Farewell to Carolyne Neufeld as Seabird Health Director

Carolyne Neufeld is moving on, to become Executive Director of Aboriginal Health at Fraser Health. It has not been an easy decision, but she looks forward to doing as much for First Nations health across the Health Region as has been accomplished for Seabird and our surrounding communities. She was the first full time nurse at Seabird, and has now grown a department of more than 130 staff and programs that include the doctors' and dental clinics, community nursing, mental health, early childhood development, employment and income assistance, community services and the college. The recovery homes for people with substance use

issues, the family home for people putting the pieces back together, the early childhood development center, the health wing – these are all thanks to relationships with our partners in funding and service delivery and could not have been accomplished without a committed team effort.

What do you see for the future of Seabird? "I hope more and more people will get trained, get jobs, take on more and more things. Keep going, keep growing.

Say more about partnerships. "We need them. There are only 800 people on Seabird and to sustain any of

the services we have, you need to be servicing a bigger population. Through including other communities, we are providing 2-3 thousand people with a doctors' clinic, dentists, community health nurses, access to recovery homes... We partner with funding bodies and with other communities. "

What appeals to you about the position at Fraser Health? "My position at Fraser Health might be the opportunity to bring something to the whole area, to lobby for some services that I think are missing. Fraser Health partners with First Nations Health Authority to bring needed services to communities: I hope to build three way partnerships everywhere." To the community Carolyne would like to say the following: "I thank everyone for all the good words, all the shared experiences and kindness. I appreciate so many people for the times they stayed strong when it wasn't easy to stay strong. Seabird has great strength, I see it everywhere. All some people need is to have others believe in them, help people, and put your hand out to lift people up with positive things."

We will miss Carolyne's presence every day and look forward to her visits to Seabird in her new role as Executive Director of Aboriginal Health at Fraser Health.

Local Forest Fire

On Wednesday August 08, 2018 at 10:30 a.m. the Agassiz Fire Department was dispatched to a grass / brush fire along the roadside of the Lougheed Hwy just west of Ruby Creek. There were multiple spot fires located along the road allegedly caused due to a mechanical problem with a vehicle travelling west on the highway. The main fire was found to be just west of the Johnson Slough rest area on the west side of the Seabird bluffs. First arriving fire crews encountered an aggressive fast moving fire that was spreading up the hillside into the forest at a rapid rate. Immediate calls went out for mutual aid fire departments from Seabird Island and Popkum Fire Departments to assist. The BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) is the lead agency on the fire and is attacking the fire with 3 helicopters, 2 air tankers and numerous ground crews. The BCWS is back on site today working to gain control and extinguish the fire. Both the Seabird and Agassiz Fire Departments are supporting the BCWS as requested and needed.

At this time there is no danger to the Seabird Island community, although the smoke from the fire and other fires is creating poor air quality conditions in the Fraser Valley. The public is asked to stay clear of the area as it is an active fire zone with helicopters and air tankers working the fire.

Report on the status of B.C. First Nations languages 2018

We are excited to release the third edition of the First Peoples' Cultural Council's *Report on the Status of B.C.* First Nations Languages 2018. This report reveals that while the number of language learners continues to increase, there are still serious threats to language vitality with an ongoing loss of aging fluent speakers and challenges accessing language resources. While B.C. language revitalization efforts continue to face many challenges, there has also been positive progress with the development of federal language legislation, increased investment from the B.C. government, a growing interest in language revitalization, and an increasing number of people especially young people — who are learning and speaking their languages.

2018 Current Language Status from 177 of 203 First Nations Communities in B.C.

- There are 4,132 (3%) fluent speakers in B.C.
- Fluent speakers decreased by 1,157 (4,1%) since 2014.
- 52% of fluent speakers 65+ resulting in the decline of fluent speakers.
- Younger fluent speakers (ages 0-24) increased to 117 from 54 in 2014.
- There are 13,997 (10.2%) language learners, an increase from 9.1% in 2014.
- 78.1% of learners are under the age of 25.
- 24/34 B.C. languages have been partially documented on FirstVoices.com.

B.C.'s Unique Language Diversity

- B.C. has more than 50% of Canada's First Nations Languages.
- B.C. has 34 First Nations languages with 7 distinct, unrelated language families.
- There are 93+ dialects within the languages.
- There are 3 languages once spoken that are now sleeping.
- Languages Indigenous to other parts of Canada are also spoken in B.C.

Increase in Government Support

Truth & Reconciliation

<u>Commission's</u> (TRC) <u>Calls to</u> <u>Action</u> support language rights and revitalization work.

Federal language legislation is currently in development in consultation with First Nations.

In 2018, the B.C. government made a historic investment of \$50 million, over three years, to support language revitalization efforts across the province

We are encouraged that the 2018 report points to a growth in the number of young fluent speakers and learners in the province, but also see areas where more is needed for First Nations communities in their language revitalization efforts.

It's also important to note that this work will not happen overnight but will require stable, long-term investments in community-based revitalization programs to help turn the tide on Canada's dark colonial history of language suppression. Increased support is needed for immersive language programs at all age levels, for language recording and archiving, for strategic planning and for language programming in educational institutions.

As individuals, we can all consider the role we play in supporting language revitalization in B.C. by supporting language champions, requesting language programs in schools and communities, and advocating with all levels of government to support the TRC Calls to Action for language.

