Seabird Family Harrassed in Fraser River Incident

"Every year we deal with this. Disrespect for our indigenous rights and traditions, our sacred fishing grounds and our people." Stacy McNeil from Seabird Island posted on FaceBook, Saturday August 25, 2018.

Sports-fisherman decided to anchor their boat in front of grounds of an ancient fish camp where two indigenous women and three children were at the river cutting and cleaning fish. They were passing on historical teachings and gathering food for their families.

These sports-fisherman proceeded to get loud, obnoxious and indecent both verbally and physically. Exposing body parts, making lewd and racist comments. "According to them, we are dumb Indians who are stealing all of the fish, getting free fish and free gas" Stacy stated.

"We said, 'Hey, there's children here.' But instead of moving on one guy started peeing and told us to shut up." Stacy said the man made "disrespectful" and unwanted sexual comments while exposing himself. "As adults, we see this all the time.

But our kids were so confused and scared, with no idea why it was happening." The kids were all between 3 and 14 years old. Stacy said several families were working in the fish camp between Hope and Yale when the incident occurred at about 5 p.m. on August 25. She called the RCMP for assistance but they never showed up.

"As the abuse could be heard all down the river, three boats full of indigenous warriors came and circled the offenders, suggesting that they move along. The offenders continued to insult these men, calling them down." Following more racial slurs the group eventually got the sports-fisherman to pull anchor and move on. Stacy said she is proud the community was able to defuse the incident and there was no violence.

Marie Vander Heiden stated, "Those folks need to be asked by the courts to take some cultural awareness courses; while pointing out that First Nations' PAY taxes. For some reason, many believe that FN people pay zero tax and that is far from the truth. There

is very little opportunity to save on the tax and so many rules surrounding it. So, WE NEED PUBLIC AWARENESS and our Government should be pushing this."

Kathleen Martens, APTN News wrote, "A boatload of ignorant fishermen should be charged for drinking, urinating and exposing themselves to families, said an angling group working to reduce conflict on B.C.'s Fraser River."

"It's the worst incident reported this summer," said Rod Clapton, co-chair of the Fraser River Peacemakers. "They're idiots... As far as we're concerned they should be charged with indecent exposure if the information reported is accurate."

Clapton said he sent an email to the RCMP Monday asking them to find the five men caught on camera Saturday getting into a heated argument with members of the Union Bar First Nation.

"We're not going to let this go," Clapton added in a telephone interview with APTN News. "No member of the sport fishing community would excuse this. It's unacceptable."

Stó:lō Chief Ernie Crey, who co-chairs the Peacemakers group with Clapton, agreed. "We encourage people to share the river instead of getting into a fight over it," he said. Crey said misunderstandings crop up when anglers are unaware they've anchored in a traditional fishing hole.



On the Road with the Southern British Columbia Mobile Diabetes Team

Imagine flying in a fourseater float plane into a remote Indigenous Peoples community on the coast of British Columbia, or driving down a logging road over a mountain into a valley full of lush oldgrowth forests, rivers

and wildlife. Or how about encountering elk, bears and even a bull moose that thinks he is a cow? In fact, he is known as "Cowboy" because he visits this area every year and hangs around with a herd of cattle. This may sound like a National Geographic adventure television show, but it is not. This is a typical work week for the Seabird Island Mobile Diabetes Team when they are on the road.

The team consists of four people who provide diabetes education, blood tests and eye care services to indigenous communities throughout the lower part of the province and in some communities on Vancouver Island. The team consists of two nurses, a vision technician and a coordinator who all consult with an endocrinologist and an ophthalmologist.

This program started in 2009 when the team was given a GMC Yukon XL, some laboratory and ophthalmology equipment, and were told to make it work. The mandate was to provide diabetes services, education and vision screening to on-reserve Indigenous Peoples in approximately 85 communities across the province at no cost to them. The team's funding now comes from the First Nations Health Authority because of the Triparte Agreement that was signed in 2007 when First Nations in British Columbia decided to take greater control over their own health care. Part of that agreement was to look at ways to deal with the epidemic of type 2 diabetes in First Nations communities in a culturally sensitive way.

