It was a sunny, hot weekend at Seabird Island - a first to be sure. The usual rains were replaced with summer weather. Not the only first for the weekend. This was the first year Seabird's Festival Committee booked fundraising groups to manage concessions.

"The Festival Committee's goal was to have more Member involvement and allow the community to take on aspects of the Festival," said Angie Chapman, Event Coordinator.

A total of 56 soccer teams and 11 war canoe teams came to compete at the Festival. This year we saw an increase in Youth canoe teams and overall Youth involvement in the races.

Elders visit the UBC Museum of Anthropology



In the early morning of May 30, Elders began their journey to the University of British Columbia (UBC) Museum of Anthropology.

Located in Vancouver, BC, the museum is renowned for its displays of world arts and cultures – in particular, its works by First Nations of the pacific northwest.

As well as being a major tourist destination, the museum is a research facility which teaches arts, anthropology, archeology, conservation and museum studies.

The museum houses 38,000 ethnographic and 535,000 archeological objects. During the trip, Elders learned about some new weavings that will be visiting the museum in November 2017.

The Elders viewed all items showcased at the museum including several that have been identified as Seabird artifacts, many of which were displayed in a special viewing room for the Elders.

They were very delighted to have such hospitality and guidance for the day. The tour was great and the Elders plan to go back to learn more.

Earlier in May, Elders enjoyed fun activities planned by the Elders College including brain teasers, crafting, social time and bingo.








How do I protect myself?

There are many ways to reduce your risk of getting tick bites:



- children (20-30% for people over 12) repellent with 10% DEET or less for Use DEET, but remember to pick a