[Water for Fish] Water Shortage Strategies for First Nations

The FNFC is encouraging communities to <u>be proactive and</u> prepare to manage for low water flows connected to fisheries this summer. In conditions of extreme water shortage due to drought or water over-allocation, the BC Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) can implement one or more temporary regulatory tools under the *Water Sustainability Act* to protect aquatic ecosystems as well as water user rights and basic household needs.

"Fish Population Protection Orders" temporarily give priority to fish ahead of other water uses (except for basic household indoor needs). "Critical Environmental Flow Protection Orders" determine the volume of water flow in the stream below which significant or irreversible harm to the aquatic ecosystem of the stream is likely to occur. This volume of water is known as the "critical environmental flow threshold" and takes precedence over all water use licences issued under the WSA, regardless of their precedence or when they were issued. 

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School/High School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures. Music Teachers provide instruction in music performance and theory. Teachers can specialize in only one instrument or instruct on a range of different instruments.

Kindergarten Teacher

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill the position of a K4 teacher. We believe that kindergarten readiness requires indicators of success in social, emotional, physical, spiritual and cognitive domains. It also requires a prepatory information plan prior to admission to the formal kindergarten program to achieve the greatest success possible for each student.

Aboriginal Coordinator

Under the direction of the School Principal, this position is responsible for supporting, coordinating and contributing to education, training and services focused on Aboriginal learners, organizations and communities as well as other specific aboriginal activities. The coordinator works across the school in collaboration with Administration, parents, communities and students to promote attendance, student success, program completion and community relationships. The coordinator also has a significant role in parent engagement to foster learning approaches and outcomes reflective of School Literacy and Numeracy Programs, Aboriginal cultures and history and the Institute's program graduates' core competencies.

Grade 7 Teacher

We believe that a strong literacy and numeracy program that nurtures children's curiosity gives them the tools to successfully transition into high school from middle school. We are in search of a kind, patient, focused educator who understands student's motivations, encourages students to take calculated risks and has high expectations of our students.

School Cook

Responsible for preparing, cooking and serving food for school breakfast/lunch programs and special events organized and participated by Seabird School as instructed by the Principal / Vice Principal in accordance with current health, safety and hygiene legislation.

Halq'eméylem Teacher

Teach Halq'eméylem language courses to students from K-12. The successful candidate may also be expected to teach elective courses of their choice. The School has a strong emphasis of incorporating the traditional Halq'eméylem Language and Stó:lō Culture into the curriculum while meeting the academic needs of First Nation students.

School Secretary

Typically the first point of contact for the school and is often the heartbeat of the school office. The Secretary is the person behind every schedule, meeting and file contained in the school building; and often the keeper of all pertinent information relating to the administration of the school.

Learning Assistance Teacher

We believe that all children can learn, are capable and resilient. Our Learning Assistance/ Special Education teacher will have high expectations and constantly refine instructional practices to improve student outcomes. We strive to be a trauma informed school and our LA teacher is a critical part of our team helping to in an ideal position helping to create a safe, calm and loving environment within which all students can thrive.

Certified Dental Assistant

Greet and prepare patients for dental exams and procedures. The CDA will be trained to use a variety of dental equipment and they will assist the Dentist during dental and oral procedures and instruct patients on post-operative and general oral health care. This position will also be responsible for maintaining dental equipment, sterilizing instruments and ensuring necessary items are stocked and managing day-to-day office operations.

Many Voices One Mind Coordinator

A network of Aboriginal Early Childhood Development service providers from across the Fraser Region that works to achieve its vision by advancing common knowledge, shared experience and open communication amongst participating agencies across territories. Maximum of 35 hours per week, may involve days/evenings/weekends work. Must be willing to work a flexible schedule depending upon duties required.

Supported Child Development Program Consultant

Under the supervision of the Supported Child Care Supervisor, Supported Child Development Program Consultant will provide front line support to children with extra support needs to assist them to fully participate in a child care setting.

Administrative Assistant -Pre-employment Supports Program

The Seabird Employment and Social Development Center is providing an opportunity for a Pre-employment Supports Program (PESP) Administrative Assistant. Responsibilities will include answering phones, booking appointments for clients, file management, organizing, driving school administration and other clerical duties. This position will also require the successful applicant to be able to provide exceptional client and customer service; courteous, friendly, and professional assistance to clients from a broad demographic.

Manager - Employment & Social Development

Under the direction of the Health and Social Development Director, the Employment and Social Development Manager (ESDM) will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management. Programs (with their sub-programs) under the care and supervision of the ESDM include:

- Employment and Training Services
- Income Assistance (Basic Needs, Shelter, Special Needs, Child out of Parental Home)
- Social Development (including the Food Bank and Clothing depot)
- Seabird Island Driving School

College Administration Generalist

Under the direction of the College Registrar/ Data Management, the College Administration Generalist will provide support to and back up for the College Registrar / Data Manager as well as the Receptionist / Student Support positions of Seabird College, in accordance with various funding and accreditation bodies and the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management.

Computer Instructor

Seabird College is seeking a qualified teacher for a fixed term to provide computer and Microsoft Office instruction to adult learners. Computer Teacher will be responsible for teaching student's computer usage and typing skills at the college. They guide and assist students in their entire learning experience, including welcoming them to the class, creating a curriculum and presenting all class information. The Director will ensure that all services provided meet the licensing needs and are consistent with Health Canada and similar organizations requirements. The Director will ensure that all communities have access to efficient and quality health services. The position requires substantial operational and planning oversight as well as planning and health service delivery across all Communities.

Peer House Leader

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
