Deacon Jamie's Christmas Story Christmas Story, join us for Christmas Mass in Seabird Island

Time sure flies! Another year has passed and time for another Christmas message.

This time of year is also the anniversary of my ordination as a Deacon and in January, it will already be four years that I've been active in First Nations Ministry here at Sts'ailes and Seabird Island.

This ministry I was called to, has become such a big part of Connie's and my life. We have come to know so many wonderful people in both communities and feel blessed to have gained so many new friends.

I have learned so much about the First Nation culture and local history. I wish everyone could have the opportunities Connie and I have had, to participate in celebrations on your land! My work has been so rewarding and there have been so many positive experiences. I have also been very challenged to reach out to people and offer what I can provide.

I have tried offering various faith and healing programs but have received very little response. This tells me that I need to reach out more and have conversations with people to make sure I am able to serve both communities better. My Spiritual Director keeps reminding me that the Creator did not call me to the First Nations Ministry to be "successful"; He called me to love the people. I always try to remember that.

I have shared with some of you, my journey to faith and to becoming a Deacon, but thought this year I would share with all of you:

I was raised by non-practicing Baptist parents. My father was mentally ill and seemed focused on not wanting me in his family. I was one of three children, but for some reason, I was the focus of his anger. I experienced emotional and physical abuse throughout my childhood until the Ministry of Children and

Families removed me from the home and put me in Foster care.

I eventually married, but very quickly I realized it was not a good marriage. We had two daughters who I love very much. Very soon after our marriage, my mother passed away after a long battle with cancer. My marriage limped along for several years, but when my daughters were teenagers, I realized I could not stay in the marriage any longer. At the same time I was experiencing difficulties with my work situation.

At this point in my life I was not a person of faith. I felt at the limit of being able to endure anymore hardship. I went for a walk by myself and for some reason I started to talk to the Creator. I to told him I was angry at him for the things I had faced in my life. He told me that night to "bring my children back to me". This changed my life.

A sense of peace came over me. I knew things were going to be alright and I hadn't felt that way before. My life did get better - I did get a divorce but my daughters chose to stay with me. Remembering what I heard from the Creator, I started looking into faith. My daughters came on the journey with me. We read the bible and completed catechism together. We were baptized together a year later. For the first time in my life I felt complete.

I became more active in the church. I received so much peace from my faith and wanted to give back to God. Connie came into my life and things just kept getting better. It was obvious to us we were meant to be together. We had similar world views and both had a deep connection with the Creator.

The Church announced they were going to start a Deacon program. Connie and I knew right away we needed to consider it. It would require 5 years of education and working full time at the same time. For some reason that didn't scare me. That's what happens when the spirit takes charge of your life.

On December 8, 2016 I was ordained. I was assigned to Sts'ailes and Seabird Island to replace Sister Kitty and Sister Therese. As I reflect on my ministry, I realize that the people in these communities were the Creator's children he wanted back. When God said "bring them back", he actually meant for me to show them the love that he has for all of us.

I believe He chose me to do this work because I have experienced childhood and adult trauma and fully understand that healing is difficult and it is actually a life long journey. I can't promise God his children will ever return to the church, but I can promise him I will do my best to love them in a way that he does.

Christmas is a special time of year because it reminds us there is hope for the future. I pray that you and your family may experience some special moments and a renewed hope this Christmas. God Bless!

If you are thinking about looking at the Christian Faith again or exploring for the first time, we will be sending out invitations to Alpha gatherings that will be offered in both communities in January and February. I am also always available to meet with you to answer any questions.

Seabird Island is working to ensure that they have current and up to date contact information for all Members. All of this information will remain confidential and will only be seen by two staff members that will work together.



All remaining unclaimed gift cards will revert back to Seabird Island Band.


Santa Photo Pick-up

Time to renew your Housing Application to remain on the waitlist.

Fully completed Housing Applications will only be accepted from November 15 at 8 a.m. to December 31 at 1 p.m.

Reminder: as per Housing Policy 2.5, any applications received after 1 p.m. on December 31st will be placed at the bottom of the waitlist.

Housing applications must be renewed before JANUARY 1st each year to remain on the list! Anyone who did not renew came off the list and must now reapply if interested.

Applications can be picked up and dropped off with the receptionist.

Housing must have a working phone number or email address.

Unfortunately, if we cannot contact you within 48 hours to offer you an available unit, we will move onto the next applicant.

