## Enbridge canvassing to Seabird homes and business which will take place between July 23 – 31, 2018.

Jesse from Enbridge will be coming around the community, along with a Band Member, in the near future. Discussing our pipeline infrastructure with residences, answering any questions they may have, discussing emergency preparedness, dialing before you dig and ensuring that our emergency contact info is kept up to date.

As per National Energy Board Regulations, Enbridge (formerly Spectra Energy) is required to consult with landowners and stakeholders in proximity to its natural gas transmission pipeline. The key points that will be discussed with Seabird Island residents are emergency preparedness, identification of the pipeline right-of-way and prescribed area, characteristics of natural gas, ground disturbance guidelines and upkeep of current emergency contact information. Residents will be asked if they have any questions and share my contact info so they can reach out should any questions arise in the future.



I will be handing out information packages that have a few brochures related to pipeline safety and emergency information. The packages include fridge magnets with our emergency contact number as well as some Enbridge-branded goodies.

## Students become Certified Specialists in Microsoft Office

Seabird College is happy to congratulate six students who recently completed the Data Management program offered as part of our Adult Dogwood program. Upon successful completion, students will receive 4 credits towards their Adult Dogwood. Data Management is an elective course which students are able to select when registering and covers the use and operation of all of the computer applications within Microsoft Office. The Office Suite includes Word, Excel, Powerpoint, Publisher, Access and Outlook.

The Data Management program welcomes all students, whether they are beginners or experts in using computers to sign up and complete the program. Students learn hands on in the Seabird College computer lab using Jasperactive, which is a Microsoft Office Learning and Validation system. It is an online tool which allows the students to learn at their own pace, complete assessments and the ability to personalize their own learning plans based on individual understanding and comprehension of course material. In using Jasperactive the students are able to complete lessons of various difficulty and complete validation exercises. At the end of each lesson plan, students have the choice to complete Microsoft Certification exams. There are varying levels of Microsoft Certification and we are happy to share that the students in the above photo, Michelle'lai Byrd, Joel Kelly and Donavan John have each attained Microsoft Office Specialist Certifications, additionally Joel Kelly and Donavan John continued further and attained Microsoft Office Specialist Master Certifications. Other students who have also completed Data Management, but

chose not to write the Certification exams include: Dee Eashappie, Kristopher Girioux and Genevieve Okeymow. We raise our hands and congratulate each and every one of our students on their hard work, dedication and achievements! 4. Users are required to supply their own dish soap, aprons and washing clothes.

## Why should I consider speaking up?

**Your story is important and gives you a voice.** Your story is your opportunity to help drive changes and make a positive difference in other people's health care experiences.



## Where do I start?

If you would like to share your story, we invite you to contact the local Chilliwack, Agassiz, Hope Leadership team at **604-795-4141, ext. 616975**. If you would like someone else to share your story, we will just need your signed permission for him or her to do so. Please complete and sign the Third Party Consent form on the next page and have your advocate present it to the local Leadership team.

Or, if you would feel more comfortable speaking to someone outside of the local team, you can always reach a team member from **Fraser Health Aboriginal Health** or the **Patient Care Quality Office** (see back of brochure for contact information).

## What would happen next?

The involved department or service would be asked to review and follow up on your health experience story. This would be done in partnership with our *Elder in Residence*. During this time, cultural, spiritual, and clinical resources may be offered to support you if needed.

To let you know your voice was heard and your story was listened to, the Site/Service Manager would then contact yourself (or your advocate) to share their findings and explain what actions, if any, were taken to improve the quality of care and services in our Health Service Areas.

## Third Party Consent

If you have asked someone else to share your story, your permission is needed. This form will need to be completed and signed by the patient/client/resident who received the care or service involved in the care quality complaint or compliment.

In accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act of BC, we cannot collect, use, retain or disclose a person's personal health information without his/her consent.

## Teacher on Call

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill various positions for On Call Teachers. As a TOC, you will work in the absence of a regular teacher to aid students in understanding a subject matter, as well as to provide skills required for programmed lessons and purposeful training for the assigned classroom.

## Music Teacher

This position involves the provision of instruction to students of Seabird Island Community School/High School and includes instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures. Music Teachers provide instruction in music performance and theory. Teachers can specialize in only one instrument or instruct on a range of different instruments.

## Kindergarten Teacher

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill the position of a K4 teacher. The coordinator works across the school in collaboration with Administration, parents, communities and students to promote attendance, student success, program completion and community relationships. The coordinator also has a significant role in parent engagement to foster learning approaches and outcomes reflective of School Literacy and Numeracy Programs, Aboriginal cultures and history and the Institute's program graduates' core competencies.

## Grade 7 Teacher

We believe that a strong literacy and numeracy program that nurtures children's curiosity gives them the tools to successfully transition into high school from middle school. We are in search of a kind, patient, focused educator who understands student's motivations, encourages students to take calculated risks and has high expectations of our students.

## School Cook

Responsible for preparing, cooking and serving food for school breakfast/lunch programs and special events organized and participated by Seabird School as instructed by the Principal / Vice Principal in accordance with current health, safety and hygiene legislation.

## Halq'eméylem Teacher

Teach Halq'eméylem language courses to students from K-12. The successful candidate may also be expected to teach elective courses of their choice. The School has a strong emphasis of incorporating the traditional Halq'eméylem Language and Stó:ló Culture into the curriculum while meeting the academic needs of First Nation students.

