering and marshal area in times of disaster and is being designed with sustainability goals and solar power in mind.







Health & Social Development

Better At Home Support Worker - on call

The Better at Home Program is designed to provide support to Community Members who need additional assistance to continue to reside at home in the community. The Labourer plays a key role in the Better at Home Program, providing the leg work to support the clients. Expect to perform a very wide variety of tasks to support a wide variety of clients. Assigned responsibilities include indoor and outdoor activities, including working in high and low temperatures, and inclement weather (rain, snow etc.). A successful Better at Home Labourer should prepare to work long physically demanding hours, will be required to provide their own clothing appropriate to the day's tasks and weather, and may be asked to provide their own personal safety equipment.

Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN)

The LPN's are responsible for providing routine care, observing patients' health, assisting doctors and registered nurses, and communicating with patients and their families. This will also include improving the quality of life of the client (Community Members) by assisting them to make healthier lifestyle choices; promote client dignity, independence, comfort, mobility, personal appearance, and safety. To also provide support to the Community Health Nurse (CHN) and /or Home and Community Care (HCC) nurse. These goals are to be achieved by using the professional public health knowledge.

Recovery Home Support Worker - Men's Home

The Residential Support Worker (RSW) promotes recovery, stabilization, and independence by providing comprehensive support to clients. The RSW supports and promotes the following: client safety, assisting with activities of daily living, and encouraging full participation in community activities included but not limited to cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving, and shopping.

Recovery Home Support Worker (RSW) - Women's Home

The Residential Support Worker (RSW) promotes recovery, stabilization, and independence by providing comprehensive support to clients. The RSW supports and promotes the following: client safety, assisting with activities of daily living, and encouraging full participation in community activities included but not limited to cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving, and shopping.

Registered Nurse (RN)

The RN shall provide care, leadership and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions with-in the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

Diabetes Nurse

The Registered Nurse (RN) shall provide care, leadership, and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically, the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions with-in the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

Health Care Assistant

The Health Care Assistant supports Clients and Elder's in their homes. We are looking for a compassionate Home Health Aide to assist in daily living and personal care services in patients homes in accordance with an established care plan.

Youth Worker - Drop in Program

The Youth Worker will be expected to develop strong and healthy relationships with Youth that will include in-depth discussions/workshops and support related to Youth issues such as suicide, sexual education, gender, mental health, drugs, alcohol, and developing healthy relationships. The Youth Worker will also connect their clients with needed programs and services such as driver's education, health services, mentorships, and social supports. The Youth Worker will have emotional intelligence and are trauma informed.

Education

Education Manager

The Education Manager will be responsible for post-secondary programs and options, in partnership with other post-secondary institutions and according to grant funding success. The EM will assist in education advocacy, compliance and reporting to the community, governing and funding bodies. The EM will play an integral role in planning, coordination and assistance in the delivery of post-secondary / continuing education / summer education programs; in the implementation and evaluation of changes and new initiatives in the education programs (Education Jurisdiction for example); and ensuring details for successful implementation have been considered, addressed and delivered.

Halq'eméylem Teacher

The Halq'eméylem Language Teacher is responsible for teaching students how to speak, understand, and write Seabird Islands' traditional language — Halq'eméylem. This teacher is an unrelenting advocate for language revitalization and works with staff and administration to promote the language throughout the school. You will be a member of an interdisciplinary, collaborative teaching team, liaising with other professionals, students, family members, and community to provide students with holistic, culturally focused education.

Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give Community Members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

Education Assistant Grade K4-12

The EA will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding.

Physical Education Teacher

The PE Teacher will provide students with developed knowledge and understanding of concepts of physical fitness, nutrition, and personal health. You'll present a wide variety of beginner to complex lessons that focus on sports games, physical fitness techniques, motivation, and engage students in much more than game play.

Receptionist - School on call

The Receptionist is responsible for a wide variety of clerical office duties in support of the School which Includes communicating office activities, greeting and screening students and parents, answering and transferring telephone calls.

Receptionist and Student Support

The Receptionist is responsible for a wide variety of clerical office duties in support of the School which Includes communicating office activities, greeting and screening students and parents, answering and transferring telephone calls.

Secondary & Post-Secondary Coordinator

The Secondary and Post-Secondary Coordinator is primarily responsible for the coordination, promotion, and administration of the Secondary and Post-Secondary Program.

Recruitment & Marketing Coordinator

The College Recruitment & Marketing Coordinator will provide recruitment, admissions, advising, and liaison services to attract prospective students into SIB College Programs.

Student Counsellor

The Student Counsellor will provide counselling and support for K-12 students. Essentially, your responsibility is to equip students with a variety of strategies for coping with life's challenges: help students establish their personal goals, guiding and helping children make action plans, motivate and inspire children, identifying and providing resources, referrals and follow-ups and providing assistance in crisis situations.

Teacher On Call (TOC)

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures. Individual contracts will govern the specific teaching assignment and number of hours.

Technology Education Teacher

The Technology Education Teacher will provide lessons and activities to help students develop knowledge and understanding of concepts of computers, as well as practical software use, and troubleshooting skills. The role is privy to sensitive, and private information and requires a high degree of integrity, accountability and confidentiality.

Economic Development

SQDC Administrative Assistant

The Administrative Assistant is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day administrative functions at SqDC. Furthermore, the Administrative Assistant is responsible for providing support to the management team at SqDC and acts as a communications liaison on an inter-departmental level.

The Administrative Assistant will play a critical role in strengthening the administrative functions necessary to providing outstanding financial reporting, data entry, and high levels of customer service. Records Coordinator

This position plans, coordinates and provides records / information management daily support in the development, implementation, and on-going maintenance of corporate information. The Records Coordinator must be responsible, accurate, proficient in the duties assigned, maintain a high degree of independent judgment and personal initiative. At this level, the person understands more than the basic techniques and technologies, has managed, or developed RM projects, and has knowledge of IM life-cycle concepts. In addition, the Practitioner may be developing specialty skills (e.g., analysis, auditing, warehousing, and application technologies) and may also have experience supervising other IM staff.

Proposal Writer

The Proposal Writer will provide expertise in seeking funding and grant opportunities, researching needs and writing proposals in areas aligned with Seabird Island strategic goals. The Proposal Writer will regularly be tasked with gathering data, soliciting input, and preparing briefings for the ED, Directors, Committees, and Chief and Council. Through this, the expectation will be that all bodies will be provided with the input and information that they require to make informed decisions and choices.

Executive

Senior Executive Assistant to Executive Director

The Senior Executive Assistant will provide support to the Executive Assistant to Chief & Council (C&C) and Executive Assistant/ Project Coordinator (EA/PC) to the ED. The primary purpose of this role is to work closely with senior management to ensure structure, coordination and organization in a way that enables the ED and C&C to maximize productivity while effectively delivering the most value to our members and staff along with developing crossprogram collaboration.

Bill S-3 changed the *Indian Act* to remove known sex-based inequities from the registration provisions.

More people are now entitled to register.

Why was the **Indian Act** changed?



When an entitled woman married a non-entitled man before 1985, she lost her right to registration. That loss also affected her descendants' rights to registration.

Bill S-3 was introduced to fix the impacts of this loss of status for all affected descendants.

You may now be entitled to register:



If you have a parent, grandparent or ancestor who was affected by sex-based inequities in the *Indian Act*.



If anyone from your immediate or extended family is registered or entitled to be registered.
