Here's the Real History of Mother's Day

Moms didn't come up with Mother's Day as an easy way to get pancakes in bed. And despite how it seems, card companies didn't invent it as a way to make a few (billion) bucks.

There's more to the history of Mother's Day than meets the eye. In addition to the history of the holiday, there's a whole lot of controversy. There are debates about who came up with the holiday first and lawsuits about who can use the name "Mother's Day." One of the founders tried to get the holiday scratched from the books, even after fighting to get it recognized as a national day. Besides all that, there's the question of where that pesky apostrophe goes.

Here are the secrets of Mother's Day and its history. And, for good measure, a few ideas on how to celebrate your own mom on the second Sunday of May.

The Birth of Mother's Day

The origin of Mother's Day as we know it took place in the early 1900s. A woman named Anna Jarvis started a campaign for an official holiday honoring mothers in 1905, the year her own mother died. The first larger-scale celebration of the holiday was in 1908, when Jarvis held a public memorial for her mother in her hometown of Grafton, West Virginia.

Over the next few years, Jarvis pushed to have the holiday officially recognized, and it was celebrated increasingly in more and more states around the U.S. Finally, in 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation making Mother's Day an official holiday, to take place the second Sunday of May.

Anna Jarvis put Mother's Day on the calendar as a day dedicated to expressing love and gratitude to mothers, acknowledging the sacrifices women make for their children. That's why she was determined to keep "Mother's" a singular possessive, as marked by the apostrophe before "s." Each family should celebrate its own mother, so that individual women across the country could feel the love, even in the midst of a broad celebration of motherhood.

Other Mother's Days

Before Anna Jarvis worked to get a day just for recognizing mothers, her own mom played an important role uniting women for good causes. Mama Jarvis also known as Ann Reeves Jarvis—cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the field during the Civil War, and in its aftermath she organized a "Mothers' Friendship Day," the goal of which was to foster reconciliation between former Union and Confederate soldiers by having them come together, along with mothers from both sides. With the senior Jarvis' lifelong focus on caring for children and promoting peace, it's no wonder her daughter fought for a day just for moms.

At around the same time Ann Reeves Jarvis was working with mothers in the spirit of peace, Julia Ward Howe, another activist—as well as abolitionist and suffragette—worked to have June 2 be celebrated as "Mother's Peace Day," and wrote a "Mother's Day Proclamation" calling on mothers to work toward world peace.

These women and others were responsible for precursors to Mother's Day in American culture, but celebrations of motherhood go back deeper than that. Such celebrations sometimes involved worship of a mother deity, such as the Goddess Isis in Ancient Egypt, or Cybele and Rhea in Ancient Greece. In other cases, celebrations were only tangentially about mothers: Mothering Sunday in

Emergency Preparedness Week

This year, Emergency Preparedness Week (EP Week) is May 2-8, 2021.

Emergency Preparedness Week is a national awareness initiative that has taken place annually since 1996. It is a collaborative event undertaken by provincial and territorial emergency management organizations supporting activities at the local level, in concert with Public Safety Canada and partners. EP Week encourages Canadians to take three simple steps to become better prepared to face a range of emergencies:

- Know the risks
- Make a plan
- Get an emergency kit

Using Technology During a Disaster

We rely on technology more and more to keep in touch with our family, friends, and colleagues with a click of a button. But what happens in the event of a major emergency? Suddenly these tools can become vital in helping you and your family deal get in touch and stay informed. So here are some tips on the use of technology in an emergency:

• If possible, use non-voice channels like text messaging, email or social media. These use less bandwidth than voice communications and may work even when phone service doesn't.

- If you must use a phone, keep your conversation brief and convey only vital information to emergency personnel and/or family. This will also conserve your phone's battery.
- Unable to complete a call? Wait 10 seconds before redialing to help reduce network congestion. Note, cordless phones rely on electricity and will not work during a power outage. If you have a landline, keep at least one corded phone in your home.
- Keep extra batteries or a charger for your mobile device in your emergency kit. Consider getting a solar-powered, crank, or vehicle phone charger. If you don't have a cell phone, keep a prepaid phone card in your emergency kit.
- Keep your contacts up to date on your phone, email and other channels. This will make it easier to reach important contacts, such as friends, family, neighbours, child's school, or insurance agent.
- If you have a smartphone, save your safe meeting location(s) on its mapping application.
- Conserve your smartphone's battery by reducing the screen's brightness, placing your phone in airplane mode, and closing apps you are not using. You never know how long a power outage will last!