The team travels to communities by truck or sometimes must fly in if the community is inaccessible by road. As a team, we transport sophisticated laboratory equipment consisting of two Piccolo chemistry analyzers, two Siemens diabetes care analyzers, and other diabetes care-related equipment. Also along for the ride is a Topcon non-mydriatic retinal camera, a Reichert Tono-Pen, and various other equipment and accessories. The nurses can do a complete lipid panel and measure liver function, estimated glomerular filtration rate (eGFR), and urine albumin-to-creatinine ratio (ACR) as well as glycated hemoglobin (A1C). Before doing

these tests, the nurse does quality control tests on the analyzers so that accurate results can be guaranteed.

When the team arrives in a community, the equipment is set up and prepared for consultations with up to 10 clients per day. Each examination, including blood work, blood pressure readings and diabetes education, takes approximately half an hour or more, depending on the complexity of the case. Obtaining the blood sample is relatively easy and only involves a capillary fingertip blood sample for A1C, lipid and kidney panels. It takes 15 minutes to obtain the lipid and kidney results, and less time for the A1C and ACR. The nurse shares any abnormal results with the client and recommends that they see their general practitioner for follow up. Following the clinic visit, a report is produced (completed online), indicating where there are recommendations for possible treatment changes. These recommendations are reviewed by the endocrinologist, and the report is faxed to the client's general practitioner for follow up once everything has been reviewed.

After the client is finished seeing the nurse for their bloodwork, they see the vision technician for his/her eye examination. The eye examination starts with a quick visual acuity check and eye pressure readings. The client's eyes are then dilated and retinal photos are taken to determine if retinopathy or other eye diseases are present. These photos are then sent to the ophthalmologist for assessment. If treatment is required, this information is sent to the client's general practitioner for implementation.

In the nine-year history of this program, the team has had close to 2,000 client visits, most of which were people living with pre-existing diabetes. Most clients return in the following years to see the team. The team then reviews any changes that may have occurred to their treatment, recommends ways to improve their glycemic control and praises them for changes they may have made.

A screening component has been added to the program that involves identifying pre-diabetes or new diagnoses of type 2 diabetes for high-risk individuals identified by the community health staff. The service provides a safe alternative for clients who feel uneasy leaving their communities to have blood tests performed. This is also more convenient for clients living in remote villages who would have to travel great distances to get bloodwork done.

Over the years, the team has seen many success stories, and are seeing improved outcomes from the community visits. As time moves forward, the team hopes to continue this valuable service, and will continue to work to improve the lives of people with diabetes and to prevent new cases.

Community vanadalism affects you, your family, friends and the environment!

The time, money and efforts it takes to repair vandalism in the community effect you and may impair services you may need in the future. The money the community will have to fork out to pay for the repairs from vandalism will come from other budgets and could effect the future of the budget for certain programs. The community could be looked on poorly, effecting the future of the community, this directly effects future revenues for the community and your programs and services.

More than the effects to the community organization(s) you are hurting yourself, your friends and your family members! Everyone is effected, even animals and the environment. Nests could be wrecked, litter might kill tinny plants and organisms.

The effects of crime can also last for a long time and it doesn't depend on how 'serious' the crime was. Some people cope really well with the most horrific crimes while others can be very distressed by a more minor incident. After you experience a crime you may feel angry, upset, physically sick, depression, anxiety and post traumatic stress.

Effects of Vandalism

There are many young and older people who cause Criminal Damage deliberately. They may get angry with someone and scratch their car in revenge, or they may set fire to rubbish in a bin because they thought it was cool. Others just cause damage for the sake of it and might snap off a car aerial for the fun of it. When you damage something that is not yours it is called Criminal Damage!

Remember how others may feel if you damage their property and learn to take responsibility for your actions - this means you need to be aware of the damage that you could cause before you do something and try to stop it.

Damage of other people's property is called Criminal Damage because you could get in trouble with the police as it is a crime. You could be arrested and depending on how bad the Criminal Damage was you could be in serious trouble. Also your parents and school would be told.



Teachers can specialize in only one instrument or instruct on a range of different instruments.

Grade 7 Teacher

We believe that a strong literacy and numeracy program that nurtures children's curiosity gives them the tools to successfully transition into high school from middle school. We are in search of a kind, patient, focused educator who understands student's motivations, encourages students to take calculated risks and has high expectations of our students.

