







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Lane Positioning

Emergency Preparedness - Winter Weather

A little winter preparation can save you time and money during the coldest months.


Winter weather can be dangerous for people who are unprepared. 70% of winter storm deaths are motor vehicle related and 1/4 of dealth's are the result of people caught in a storm.

You can prepare for winter weather conditions by following these helpful winter preparation tips.

FOR YOUR HOME

Since winter weather conditions can appear quickly, it's important to keep plenty of food and general supplies on hand.

- Clear rain gutters, disconnect and drain all outside hoses; shut off outside water valves, when possible.
- Insulate your walls and attics; caulk and weather-strip doors and windows.
- Repair roof leaks and cut away tree branches that could fall on the house.
- Wrap pipes in your basement or crawl spaces with foam insulators; consider a water heater blanket.
- If you have a fireplace, keep the flue closed when you're not using it.
- Make sure your furniture isn't blocking your heating vents.



FOR YOUR CAR

Winter weather conditions can make driving hazardous. It's important to be prepared if you're in your car when a disaster occurs.

When the temperatures start to drop, make sure these parts of your car are in tip-top shape:

- Make sure your antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, gas tank, oil and other fluids are full.
- Make sure your tires have enough tread; consider getting snow tires.
- Keep rock salt and sand in your trunk to help increase traction and to melt ice.
- Before you drive, do a good job of clearing snow off the top of the car, the headlights and the windows.
- Add your auto club, insurance agent or towing service phone numbers to your cell phone.
- Keep a cold-weather kit in your trunk: blankets, snacks, a first aid kit and a flashlight.

If you become trapped in your car when a storm arrives, remember:

- Remain in your vehicle where rescuers are more likely to find you.
- Run the engine and heater about 10 minutes every hour. Clear any snow from the exhaust pipe outside your car to reduce your chances of getting carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Move your body to maintain heat.
- Use maps, floor mats and seat covers for insulation.
- Take turns sleeping. Someone should always be awake to look for rescue crews.
- Drink fluids to avoid dehydration.
- Turn on the inside light at night so rescue crews can find you.
- If you are stranded in a remote area, stomp "SOS" or "HELP" in the snow.

FOR YOUR SAFETY

Two major medical emergencies cause deaths during winter weather conditions – frostbite and hypothermia. If you notice these symptoms, get medical help immediately.

Frostbite

Frozen body tissue and loss of feeling, and a white or pale appearance in the fingers, toes, ears and nose.

Seek medical attention right away. Affected areas should be slowly warmed.

Hypothermia

Confusion, drowsiness, exhaustion, rambling, memory loss, slurred speech and uncontrollable shivering.

Get medical attention immediately. If medical attention is unavailable, slowly warm the body's core, *not the arms or legs*. Get the patient into dry clothing, and warm the person up with blankets. Then give him warm – not hot – broth, beverages or food.

These winter weather tips are meant to help you make decisions that may reduce your risk. We hope that if you use some of them, you'll better protect your family and yourself.

Trees are a beautiful and beneficial part of the world around us. However, in spite of the most determined efforts, there are cases where trees should be removed.

Trees will slowly lose strength. As the tree weakens, it loses its ability to withstand the assault of storms or extra weight. Snow, ice, storms and winds can break off branches or bring down a tree. The fall of or even a branch can cause extensive damage to nearby houses, cars, or even people. Dangerous trees represent a tremendous potential liability and should be removed as soon as reasonably possible.

Both the acorns and leaves from oak trees can be poisonous to both children and adults when eaten in large quantities, according to Healthy Child Care. While acorns provide a great deal of nourishment for squirrels and other wild animals, excessive human consumption can lead to kidney damage with symptoms appearing anywhere from a few days to a few weeks after eating acorns.

In addition to the acorns' toxic nature, the small nut also poses a significant choking risk for small children, according to K-State Research and Extension. Because the acorn nut is exceedingly difficult to crack and even more time consuming to prepare for consumption, choking on the nuts, slipping on or being injured by the cracked, sharp shells of acorns and cleaning up the nuts before they seed are typically greater causes for concern with oak trees.

They are dangerous in winter weather

- Big trucks and school buses go through and find them to be obstructive
- Invasive species to the locals and the lands
- Roots of nearby trees can disturb the foundation of a house, or building and will begin to uproot and cause damage to the road and banks
- Squirrels take and spread acorns around areas that may not be planned for trees

Public Works, Housing & Custodial Garbage and Recycle Disposal



Reminder to Community Members:

1. Disposal of large garbage.

When: First Wednesday of the Month

Who to contact: Call Public Works to add your address to the monthly collection date.

How to dispose: Please place it out for pick-up on the scheduled collection date.

When you recycle your old mattress or furniture, it must be wrapped in plastic before being placed out for pick up. If it's not wrapped, it can't be recycled because it will not be accepted at the recycling processors wet materials are too heavy to handle safely.

Please use the plastic wrap from your new mattress to wrap the old one. Large plastic bags are also available for purchase at Home Depot, Canadian Tire and U-Haul.