## School Secretary

Typically the first point of contact for the school and is often the heartbeat of the school office. The Secretary is the person behind every schedule, meeting and file contained in the school building; and often the keeper of all pertinent information relating to the administration of the school.

## Learning Assistance Teacher

We believe that all children can learn, are capable and resilient. Our Learning Assistance/Special Education teacher will have high expectations and constantly refine instructional practices to improve student outcomes. We strive to be a trauma informed school and our LA teacher is a critical part of our team helping to in an ideal position helping to create a safe, calm and loving environment within which all students can thrive.

## Certified Dental Assistant

Greet and prepare patients for dental exams and procedures. The CDA will be trained to use a variety of dental equipment and they will assist the Dentist during dental and oral procedures and instruct patients on post-operative and general oral health care. This position will also be responsible for maintaining dental equipment, sterilizing instruments and ensuring necessary items are stocked and managing day-to-day office operations.

## Many Voices One Mind Coordinator

A network of Aboriginal Early Childhood Development service providers from across the Fraser Region that works to achieve its vision by advancing common knowledge, shared experience and open communication amongst participating agencies across territories. Maximum of 35 hours per week, may involve days/evenings/weekends work. Must be willing to work a flexible schedule depending upon duties required.

## Supported Child Development Program Consultant

Under the supervision of the Supported Child Care Supervisor, Supported Child Development Program Consultant will provide front line support to children with extra support needs to assist them to fully participate in a child care setting.

Responsible for working with clients one-on-one and in small groups to assist them to overcome one or more barriers that are inhibiting their ability to gain employment. Clients will range from 19-24 and 25-49 years of age. The successful candidate will provide education, information and assistance to clients on all aspects of employment, education, training and life career planning. The Case Worker takes a hands on approach to assisting their clients in exploring careers and finding employment including building relationships with potential employers

## Manager - Employment & Social Development

Under the direction of the Health and Social Development Director, the Employment and Social Development Manager (ESDM) will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management. Programs (with their sub-programs) under the care and supervision of the ESDM include:

- Employment and Training Services
- Income Assistance (Basic Needs, Shelter, Special Needs, Child out of Parental Home)
- Social Development (including the Food Bank and Clothing depot)
- Seabird Island Driving School

## Registered Nurse

Under the direction and supervision of the Health Director, the RN shall provide care, leadership and expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically the Nurse is responsible for ensuring that timely health services are provided to all families that Seabird Island Health Programs serve. As with all positions with in the Health Department, the RN will be expected to support the success of other Health programs. This may include supporting Home and Community Care and providing other Nursing services in general.

## SWEP Opportunity - Administrative Assistants

Responsible for taking care of the essential everyday tasks like filling, record keeping, report preparation, scheduling and data entry.

## Residential Support Worker

The role of the Residential Support Worker is to support residents struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

## HR Generalist

The Human Resources (HR) Generalist is responsible for providing front-line support to Supervisors, Managers and Employees in assigned departments/programs. ## Building Maintenance Assistant

Assist the most complex and skilled building maintenance work and provides technical maintenance work. The Building Maintenance Assistant will support the Lead Building Maintenance worker repair buildings and facilities, installation and repair of electronic and mechanical equipment. This position is responsible for the effective and safe use of available materials and equipment. The employee is required to operate and maintain power tools, drive vehicles, climb ladders and perform physical activity. This position may require sufficient physical ability and mobility to work, stand and sit for prolonged periods of time. Worker must operate with a minimum of direct supervision. Regular attendance is required for this position.

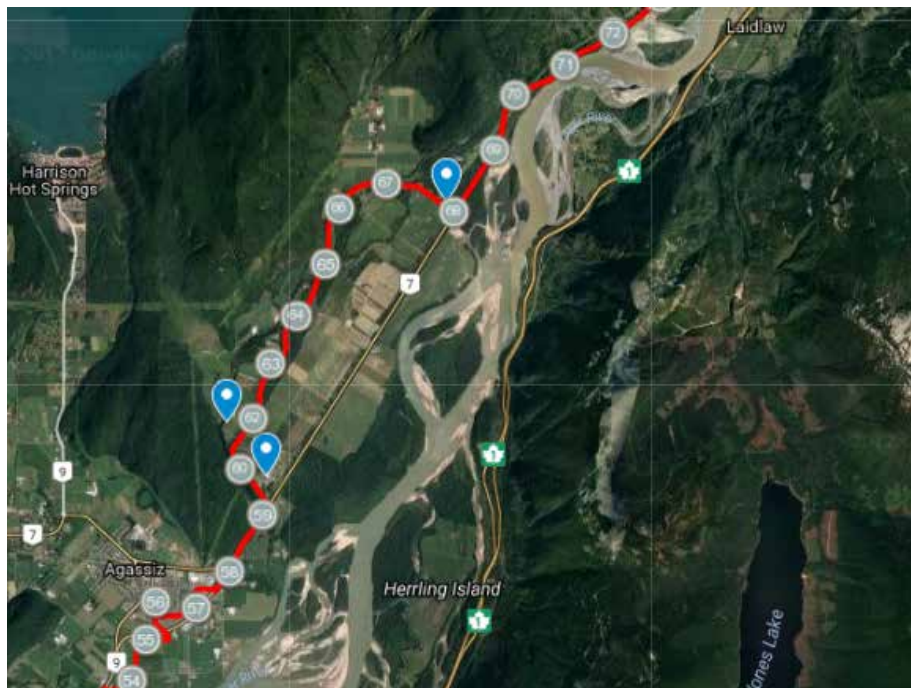
# BE THE RIDE