Physical Education Teacher

Seabird Island Community School is seeking to fill the position of a K-12 full time P.E. teacher. The successful candidate would be a certified teacher with a specialization in Physical Education in the province of British Columbia, who is committed to personal health and is a role model for our students in promoting healthy activities and good nutrition. The successful candidate must enjoy participating with K-12 children in athletic activities.

Halq'eméylem Teacher

Teach Halq'eméylem language courses to students from K-12. The successful candidate may also be expected to teach elective courses of their choice. The School has a strong emphasis of incorporating the traditional Halq'eméylem Language and Stó:lō Culture into the curriculum while meeting the academic needs of First Nation students.

School Bus Driver

The School Bus Driver is responsible for the safe transportation of students on the assigned route to and from school.

Learning Assistance Teacher

We believe that all children can learn, are capable and resilient. Our Learning Assistance/ Special Education teacher will have high expectations and constantly refine instructional practices to improve student outcomes. We strive to be a trauma informed school and our LA teacher is a critical part of our team helping to in an ideal position helping to create a safe, calm and loving environment within which all students can thrive.

College Reception and Student Support

The Receptionist/Student Support Assistant provides linkages to services and support for adult learners in a vocational training institution. The Receptionist/Student Support Assistant is often the first point of contact for potential students and the general public, and plays a role in general office appearance, organization and professional impression.

Certified Dental Assistant

Greet and prepare patients for dental exams and procedures. The CDA will be trained to use a variety of dental equipment and they will assist the Dentist during dental and oral procedures and instruct patients on post-operative and general oral health care. This position will also be responsible for maintaining dental equipment, sterilizing instruments and ensuring necessary items are stocked and managing day-to-day office operations.

Referrals Coordinator

The Seabird Island Lands Department is seeking a personable, enthusiastic and organized individual to join as Referrals Coordinator. The Referrals Coordinator will be responsible for providing a variety of administrative and technical services related to Aboriginal Rights and Titles team. The ideal candidate for this position will possess excellent organizational and communication skills.

Lands Coordinator

Under the direction of the Lands Management, the Lands Coordinator processes all Seabird Island Band Registration instruments pertaining to Seabird Island lands. S/he assists the Lands Manager in managing and developing land laws, operational policies & procedures, land use plans, land surveys and informing band members in liaising with INAC about wills and estates.

Custodian Leadhand

Under the direction of the Custodial Program Manager, the Custodial Lead hand oversees a team of custodial workers engaged in cleaning activities in buildings, facilities, offices and surrounding areas at various sites. The essential functions of the job include overseeing activities of custodial staff; and participates in developing, updating and evaluating work and/or safety standards, policies and procedures. The Lead hand will also be responsible for cleaning activities, as well as training staff on proper procedures and efficient processes.

Events Coordinator

The Community Events team plans and executes a wide variety of meetings, events, and programs at or for the Band. These events include the social events like Seabird Island Festival, Christmas Dinner, Open House and Staff Pamper Day and educational events like Graduation Day, Baby Ceremony and preschool graduation. The team is also responsible for taking facility bookings for sports fields, gymnasiums, and meeting rooms, as well as arranging caterers when needed. The Community Events Coordinator will play a vital role in leading the program in the planning and execution of all events.

Manager - Employment & Social Development

Under the direction of the Health and Social Development Director, the Employment and Social Development Manager (ESDM) will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management. Programs (with their sub-programs) under the care and supervision of the ESDM include:

- Employment and Training Services
- Income Assistance (Basic Needs, Shelter, Special Needs, Child out of Parental Home)
- Social Development (including the Food Bank and Clothing depot)
- · Seabird Island Driving School

Driving School Instructor

The Driving Instructor is responsible for teaching students the rules of the road and the safe way to handle an automobile. This position will entail providing full service drivers training for students of varying ages and experiences who are looking to acquire their BC Driver's License or to acquire a higher class of license. Students will range in age from teenagers through to elders. Training will include both classroom and practical sessions and should fully prepare the student for their knowledge and driven tests. The Driving Instructor will be expected to prepare curriculum for students that will be delivered in a classroom setting as well as in practical setting. Upon completing the drivers training students should be prepared to successfully complete knowledge based or practical tests to get their first license or to upgrade to a higher class.

