
2022 CDHA Summit, Whitehorse YT

This year in recognition of the 2nd annual day at Truth and Reconciliation in Canada two of the dental team members, Stephanie Gillespie (Hygienist) and Cheryl Hick (Office Supervisor and CDA), were given the amazing opportunity to attend the Canadian Dental Hygienist Summit that was held in Whitehorse, YT. Whitehorse is located along the Yukon River on the traditional territory of the Kwanlin Dun First Nation and the Ta'an Kwach'an Council.

Day 1

We were welcomed by Regional Chief Kluane Adamek, Assembly of First Nations, Yukon Region.

The morning focused on Truth and Reconciliation with a presentation by Rose LeMay, CFNHM, CEO The Indigenous Reconciliation Group,



The rest of the day focused on Outpatient Addiction Programs with a presentation by Robert Tanguay, CMO, the Newly Institute.

Day 2

Highlights of Day 2 included an emotional presentation by Sheri McKinstry, a member of the Indigenous Dental Association of Canada, titled "Contemporary Indigenous Discourse in Dentistry", which touched on Jordon's Principle, Joyce's Principle, reconciliation and the Final Report of the National



Inquiry in Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. There was also a presentation on Unconscious Bias. It was helpful in recognizing biases within us and how they affect people who we interact with.

We also spent some time touring the vibrant city. We visited the Kwanlin Dun Cultural Centre where we learned about the Clan System, saw traditional regalia, and toured a medicine garden. We encountered a local Elder who gave us a tour of the Elders' lounge and shared a little bit of history for each of the Elders displayed in the room. As a thank you for her kindness we gave her a small gift of local art, cedar paddles and information about Seabird Island Band.

We were fortunate with our timing of our visit to the centre as we were present for the unveiling of the Witness Blanket. This is an art installation that has been on a coast-to-coast tour of Canada for 3 years, consisting of a cedar "blanket" woven with pieces of residential school history. It is composed of reclaimed items, letter, photos, stories, clothing, building fragments etc. given by survivors, families, band offices, friendship centres, governments and churches. It honours children who were forced into the residential school system in Canada. We also toured the SS Klondike National Historic site and the Eclipse Nordic Hot Springs. We attempted to catch a glimpse of the Aurora Borealis and set our alarms one night for 2 a.m. but didn't have any luck.

We are very grateful to Seabird Island Band for providing this opportunity to learn more about what Truth and Reconciliation means and how we can do better to lead reconciliation and challenge racism.



Our vision is to take control over Child Protection within our territory

What is Child Jurisdiction

Child Jurisdiction is having the right to control what happens to the children and families of Seabird Island.

Seabird Island: The community will support families and children to help protect and provide justice for them.

Bill C-92

Co-developed with Indigenous, provincial, and territorial partners, Bill C-92, An Act, respecting First Nations, Inuit and Métis children, Youth and families will finally enshrine into law, what Indigenous peoples across Canada have asked of governments for decades: to affirm and recognize their jurisdiction over child and family services.

Existing Laws and Policies

While we create our own policies and laws for Child Jurisdiction, we must remember to consider the existing laws and policies that are in the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedom.

Purpose of Bill C-92

- Affirm the inherent right of self-government, which includes jurisdiction in relation to child and family services.
- Set out principles applicable, on a national level, the provision of child and family services in relation to Indigenous Child.
- Contribute to the implementation of the United Nations
 Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.




