Message from the Chief

"Since way back in the 60's we haven't had a run this bad. We don't know what's going on in the oceans," says Chief Clem Seymour about the fishing season.

The run is being called disastrous in the news and fishing has been closed for much of the regular season which has led to frustrations amongst First Nations, recreational and commercial fishermen.

"Everyone out there is pointing fingers at one another saying it's their fault. There are too many people making money off of it. That's a large part of the judicial review that we are beginning with the Department of Fisheries and Oceans," says the Chief.

Seabird Island and a few other Bands announced last month that they want to take a closer look at how the Department of Fisheries and Oceans manages chinook and how they have been managing fisheries overall.

Their management has created an imbalance for First Nations people.

"It makes it difficult and makes a lot of people angry. But we were very fortunate to get our dry rackers out there for a few days. The seasons haven't been very gentle to our salmon either."

The water was warm and heat records were being broken across BC throughout the summer. Warm waters make salmon more susceptible to predators, parasites and disease and the higher temperatures can cause mass fish die offs.

Sqéwqel Development Corporation has been working with a few government bodies regarding the Business Park and things are moving ahead slowly.

"They are working with the Department of Highways and Canadian Pacific Railway because they need a different kind of permit crossing - a commercial crossing to cross the CPR.

They will need to raise the highway out there so they can have big trucks turn there because they don't have enough room right now for commercial vehicles to get in and out of there."

Out with the old, in with the new(er)!

Clothing and toy donations flooded the gymnasium this month in anticipation of the Maternal Child Health program's annual Clothing Swap.

Clothing swaps are a great opportunity to swap clothing no longer being used for gently used items instead of throwing them away.

They are also fantastic for parents of growing children who can trade items that no longer fit.

Within minutes of the doors opening at 1:30 p.m., the room was filled with over 70 moms, dads, grandparents and children.

"We had lots of donations come in leading up to the Swap. Parents are very excited to take part," said Diana Phan of the Maternal Child Health Program.

Thousands of gently used items were up for grabs in the gymnasium. In total, eighteen tables were set-up to hold all of

the clothing, toys and books.

All of which had been donated to the Clothing Swap by Community Members and Pre and Post Natal clients who were invited to take part after their monthly Pre and Post Natal session.

To encourage donations, vouchers were offered in trade for donations.

"For each bag of items dropped off, they can take a bag of new items from any of the tables, including the toy and book tables," said Diana.

But those who didn't have anything to donate were also allowed to take part.

"You don't need to bring something in order to take something. Each person can take one bag, even if they didn't make a donation to the Swap."

Free Acupuncture Clinic comes to the Health Centre Sept. 19

For the first time, Seabird Island's Health Centre will be hosting a free acupuncture clinic at the Doctor's Office.

Acupuncture involves the insertion of extremely thin needles through your skin at strategic points on your body. A key component of traditional Chinese medicine, acupuncture is most commonly used to treat pain.

The clinic, run by the Tzu CHI Foundation, will be completely free. Tzu CHI has been offering monthly free clinics at Sumas First Nation for about a year.

Recently, they've begun reaching out to the First Nations Health Authority to offer more clinics to Bands who are looking to explore a more holistic care model.

Acupuncture is used mainly to relieve discomfort associated with a variety of diseases and conditions, including:

- Chemotherapy-induced and postoperative nausea and vomiting
- Dental pain
- Fibromyalgia
- Headaches, including tension and migraine headaches
- Labor pain
- Low back pain
- Neck pain
- Osteoarthritis
- Menstrual cramps

Welcome pole arrives at the Early Childhood Centre of Excellence

In a small ceremony at the Early Childhood Centre of Excellence, a new welcome pole was unveiled.

The pole, which arrived early August 31, now rests beside the entrance doors and features a wolf and a bear eating salmon.

The design was meant to honour the relationship between educators and children.

"We wanted something culturally relevant to help watch over our children," explains Chief Clem Seymour.

The Band also wanted the role and importance of Early Childhood Program Staff represented.

"The wolf looks after things and family values. The bear and salmon represents the staff in the Centre."

Known as the protector, the bear is one of the most powerful coastal animals. The bear symbolizes strength, family, courage and health.

The wolf represents loyalty, family ties, education, understanding and intelligence.

Work on the pole began last March after Seabird Island provided the materials and cedar to Mountain Institution, a medium security penitentiary in Agassiz, BC.

"It was carved by inmates as part of a program that helps them give back to communities," said Chief Seymour who has been working with Mountain Institution for the last 20 years.

These projects encourage them to connect with their culture, some for the first time, and offer them a way to give back.

Fishery Notice - Fisheries and Oceans Canada

Subject: FN0944-Salmon - Fraser River Salmon Update - Areas 11 to 29 - September 1, 2016

As a result of the smallest return of Fraser sockeye on record, the level of harvest already incurred and the uncertainty about the survival rate of sockeye that have been exposed to harmful environmental conditions within the Fraser River, there will be no food social and ceremonial or recreational fisheries directed on sockeye or any other salmon species which would result in sockeye mortalities in the immediate future.

Opportunities for selective chinook directed food, social and ceremonial fisheries are being considered for the September 17 time period which is generally when Fraser sockeye have cleared the lower Fraser on this cycle.

Recreational opportunities for chinook directed fisheries are also being considered beginning September 19 in the lower Fraser River. Earlier opening dates may be considered if the Whonnock test fishery sockeye catches drop to zero over three consecutive days and the Albion chum test fishery net also has no sockeye catch over 2 consecutive chum fishing days during the same time period indicating that sockeye migration has cleared the lower Fraser. (Note that the Albion chum net is fished on only on odd-numbered days in September).

For clarity, any fisheries occurring in this time period will be subject to selective fishing provisions normally implemented during the coho window closure.

Gill net fisheries will not be permitted during the coho window closure.



Buying local just got a bit closer to home

If you shopped at Agassiz Produce or Super Valu this summer, you might not have even realized that you've been purchasing produce grown by Sqéwqel Development Corporation.

Sqéwqel lettuce and beans have been on sale in Agassiz for weeks.

"They advertise them as local produce but they're from Seabird Island," says Business Officer, Trevor Morrison.

And they aren't the only ones carrying produce grown on Seabird Island.

"Produce Gone Wild in Chilliwack and Buy Low Foods in Hope also buy our produce."

This is the first year the Development Corporation planted food crops. They've also grown and sold their wheat crop, which was harvested by Sqéwqel in late August.

The whole crop was purchased by Fieldstone Organics in Armstrong, BC. Fieldstone Organics is a certified organic grain handling facility, benefiting local communities by providing delicious whole grains, legumes and seeds for bulk, wholesale and retail consumers.

Sqéwqel Development Corporation will be selling organic romaine and super frilly lettuce for \$3 or two for \$5 at the Seabird Island Band Office.
