



Election Code Referendum results



The results of the Ratification Vote regarding the Seabird Island Election Code are as follows:

- (a) the names of Seabird Island electors appeared on the List of Voters prepared and the number of Voters who were entitled to cast a vote was 657;
- (b) 134 votes were cast in the Ratification Vote by electors;
- (c) 87 votes were cast in favour of the Ballot Question;
- (d) 47 votes were cast against the Ballot Ouestion; and
- (e) 2 ballots were rejected.

The Seabird Island Election Code Referendum held on June 15, 2016 failed to reach the required number of, in favour (330) of votes necessary for it to pass.

Under INAC's Conversion to Community Election System Policy, the election code will be considered approved by the community if:

- 1. a majority of electors (50 percent + 1) vote by secret ballot to approve it; or
- 2. the community approves it in such other manner as the First Nation and the department may agree upon.

The election code referendum failed to achieve "1. a majority of electors (50 percent + 1) vote by secret ballot to approve it".

The community and Council can now decide if they wish to consider the second option "2. the community approves it in such other manner as the First Nation and the department may agree upon."

Honouring seven years of dedication, learning and growth

Family, friends, students and teachers conveyed their joy, pride, gratitude, love and encouragement to Seabird Island Community School's (SICS) grade 7 students as they embarked on a new journey in their education.

"Now you make that turn from childhood into young adulthood," said Principal Barbara White as she addressed the students.

Dressed in shawls and blankets, seventeen students waved goodbye to their elementary years in a ceremony that honoured their special journey.

The procession of graduates led students throughout the

hallways where they spent their childhood school years. Stopping at each classroom, the procession was joined by students from each of the lower grades before exiting the elementary school's main doors.

Symbolizing where the students began, a group of drummers from the Young Parents program, some as young as one and two, led the procession with drums in hand and culture beating in their hearts as they walked the graduates from the elementary school to the doors of the high school.

Graduates were welcomed with open arms by Principal Barbara White at the high school.

"This is such a great day for you, and for me," she said as she addressed the students. "You have gone through grade 7 and you are all here holding certificates – letting everybody know that you did it! I know some of you are nervous. Everyone was nervous when they graduated and went into high school in grade 8. That's normal and that's OK. You have tons of support. All of your teachers want you to succeed, and we will all work very hard to see you succeed."

Speaker Seraj Ward offered his own words of encouragement to the graduates.

"We can have a relationship

with the land and we can have a relationship with the life around us. But there are other teachings that we need to learn. As native people, we have a whole other world of knowledge and I encourage you, as you become young ladies and young men, seek that knowledge also - because it is that knowledge that defines who you are."

The ceremony, which began at 9 a.m. on June 15, finished with a few stops within the high school to familiarize students with their new classrooms while special guests from the Young Parents program celebrated in their own way – with a much deserved nap.

Having regular mammogram screenings has helped to reduce deaths from breast cancer in BC women by 25%.

Mammogram screenings are for women with no sign of a breast problem (see your health care provider immediately if you find a lump or any unusual changes in your breast).

By age 50, women should make mammogram screenings a part of their regular health routine and have them at least once every two years.

Mosquito control efforts take flight with Morrow BioScience Ltd.

The month of July is known for the pests that thrive in the warm, wet summer weather of the Fraser Valley.

So known for it, that the month of July is called Temqwa:l in Halqeméylem, which translates to "Mosquito Time".

Mosquitoes are small, midge-like flies that feed on the blood of various kinds of hosts, including mammals, often causing an irritating, itchy rash.

Much more serious is their role in spreading diseases. While passing from host to host, some mosquitoes can transmit harmful infections.

This year, using a helicopter owned by Morrow BioScience Ltd, Seabird Island's Mosquito Control program took to the skies to fight these nuisance pests at the source – in their breeding grounds.

"Knowing the low points of the land allows for timely larval control to occur which aids in the reduction of mosquito annoyance numbers. This became essential this season in particular with the warmer than average temperatures

causing an increase in early season Fraser River levels," explained Shaun Calver of Morrow BioScience, which began surveying Seabird Island in April.

Morrow BioScience, operating out of Rossland, BC, provides integrated pest management and control services. By identifying and targeting problem areas, they ensure that impact to the surrounding ecosystem is minimal.

Morrow treated larvae breeding sites with a bacterial agent called Bti, which is a naturally occurring bacterium that is non-toxic to humans but very toxic to mosquitoes when ingested during the larval stage.

So far, sites on Seabird Island have been treated four times since May with the helicopter being used in June to reach large, remote areas that would have been inaccessible on foot.

On June 9 larvae were found to be present in high densities on some of Seabird Island's properties.

"The larvae were found on the southernmost portion of their property contained within two separate channels. These channels were deemed to be too large to treat by hand."

As a result, an aerial application was conducted on these channels on June 15. The helicopter applied 185 kg of larvicide (equivalent to 10 bags) on the active

portion of the properties.

"Post treatment monitoring of the active areas was conducted, and the treatment was deemed successful," said Calver.

To assist the Band with keeping mosquito populations low, there are many things Community Members can do.

Mosquitoes grow to adulthood in standing or stagnant water – like buckets, pools and puddles. One small bucket of water can provide the perfect environment for hundreds of mosquito larvae to grow into adulthood.

So, Community Members are encouraged to walk through their properties and empty any objects that hold standing water, if they are able to.



Anyone with a Status Number can have the ambulance paid for by Health Canada as long as it's not an ICBC claim.

Ambulance bills – We can only help those with a status number, everyone else has to pay for their own unless it's an ICBC claim.

Unfortunately ambulance bills will not be covered if you have been incarcerated (in jail cell).