Bin Rental: First 7 days – no charge. After 7 days - \$10/day

We require a \$600 deposit on the bin via Credit Card. All charges will be taken from the deposit, and any remaining amount will be returned via the card. If there is more owing, we will charge the card.

If you do not have a credit card, you may pay the \$600 deposit to Seabird Island Housing Dept.

Dump fees depend on what is put in the bin. If you just have household waste/items or wood (no drywall or insulation) \$120/metric tonne.

Rate with Drywall or insulation \$150/metric tonne. Drywall MUST be date stamped 1990 or newer or be accompanied by a letter of abatement stating the items are asbestos free.

We do not accept any hazardous waste: asbestos, vermiculite, paint, medical waste, oil or animal carcasses (No Liquids). Fuel surcharge (6.5%) will be added to your invoice





Ongoing Registrations

Education Director (ED)

The Director is responsible for researching, requesting and securing funding for all educational programming, which will be of key importance to the Education Department and will be a high priority. The Director will also be responsible for the professional management of all staff and financial resources available to the Department. This will require working closely with Departmental leadership (Principal, Vice Principals and the Human Resources Department).

Recreation Coordinator

The Recreation Coordinator is responsible for creating and leading fitness and recreation activities for the community. The Recreation Coordinator will consult with staff and Community Members to determine their needs and interests and establish activities in response to those needs. The Recreation Coordinator will report to the Director of Community Development. This is a part-time position of 15 hours per week.

Professional Cook Instructor

Seabird College is seeking a qualified teacher/instructor to provide Professional Cook 1 instruction to Adult Learners completing their Professional Cook 1 Industry Training Authority Program. The position will start in January. The successful candidate will be offered a one-year term, subject to sufficient student enrollment.

Life Skills Coach

The primary goal of the FLSC is to ensure that the families in the family home are supported in developing healthy parenting and other life skills, with attention to children's needs (helping with homework, structured mealtimes, healthy meals, bedtime routines etc.). The FLSC will ensure strong cultural values and manage programming that builds family bonds and resilience as well as a grounding in culture and community supports. Approaches to household chores, shopping and finances will also be modeled. The FLSC will ensure that families are directed to health, healing and other services and programs and encourage them to make choices that are nurturing to self and family. The Life skills Coach ensures that culture is embedded in all services

Health Policy and Quality Officer

The Health Policy and Quality Officer is responsible for Developing Health policies and procedures which are required for effective programming and meet the applicable standards. This officer also ensure that the Health Department has a quality assurance program that enables us to continue to achieve excellence Health service. Duties include identifying policy creation needs, developing policies with a culturally relevant perspective, assisting with strategic planning and professional practice developing program evaluation documents. This position is also responsible for the development of the Community Health Plan.

Executive Assistant

The Executive Assistant will perform direct administrative and professional support to the assigned director. The Executive Assistant is expected to provide support directly to assigned director, as well as to the individual employees or members.

IT Teacher

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School/High School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures.

Information Technology or IT Teachers must prepare lessons and activities that help students develop knowledge and understanding in concepts of computing, software use, troubleshooting, etc. The IT Teacher's daily tasks will depend mostly on the age and ability level of the students. Younger classrooms will focus on keyboarding and understanding basic word processing and other typical office programs, as well as Internet basics. With older students, more advanced classes in software use, data processing, hardware, and even web design.

Special Education Teacher

Under the supervision of school administration, the Special Education Teacher will work with Students who have a wide range of learning, mental, emotional, physical and learning disabilities. Special Ed. Assistant's adapt general education lessons and teach various subjects, such as reading, writing and math, to students with mild and moderate disabilities. They also teach basic skills, such as literacy and communication techniques, to students with severe disabilities.

Some Special Ed. Teachers will work with students who have physical and sensory disabilities, such as blindness and deafness and with students who are wheelchair-bound. They may also work with those who have autism spectrum disorders and emotional disorders, such as anxiety and depression.

Special Ed. Teachers help students with severe disabilities develop basic life skills, such as how to respond to questions and how to follow directions.

Dental Hygienist On-Call

Perform basic dental care tasks, mostly focused on keeping patients' teeth and gums clean and giving instruction in proper dental hygiene. The Dental Hygienist will work under the supervision of licensed Dentist. They are not qualified to make the same kind of diagnostic decisions or perform the same procedures as Dentists. Unlike Dential Assistants, who work directly with Dentists, Hygienists often see patients on their own and direct their own tasks.