- Accepted
- Appliances (e.g. stoves, dishwashers, washers and/or dryers, microwaves, coolers)
- Barbecues (remove lava rock, briquettes and/or propane tanks)

- Furniture (e.g couches, coffee tables, chairs, desks, dressers, TV stands, cabinets, drawers, tables, hutches, cribs, high chairs, entertainment centers)
- Mattresses (including headboard and frame)
- Outdoor furniture (e.g. chairs, patio tables, patio umbrellas)
- Small household goods, which must be in boxes or bundled and are reasonable size (one box or bundle is equal to one of the resident's four allotted items)
- Not Accepted
- ➤ Car bodies or parts
- ▶ Tree stumps
- ➤ Carpets
- ▶ Lumber
- Demolition materials (drywall, roofing, plumbing materials)
- Home Renovation materials (sinks, bathtubs, flooring, doors, windows)
- ▹ Hazardous waste
- ▹ Propane tanks
- ➤ Gas mowers

We do not want our staff to be picking up these large items due to safety reasons.

2. Maintenance of yard.

- Maintenance of Grounds
- Tenants are expected to maintain the grounds surrounding their Residence in a neat and tidy condition.
- > Tenant Maintenance of Grounds-Responsibilities
- A Tenant will not carry on, or suffer or permit to be carried on, in or upon the grounds surrounding

their residence anything which is noisy, unsightly, noxious, illegal or offensive, or which constitutes a nuisance or annoyance to the SIB or to any neighbouring properties or their occupants; and,

- A Tenant will not commit, suffer or permit any willful or voluntary waste, spoil, or destruction in or upon the grounds.
- Tenants will be required to control long grass and vines adjacent to their housing units and to ensure that nothing threatens the health and safety in their unit or the neighbouring units or community.
- If grounds become overgrown and unsafe or unsightly the Housing Department will cut the growth and charge the tenant for the service.



 Note: SIB is responsible for the condition of the driveways, septic system, water lines and cleanup of grounds after maintenance occurs.

3. Solid waste action plan is being reviewed

- The Housing and Public Works department is now reviewing the solid waste action plan to maintain effective waste management strategies to protect and enhance the environment for future generations.
- 4. How and when rent is paid.

• Payment of Rent - Procedure

 All tenants are required to make rental payments on the 1st day of each month (unless otherwise agreed upon by the Tenant and Housing Department, in writing)

- If rent is not received SIB will contact the tenant on the 2nd to arrange for a meeting with the tenant by the 15th of the month
- Failure to sign a Repayment Agreement by the 15th will result in the initiation of eviction proceedings

Reminder: RENT IS DUE ON OR BEFORE THE FIRST OF THE MONTH



- Rental payments can be made to the SIB Accounts Receivable office. There are 4 ways you can pay your rent. *Forms are available in the Foyer
- 1. ***Pre-Authorized Debit** easiest and most convenient way to pay rent
- 2. ***E-Transfer** Form must be completed and emailed before you send your transfer
- 3. **Debit** See Reception, they will connect you with a member of the Finance team
- 4. **Cash** See Reception, they will connect you with a member of the Finance team
- 5. **Cheque** See Reception, they will connect you with a member of the Finance team. *No third party cheques will be accepted
- SIB will add a charge of \$25.00 (subject to change) to the Tenant's account upon the receipt of a NSF cheque.
- Tenants will receive prompt assistance regarding rent payments from the Housing Department;

- If a tenant cannot pay the rent in full he/she may work with the Housing Manager and create a personalized Repayment Agreement which is binding and makes late payments due with future rental payments;
- Re-payments are scheduled pending income; higher pay or increase in pay means increase in arrears payments. Within reason and upon review of persons ability to pay. Long-term agreements will be reviewed annually. Focus is to get the tenant out of debt as soon as possible.
- If the tenant's rent payment is not made on or before the rent due date three times during a lease year, with or without a Repayment Agreement, the SIB may terminate the lease immediately (that is, on the second day of the month) and repossess the premises; and
- Rent must be paid in full; no partial, incomplete, or postdated cheques will be accepted without the knowledge and permission of the Housing Department.

Housing Committee Update

The Housing Committee has been meeting weekly since May 2018 to review and update Community Housing Policy.

Dedicated Committee Members are:

Hillary Andrew, Jenny Lee Billy, Octavius Billy, Cynthia McNeil, Janell Peters, Julie Peters, C. Stacy McNeil, C. Marcie Peters, C. Rod Peters, Gary Lister (Policy Analyst and minute taker).

We began right at the beginning of the policy with reviewing and updating the History of Housing at Seabird and have worked our way through to the end of the policy. Copies of the draft revision will be made available after the review has be completed. Please watch the newsletter for the release date. Some of the updates include (but not limited to):

- Clearly defined roles and responsibilities , Security & Damage Deposits and Access to Rental Units
- Inspections, Sublets, Transfer of Occupancy – Rental to Own units only and Rental Rates
- Payment of Rent, Non-Payment of Rent, Serving Notices and Maintenance Program
- Damages / Vandalism, Home Based Businesses, Pets and Appeals

5. Creating After-Hours Policy for Housing.

- Housing is now working on the After-Hours Policy for the 24/7 on-call service.
- This will be a service for our tenants in case there are any major housing issues.
- This is not an emergency line when you have an emergency please call 911.

