

Lest we forget, veterans honoured at ceremony

The sun broke through the clouds on November 8 as students, teachers, Community Members and Elders led a procession from the School to the Band Office cenotaph in honour of National Aboriginal Veterans Day.

After two minutes of silence, twenty-two names rung out to the crowd of students, teachers, flag bearers, councillors, staff and dignitaries from the Royal Canadian Legion.

James Pettis, Joe Pettis, Noel Seymour, Harold Bobb, Raymond Bobb, Archie Charles, Benny Joe, Pete Peters, Lawrence Hope, Henry Charles, David Charles, Henry Pettis, Moses Louie, Art Andrew, William Andrew, Sandy McIntyre, Johnny Mack, Alfred Hope Jr., Ralph Louie, Joseph G. Pettis and Bobby Harris.

Commemorated on November 8, 2002, the Band's cenotaph serves as a reminder of those twenty-two men who served in World War I and II, the Navy, Militia and Home Guard, Vietnam and Military Training.

Through their courage and sacrifice, they have helped to ensure that we live in freedom and peace, while also fostering freedom and peace around the world. First celebrated in 1994, National Aboriginal Veterans Day commemorates Aboriginal veterans who fought for Canada.

The long line of the procession was led by four flag bearers, eight young drummers and singers, all students of Seabird Island Community School.

Two students from each grade were called upon to lay a wreath at the cenotaph before they returned to the School for a special Aboriginal Veterans Day assembly.

The Government of Canada invites Canadians to take part in acts of remembrance this year. Tag social media posts with #RememberThem to show how Canada remembers.

Successful Business Forum leads to Memorandum of Understanding

Dozens of attendees from across the province attended the 2nd Agassiz Harrison First Nations Business Forum at Harrison Hot Springs Resort last month.

Hosted by Sqéwqel Development Corporation, the Business Forum attracted delegates interested in building relationships with First Nations in the Fraser Valley.

Chief Clem Seymour and Development Corporation CEO, Brian Titus opened the Business Forum on the morning of October 24.

World-class presenters from organizations like West Coast Energy Fund, Canadian LNG, STANTEC and First Nations Finance Authority offered insight from first-hand experiences building partnerships and developing relationships with First Nations.

During the first day of the Business Forum, Ian Anderson, President of Kinder Morgan, offered a keynote address leading into a day of talks and panels discussing partnership opportunities with regard to pipeline construction. During the second day, dynamic speakers such as Moojan Azizi of REMAX Advantage and Janelle Dwyer of Mandell Pinder LLP, discussed commercial real estate and the impacts of the Vancouver market. The Forum closed with an innovative presentation from Chris Bush of Catalyst Agri-Innovations Society and set the tone for the next Business Forum.

The two-day event led to a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) being signed between Sqéwqel Development Corporation, BRITCO Manufacturing, Ironside Design Manufacturing, Stqó:ya Construction, Scarlet West Coast Security and NATS Nursery.

The agreement established a partnership between the companies and Sqéwqel in accordance with their intention of building a fair, equitable relationship characterized by cooperation and mutual respect, in preparation for the construction of the Trans Mountain Pipeline.

"MOUs such as this initiate the relationship building necessary for

business to recognize the rights and interests of Seabird and Stó:lō [people] to maximize our participation and benefit in upcoming opportunities," said Tyrone McNeil of Stqó:ya Construction.

The Memorandum provides a framework for furthering shared key interests, such as employment and business opportunities.

The Business Forum was created in partnership with Seabird Island, Cheam, Chawathil, Scowlitz, Shxw'owhamel and Sts'ailes.

Diabetes Centre of Excellence wins 2nd Canadian Diabetes Association award

Seabird Island is pleased to announce that our Diabetes Centre of Excellence has received an award from the Canadian Diabetes Association.

Dann Swann of the Mobile Diabetes team returned from Ontario with the award in early November.

"This award is presented every five years to centres that meet the high standards as set down by the Canadian Diabetes Association of Canada," said Dann.

The award was very much a team effort.

"Without the support of our Doctors, Nutrition team, Nurses and Policy Writer, Heather McDonald, this award would not have been possible."

The goal of the Standards Recognition Program is to recognize Diabetes Education Centres that offer high-quality self-management education supported by an inter-professional health-care team with specialized knowledge of diabetes, and best practice care that follows Canadian Diabetes Association's Clinical Practice Guidelines.

The Health Centre received its first Standards Recognition award in 2011.

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
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

Please submit ambulance bills as soon as you receive them. If the bill is more than 1 year old, ambulance costs will no longer be covered under the Non-Insured Health Benefits (NIHB). Anyone with a Status Number can have the ambulance paid for by Health Canada as long as it's not an ICBC claim.

Ambulance bills – We can only help those with a status number, everyone else has to pay for their own unless it's an ICBC claim.

Unfortunately ambulance bills will not be covered if you have been incarcerated (in jail cell).

Please take note that the Ambulance Billing in Victoria know when you have been incarcerated just by the address provided on the billing.

Please do not bring those in because we are unable to assist, as they will be denied and it will be the client's responsibility to pay.