Remember, in an emergency or to save a life, call 9-1-1 for help. You cannot currently text 9-1-1. If you are not experiencing an emergency, do not call 9-1-1. If your area offers 3-1-1 service or another information system, call that number for non-emergencies.

Facts About Emergency Preparedness

- 1. Roughly 5,000 earthquakes are recorded in Canada every year.
- The worldwide cost of natural disasters has skyrocketed from \$2 billion in the 1980s, to \$27 billion over the past decade.
- 3. Canada's first billion dollar disaster, the Saguenay flood of 1996, triggered a surge of water, rocks, trees and mud that forced 12,000 residents to evacuate their homes.
- 4. Some hailstones are the size of peas while others can be as big as baseballs.
- 5. Approximately 85% of Canadians agree that having an emergency kit is important in ensuring their and their family's safety, yet only 40% have prepared or bought an emergency kit. Complete yours on-line at www.GetPrepared.ca.
- 6. In 2011, flooding in Manitoba and Saskatchewan featured the highest water levels and flows in modern history. Over 11,000 residents were displaced from their homes.

- 7. Ice, branches or power lines can continue to break and fall for several hours after the end of an ice storm.
- The deadliest heat wave in Canadian history produced temperatures exceeding 44°C in Manitoba and Ontario in 1936. Rail lines and bridge girders twisted, sidewalks buckled, crops wilted and fruit baked on trees.
- 9. In 2007, the Prairies experienced 410 severe weather events including tornadoes, heavy rain, wind and hail, nearly double the yearly average of 221 events.
- 10. The coldest temperature reached in North America was –63°C, recorded in 1947 in Snag, Yukon.
- 11. The largest landslide in Canada involved 185 million m3 of material and created a 40m deep scar that covered the size of 80 city blocks in 1894 at Saint-Alban, Quebec.
- 12. Hurricanes are bigger and cause more widespread damage than tornadoes (a very large system can be up to 1,000 kilometres wide).
- One of the most destructive and disruptive storms in Canadian history was the 1998 ice storm in Eastern Canada causing hardship for 4 million people and costing \$3 billion. Power outages lasted for up to 4 weeks.
- 14. The June 23, 2010 earthquake in Val-des-Bois, Quebec produced the strongest shaking ever experienced in Ottawa and was felt as far away as Kentucky in the United States.
- 15. Using non-voice communication technology like text messaging, email, or social media instead of telephones takes up less bandwidth and helps reduce network congestion after an emergency.
- 16. At the end of October 2012, Hurricane Sandy devastated parts of the Caribbean and the northeast of the North American continent. When the hurricane made landfall in the United States it blended with a continental cold front forming a storm described as the "Monsterstorm" by the media.

Get an emergency kit!

Assemble one...

Basic emergency kit checklist:

- Water two litres of water per person per day (include small bottles)
- Food that won't spoil, such as canned food, energy bars and dried foods (replace once a year)
- Manual can opener
- Wind-up or battery-powered flashlight (and extra batteries)
- Wind-up or battery-powered radio (and extra batteries)
- First aid kit
- □ Extra keys for your car and house
- Cash, travellers' cheques and change
- Important family documents such as identification, insurance and bank records
- Emergency plan include a copy in your kit as well as contact information

Consider these additional emergency kit supplies:

- Two additional litres of water per person per day for cooking and cleaning
- Candles and matches or lighter (place in sturdy containers and do not burn unattended)
- □ Change of clothing and footwear for each household member
- □ Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each household member
- Toiletries and personal hygiene items
- □ Hand sanitizer, toilet paper and garbage bags
- Prepaid phone card, mobile phone charger
- Pet food and supplies
- Infant formula, baby food and supplies
- Activities for children like books, puzzles or toys
- Prescription medications, medical equipment

- □ Utensils, plates and cups
- Household chlorine bleach or water purifying tablets
- Basic tools (hammer, pliers, wrench, screwdrivers, work gloves, pocket knife)
- □ Small fuel-operated stove and fuel
- □ Whistle (to attract attention)
- Duct tape

Emergency Car Kit

- □ Food (That won't spoil, such as energy bars)
- Water (In plastic bottles so they won't break if frozen [change every six months])
- Blanket
- □ Extra clothing and shoes
- □ First aid kit (With seatbelt cutter)
- Small shovel, scraper and snow brush
- □ Candle in a deep can and matches
- Wind-up flashlight
- Whistle (In case you need to attract attention)
- □ Road maps
- Copy of your emergency plan and personal documents


Also keep these inside your trunk

- □ Sand, salt or cat litter (non clumping)
- □ Antifreeze/windshield washer fluid
- □ Tow rope
- Jumper cables
- □ Fire extinguisher
- □ Warning light or road flares

You can buy an emergency kit on-line and in stores across Canada. Canadian Red Cross kits can be purchased on its website. The Salvation Army also has a standard kit as well as a car kit available for purchase on its website.