6. Roads to be plowed first.

- The first areas to be plowed are the main roads Chowat, Sth'í:tsem, Seabird Island and Charles to make sure there is access for emergency vehicles and school busses. Second will be the Seabird Island Band Office, Seabird Island Community Schools, Seabird Island College, Seabird Island Daycare and Sqewqel Gas Bar so we can still provide our services to the Community. We will then start plowing the Elders streets.
- All tenants and homeowners, please remember it is your responsibility to shovel your walkways and your drive ways. Public works will maintain the roadways only during snowfall events.

JOB POSTINGS

Speech & Language Pathologist

The Speech & Language Pathologist provides a range of clinical services that focus on promoting communication, language and speech and that contribute to a client/patient's overall cognitive, physical, social and emotional well-being. The speech and language pathologist works closely with babies, children who have various levels of speech, language and communication problems.

On Call Education Assistant

Under the supervision of school administration the Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of children more rewarding. EAs will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, recording and data collection. At Seabird Island Community School Education Assistants are valued members of the school community and they make a significant contribution to the work of the school and toward the education of all students.

Speech and Language Assistant

The Speech and Language Assistant will work directly under licensed speech pathologists, aiding them in their daily responsibilities to provide a range of clinical services that focus on promoting communication, language and speech that contributes to a client/patient's overall cognitive, physical, social and emotional well-being.

High School Math Teacher

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill the position of a High School Math Teacher. We believe that a skillful math teacher with high expectations can move students toward a growth mindset. The successful candidate will be well versed in designing math lessons that engage curiosity, encourage practice and persistence and build confidence.

Dental Hygienist On-Call

The Dental Hygienist's perform basic dental care tasks, mostly focused on keeping patients' teeth and gums clean and giving instruction in proper dental hygiene. The Dental Hygienist will work under the supervision of licensed Dentist. They are not qualified to make the same kind of diagnostic decisions or perform the same procedures as Dentists. Unlike dental assistants, who work directly with dentists, hygienists often see patients on their own and direct their own tasks.

Teacher on Call (TOC)

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill various positions for On Call Teachers. As a TOC, you will work in the absence of a regular teacher to aid students in understanding a subject matter, as well as to provide skills required for programmed lessons and purposeful training for the assigned classroom.

Youth Initiatives Supervisor

The Youth Initiatives Supervisor will be responsible for engaging and advocating for Seabird Island community members to ensure equitable access to the youth initiatives funding. This role includes developing and overseeing programs associated with this funding such as the youth camps and the youth council. The Youth Initiative Supervisor will solicit and case manage individuals and families involved with this initiative to promote individual and family well-being. The Youth Initiatives Supervisor will also connect their clients with other programs and services such as driver's education, health services, mentor-ships, and social supports. The Youth Initiatives Supervisor will be expected to develop strong and healthy relationships with youth and their families so that they can advocate on their behalf.

As part of the Health Team, you may be expected to work up to 12 hours per day, not exceeding 80 hours per pay period at straight time.

Life Skills Coach

Under the direction of the Child/ Family Program Manager, the Family Life Skills Coach (FLSC) will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management and within the specifications and regulations of the Community Care Facility Act.

The primary goal of the FLSC is to ensure that the families in the family home are supported in developing healthy parenting and other life skills, with attention to children's needs (helping with homework, structured mealtimes, healthy meals, bedtime routines etc.). The FLSC will ensure strong cultural values, and manage programming that builds family bonds and resilience as well as a grounding in culture and community supports. Approaches to household chores, shopping and finances will also be modeled. The FLSC will ensure that families are directed to health, healing and other services and programs, and encourage them to make choices that are nurturing to self and family. The Life skills Coach ensures that culture is embedded in all services.

Custodian Leadhand

Under the direction of the Custodial Program Manager, the Custodial Leadhand oversees a team of custodial workers engaged in cleaning activities in buildings, facilities, offices and surrounding areas at various sites. The essential functions of the job include overseeing activities of custodial staff and participates in developing, updating and evaluating work and/or safety standards, policies and procedures. The Leadhand will also be responsible for cleaning activities, as well as training staff on proper procedures and efficient processes.

The Leadhand may assist in the facility maintenance plan, assignment of work schedules, evaluate subordinates' performance, coordinate, plan and supervise custodial operations for special events. The Leadhand will make regular field checks of assigned buildings to ensure completion of work assignments, inventory maintenance, and distribution of janitorial supplies and equipment. The Leadhand will immediately report any concerns regarding staff attendance, performance or behavior to the Custodial Program Manager for follow up.

Early Childhood Education Supervisor

The Early Childhood Education & Care Centre Supervisor assumes responsibility for the day to day operation of a fully licensed Child Care Centre for infants, toddlers and preschool age children. This includes providing a safe, welcoming, culturally rich and educational early childhood programs for the children and their families.

Under the direction of the Health Services Manager, the Elders Program Coordinator will be the main contact for Elders in developing and accessing programs and services to support their well-being. Term until February 28th, 2019 (May be extended).

Human Resources Coordinator