Financial Analyst

The Finance Analyst, under direction of the Comptroller, is primarily responsible for analyzing and interpreting the Financial and statistical data of Seabird Island Band. The position must maintain confidentiality of all records.

Coordinates the flow of information from Contracts and Agreements to the various departments within Seabird Island Band. This includes reporting on a timely basis adhering to company policies and procedures as well as contractual requirements and ensuring all deadlines are met within the established time frames.

Certified Dental Assistant - Part Time/ On Call

The Certified Dental Assistant will greet and propare patients for dental exams and procedures. The Certified Dental Assistant will be trained to use a variety of dental equipment and they will assist the Dentist during dental and oral procedures and instruct patients on post-operative and general oral health care. The Certified Dental Assistant will also be responsible for maintaining dental equipment, sterilizing instruments and ensuring necessary items are stocked.

Early Childhood Education Cultural Worker

The Early Childhood Cultural Worker provides cultural programming, activities in all our Early Childhood Programs. To engage and teach our children, families and staff our language and cultural through age appropriate activities

The Executive Assistant will be privy to all business relations and information. It is expected that the ability to maintain the highest level of confidence is a priority. The nature of this position requires the Executive Assistant to have knowledge and the ability to access resources. It is also expected the Executive Assistant must be able to retain this information without allowing it to impact their treatment of those groups or individuals such as information pertaining to many Band/Community Members, staff members, and other stake holders.

Preschool/OOSC/Summer Program Supervisor

The Supervisor of Preschool, Out Of School Care and Summer Programs will assume responsibility for the day to day operations of the all three of these programs. The Supervisor is responsible for program planning in cooperation with other program staff, working effectively with staff, families and children, connecting with the community and ensuring adherence with licensing requirements. The Supervisor is responsible for providing leadership in keeping with the philosophy of the Early Learning and Child Care Program at Seabird Island

This position will have many responsibilities, including, being the lead teacher for the 3's preschool, supervising the 4's preschool, Out Of School Care (during school months) and Summer Program for the summer.

The Early Childhood Department plans and implements many activities that help create awareness, understanding and respect of our culture. Speaking in the Halq'eméylem language is one of many cultural activities that happens at the Early Childhood Center of Excellence. A willingness to learn Halq'eméylem is essential.

Student Mentor/ Counsellor

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill a position of Student Mentor and Counselor for K-12 students. Essentially, your responsibility is to equip students with a variety of strategies for coping with life's challenges: help students establish their personal goals, guiding and helping children make action plans, motivate and inspire children, identifying and providing resources, referrals and follow-ups and providing assistance in crisis situations. This will be a part time position requiring the person to work up to 5 hours on school days.

Intermediate Teacher

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures. Individual contracts will govern the specific teaching assignment and number of hours. The Salary is inclusive of all teaching duties as detailed below.

Membership Clerk

Reporting to the Director of Lands and Government Affairs, the Membership Clerk is responsible for maintaining the integrity of information contained with the Indian Registrar, while providing membership duties for the purpose of issuing Certificates of Indian Status (CIS) Cards to SIB and Community Members.

Recovery Home Support Worker

The role of the Residential Support Worker is to support residents struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Preschool Teacher

The Preschool Teacher position plays an integral role in the cultural and social development of our preschool children. Under the direction of the ECE Program Manager, the Preschool Teacher will help to guide children's behavior, ensure safety, assist children through their stages of development and prepare them for school.

Family Development Worker - Chawathil

The Family Development Worker's primary goal is to support and connect families on their journey to wellness. Support and connection are provided to families who are experiencing mental health and child welfare challenges through one-on-one coaching, individual, family, and community education and awareness activities, and referral to other health and social services agencies. This position provides service to families in Chawathil.

Health Administrative Assistant On Call

The Administrative Assistant will be responsible for taking care of the essential everyday tasks like filling, record keeping, report preparation, scheduling and data entry.

Home Care Aide

The Home Care Aide's primary goals are to improve the quality of life of the Seabird Island Band community members by assisting them to make healthier lifestyle choices; promote client dignity, independence, comfort, mobility, personal appearance and safety; and to provide support to the Community Health Nurse(s) (CHN) and/or Home and Community Care (HCC) Nurse. These goals are to be achieved by using the professional public health knowledge and skills within the Medicine Wheel practice model.