Reminder All Grade 7-12 Students Allowances

1st student allowance payment will be December 15, 2020 September, October and November.

2nd student allowance payment will be March 15, 2021 December, January and February.

3rd student allowance payment will be June 30, 2021 March, April, May, June.

Student Allowances are as follows:

Grade 7-10\$10.00 per month= $\$100.^{00}$ per school year.Grade 11-12\$20.00 per month= $\$200.^{00}$ per school year.

Student allowances will be directly deposited for the students with bank accounts.

the United Kingdom, for example, was originally dedicated to the "Mother Church," but was later broadened to honor human mothers, too.

Around the world, Mother's Day is celebrated in a variety of ways and on different dates throughout the year, though many countries observe the holiday on the same day as the United States—proof of the powerful impact made by Anna Jarvis.

The Mother's Day Controversy

Even after Anna Jarvis was successful in getting Mother's Day made an official national holiday, she wasn't satisfied with the way that holiday was celebrated. She had teamed up with florists while she was lobbying to get the holiday recognized, even recommending a white carnation as the symbolic flower of Mother's Day.

However, in the first few years of the holiday's official existence, Jarvis observed as florists, candy-makers and cardmakers, and even charities used Mother's Day as a way to make an extra buck. The commercialization of Mother's Day, according to Jarvis, defeated the whole point of a holiday that was supposed to be about celebrating the personal, individual connection between a mother and her children.

From about 1920 onward, Jarvis fought hard to prevent businesses from profiting by means of Mother's Day cards, candy, flowers, and other gifts. Although she had fought to be recognized as the one and only "Mother of Mother's Day," she later lobbied to have the holiday removed from the calendar of national holidays, and spent piles of her own money in lawsuits against profiteers she saw as using the Mother's Day name in vain.

How to Celebrate Mother's Day Today

For most modern moms, going out to brunch or getting a Hallmark card and a fat bunch of flowers will do the trick. Sure, Anna Jarvis will roll her eyes, but if Mom's grateful, where's the real harm?

If you want to go the Anna Jarvis route, make your own card or write a letter to show your love to your mommy dearest. Need inspiration? Use a phrase involving the word "mother" or "mom" or a nice mom-centric quotation. Here's a good one:

There is no way to be a perfect mother, and a million ways to be a good one. – Jill Churchill

For some more free alternatives, you can pick up the phone (fun fact: Mother's Day marks the highest phone traffic of the year in the United States), take Mom for a walk (if you live nearby), or send over something sentimental, like pictures of animal moms with their cubs, pups, kits, or kids. Irresistible, right?

Most importantly, show your mom that she (and Grammarly) taught you well by putting the apostrophe in the right place when you write "Happy Mother's Day."

Daycare Supervisor

The Daycare Supervisor assumes responsibility for the day to day operations of the Early Childhood Education Department. The Supervisor is responsible for program planning, working effectively with staff, families and children, connecting with the community and ensuring adherence with licensing requirements. The Supervisor is responsible for providing leadership in keeping with the philosophy of the Early Learning and Child Care Program at Seabird Island.

We promote/organize many activities that help create awareness, understanding and respect of our culture. Speaking in the Halq'émeylêm language is one of many cultural activities that happens at the Daycare Center.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Cook

Reporting to the Child and Family Services Manager, the cook will be responsible for providing healthy, culturally appropriate meals and snacks to the clients of the Seabird Island Trauma Treatment Center. The cook prepares the menu for six week stay cohorts of ten clients, ensures ingredients are available, and cooks breakfast and lunch. The cook also does the preparation work for the evening meals and ensures the kitchen is clean and organized.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Cultural Trauma Therapist

Under the direction of the Child and Family Services Manager, the Cultural Trauma Therapist will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band.