Preschool Teacher Assistant

The Preschool TA position plays an integral role in the cultural and social development of our preschool children. Under the direction of the Preschool Teacher, the TA will help to guide children's behavior, ensure safety, assist children through their stages of development and prepare them for school.

Health Director

Under the direction and supervision of the CAO, the Health Director shall provide leadership and management expertise, in accordance with Band policies. The Health Director is responsible for leadership, development and implementation of strategic and operational projects(s) and efficient, effective and productive operation of the overall Health Department.

The Director is responsible for providing direction and supervision to programs like the Doctors Office, Dental Office, Community Health Services, Child and Family Services and Mental Health. The Director will ensure that all services provided meet the licensing needs and are consistent with Health Canada and similar organizations requirements. The Director will ensure that all communities have access to efficient and quality health services. The position requires substantial operational and planning oversight as well as planning and health service delivery across all Communities.

Headstart Supervisor

To provide assistance and support to the ECE Program Manager in overseeing and directing the planning, organizing and implementation of education services for children including developing and implementing individual educational plans for children within the Headstart Program.

Supported Child Development Program Consultant

Under the supervision of the Supported Child Care Supervisor, Supported Child Development Program Consultant will provide front line support to children with extra support needs to assist them to fully participate in a child care setting.

On Call - Residential Support Worker

The role of the Residential Support Worker is to support residents struggling with substance use issues possible to facilitate personal growth and relationship building, as well as other duties associated with the recovery home such as cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving and shopping.

Indigenous Gender and Wellness

Idea Fair and Learning Circle TRAVEL AWARD



Gender plays an important, but often overlooked, role in wellness.

As with many other Indigenous (First Nations, Inuit, Métis) traditions and knowledge, Indigenous concepts of gender have been negatively affected by western views. imposed through colonization. What if we paid closer attention to gender in all its forms (e.g. norms, roles, identities, Two Spirit, LGBTQ)? Could we improve wellness among Indigenous Peoples? If so, how would we go about it? If you have an idea or would like to contribute, we want to hear from you.

What is this all about?

The Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) is inviting Indigenous individuals and allies with big ideas about gender and wellness to apply for funding to attend an Idea Fair and Learning Circle on the topic of Indigenous gender and wellness. If you don't have an idea but still want to be involved, you can apply as an Idea Supporter. Travel awards valued at up to \$5,000 are available to cover the costs of attending.

This is the first step in a larger initiative to support development and implementation of community-led projects. Team projects developed at the workshop will be eligible to apply for future funding. Overall, CIHR has set aside approximately \$8M in funding over five years to support these projects (pending approval).

When and where will this happen?

The Idea Fair and Learning Circle will take place over two and a half days, from June 18-20, 2019 on the traditional unceded territory of the Kanien'keha:ka (Mohawk) in the city of Montréal.

We have intentionally chosen the dates directly preceding National Indigenous Peoples' Day, so participants can stay on in Montréal to take part in festivities if they choose.

Who should apply?

You! You don't have to have any experience in research to apply. You can be First Nations, Inuit or Métis (including young adults, Elders, knowledge holders, researchers, and others), a non-Indigenous researcher, representative of a community organization or an ally of Indigenous Peoples. However, to be eligible, applicants must either self identify as Indigenous or provide evidence of having meaningful and culturally-safe involvement with Indigenous Peoples (learn more on our website).

We welcome applications from adults of all ages and especially encourage young adults to apply.

A few possible idea topics

(Inspiration only—your imagination is the limit!)

- · Improving wellness among gender- and sexually-diverse Indigenous youth
- Projects with a focus on the arts (e.g. visual, music, dance, theatre, literary or media, including the contemporary practice of traditionally-based forms)
- · Gender-based violence affecting Indigenous Peoples
- · Understanding the gender-related risk factors of alcohol or other substance use
- Interaction of gender-related risk factors and HIV
- · Gender, wellness and cultural traditions and activities (e.g., ceremony, land-based activities)
- · Gender and wellness of Indigenous Peoples living in or transitioning to urban centres