The Cultural Trauma Therapist takes a lead role in delivering programming for trauma recovery using land-based methodology and First Nations culture, with an emphasis on cultural attachment, identity and seasonally appropriate activities on the land. The Cultural Trauma Therapist will work with individuals and groups during their short stay (six weeks) at the Trauma Centre to facilitate cultural awareness and attachment, using cultural attachment and identity as a means to heal trauma, approach addictions, family/ parenting/marital concerns, stress management, aging, etc.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Program Coordinator

Under the direction of the Health and Social Development Director and Child and Family Services Manager, the Program Coordinator will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management and within the specifications and regulations set by the Child and Family Services Manager.

The primary goal of the Program Coordinator is to ensure that the Trauma Treatment Center is run like an efficient treatment center, and that all clients are provided with a caring and learning environment in which to address their trauma. Through ensuring the Trauma center runs efficiently and cooperatively, the Program Coordinator will ensure that residents' are able to participate in activities which facilitate their healing from trauma.

Trauma Treatment Centre - Trauma Counsellor

The Trauma Counselor is responsible for providing counseling to clients towards resolution of their trauma. Counseling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, in groups, and using circles to help clients process trauma during their intensive short stay (six weeks) at the Trauma Centre. The counselor must be able to work from a trauma informed perspective, using several trauma therapy modalities. The Trauma Counselor will facilitate daytime and evening individual and group sessions, 3 days each week.

Education Assistant (EA) - On call

Under the supervision of school administration, the EA will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding.

Special Education Teacher

Work with Students who have a wide range of learning, mental, emotional, physical and learning disabilities. Special Ed. Assistant's adapt general education lessons and teach various subjects, such as reading, writing, and math, to students with mild and moderate disabilities. Teach basic skills, such as literacy and communication techniques, to students with severe disabilities.

Custodial Worker - On Call

The Custodian is responsible for performing custodial duties, minor maintenance and other miscellaneous duties in order to ensure that buildings and facilities are maintained in a healthy, safe and sanitary manner. Teacher On Call (TOC)

Individual contracts will govern the specific teaching assignment and number of hours.

Community Liaison

Provides support to communities to enhance culturally safe COVID-19 mitigation measures, community preparedness and response capacity. The Community Liaison role assists the leadership of the Sub-Region, Family, Nation, Community or Agency to which they are assigned to through effective engagement with community member, and health partners such as the First Nations Health Authority and Regional Health Authority (RHA). In addition, they use their local knowledge and context about the community, family units, structures and processes in the region to ensure that needs arising from the COVID-19 pandemic are being addressed in a manner that is relevant to the community context.

Early Childhood Educator I/T (Infant/Toddler)

Under the direction of the Daycare Supervisor, the Infant/Toddler Educator will provide hands-on childcare to children in Seabird Island Band's early childhood education programs, in accordance with all childcare licensing requirements and the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management.

Recovery Home Support Worker - On Call

The role of the Recovery Support Worker is to support clients in residence struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Project Officer - Term until March 31, 2022

This is term position to March 31, 2022. The Project Officer will assist research leads on a number of Natural Resources Canada funded projects, including traditional land use research; cumulative effects of corporate infrastructure, development, and climate on Seabird Island Band reserve; terrestrial and aquatic habitat restoration frameworks.

Driving Instructor - on call

The Driving Instructor is responsible for teaching students the rules of the road and the safe way to handle an automobile. This position will entail providing full service drivers training for students of varying ages and experiences who are looking to acquire their BC Driver's License or to acquire a higher class of license. Students will range in age from teenagers through to elders. Training will include practical sessions and should fully prepare the student for their knowledge and driven tests.

Elder's Mobility Program Coordinator

The Elders Mobility Program Coordinator is a role model for health and wellness, who is passionate about helping elders to pursue overall improvements in health through engagement in activity. This position will design, instruct, schedule and coordinate recreation programming for the elders. Working closely with the Fraser Health's Elders Day Program Coordinator, the Mobility Coordinator will implement impactful mobility programs that will engage elders, in all our partner communities, to participate in activities that benefit their mobility and social interactions.

Youth Worker - Term until September 31, 2021

The Youth Worker is directly responsible for engaging Seabird Island Band youths (age 10 – 19) in youth-led programming. The core of this work will be done through the drop-in program but may also include secondary programs such as gender specific groups, recreational activities groups and outreach programs



We can only provide assistance to those with a status number.


