Education Jurisdiction – Pulling Together to Ensure Success

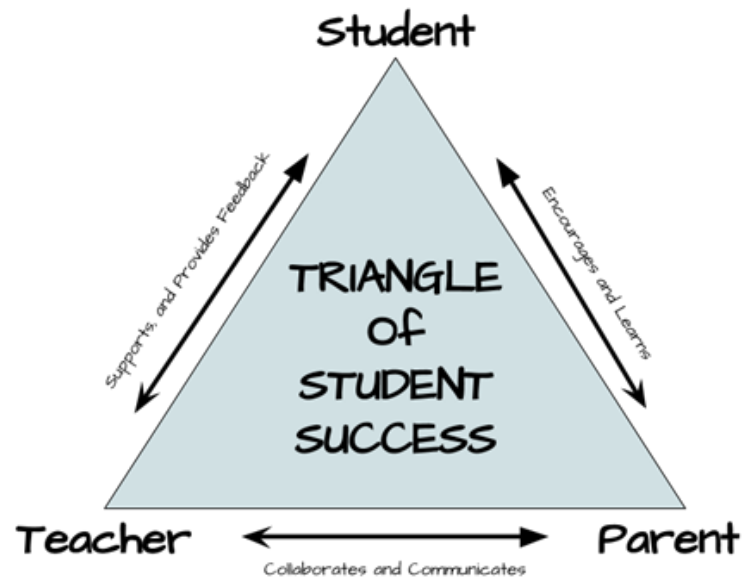
On August 3rd, Mark Point facilitated a community engagement session on education jurisdiction. Twenty-two people were in attendance, including staff and Community Members, Elders, Youth, and 3 members of Council. Jurisdiction over education is a big part of the Seabird self-governance structure: we can make our own decisions regarding education policies and how we manage our services. We can develop our own curriculum standards, how we deliver services, and the amount of funding needed for education.

Mark Point started by saying that taking control over our own education is a big responsibility – we make the decisions, and we are accountable for the outcomes, not Canada, and not the province. This is exciting, and it requires everyone to participate.

The role of education, he said, is to grow the child, and instill a hunger to learn.

The role of the community is important to learning success:

- A solid home environment, with solid attachment to key parenting figures, solid family support and solid community backing.
- Healthy families make healthy children. We can talk and ask for help at every level – how we relate and cope, how we are in relationships, and how we parent. We need to be big enough to acknowledge and fix the issues.
- Connection to culture – putting our philosophy and world view in all we do is important to learning success.
- Connecting to the Aunties, and to the Elders is important to our school environment – it takes an entire community to raise a child.



The triangle of student success (www.teachbetter.com) shows how we all work together to support student success, that each angle is important to the whole:

The Seabird Island Education Committee also contributes to student success. With the approval of Chief and Council, the Committee oversees and addresses the educational needs of all students that fall within Seabird's education scope. The Committee works to ensure that cultural traditions and values and language are incorporated into student learning, and reports back the community on education at our Band quarterly meetings.

Spawning Channel Maintenance Along Chaplin Road



From September 5th-15th, Mission Contractors will be working with Seabird staff and Fisheries and Oceans Canada's Habitat Restoration crew to conduct maintenance on several Chinook spawning channels along Chaplin Road.

The spawning channels were originally constructed by Fisheries and Oceans Canada in the late 1990's and early 2000's to concentrate flows over natural gravel beds to encourage spawning of Chinook. Since building the channels, little has been done to maintain them. Spawning riffles are typically kept clean with regular returns of spawning salmon as their migration upstream and subsequent redd-building, disturb the gravel and prevent the overgrowth of algae and aquatic plants. In the decades since, Chinook returns to the Maria Slough have been low, causing the gravel to travel downstream over time and become filled in with silt and algae. This project will clean and regrade the gravel in three important spawning channels in the slough along Chaplin Road in preparation for salmon returning to spawn this fall. Our hope is that this work will create a more suitable spawning habitat for Chinook and help to improve their egg-to-fry survivorship.

During the first two weeks of September, you can expect to see staff and vehicles from Fisheries and Oceans Canada and Mission Contractors along Seabird Island Road and Chaplin Road. You may also notice the use of coffer dams and an excavator within the slough as we progress with this work. We will be conducting a fish salvage at the start of each day which will consist of seining, trapping and the use of exclusion fences.

We will be hosting an event in November to update the community on the outcomes of this project and to provide updates on many others that we have planned for the upcoming year. I've been on war canoes all my life, and I started playing ice hockey when I was four years old. I was in dance and figure skating for two years. Played basketball in school, just not my last year. I've have been mountain biking for 5 years. This year I am still racing war canoes, playing hockey, rugby, baseball and mountain biking. This year I made it to NAIG (North American Indigenous Games) in Halifax, Nova Scotia, for canoe kayak and got bronze in my single 3000 race out of 12 others.

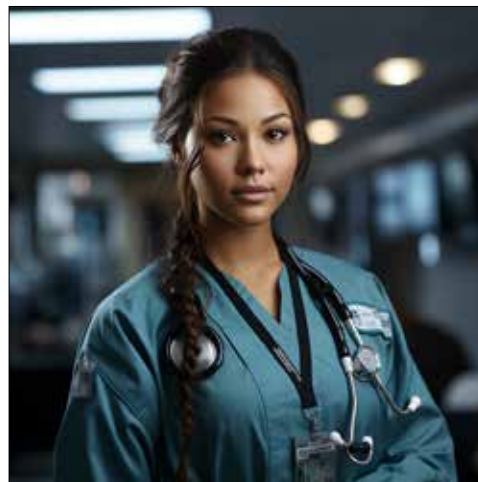

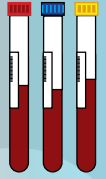

NOTICE OF CERTIFICATION - Government of Canada Privacy

Breach Class Action: OTTAWA, ON, Aug. 18th, 2023 /CNW/

Did you receive notice or have reason to believe that you may have experienced a privacy breach between March 1st, 2020 and December 31st, 2020 with respect to your personal or financial information while using a Government of Canada Online Account (Canada Revenue Agency's "My Account", "My Service Canada" account, or other online government accounts where the account is accessed using a GCKey)?

If you used a Government of Canada Online Account, such as CRA's My Account, a "My Service Canada" account, or various other online government accounts in the past, this Notice of Certification may affect your legal rights.

Please read it carefully. You may receive more than one Notice of Certification due to potential unauthorized access to more than one of your Government of Canada online accounts.

A class action lawsuit was initiated by Todd Sweet against the Canada Revenue Agency ("CRA") and the Government of Canada (collectively,

the "Defendant") alleging that the Defendant was negligent in safeguarding the confidential information of Canadians, leading to widespread privacy breaches. The Federal Court of Canada has certified the class action lawsuit against the Defendant. Todd Sweet is the representative Plaintiff.

WHAT IS THE LAWSUIT ABOUT?

Among other things, the Plaintiff alleges that the Government of Canada breached class members' privacy by not properly safeguarding confidential personal and financial information electronically housed within various online government portals. The Plaintiff alleges that these inadequate safeguards allowed bad actors to access the online accounts of Canadians absent their consent, view confidential and private details and, in many cases, apply for CERB benefits.

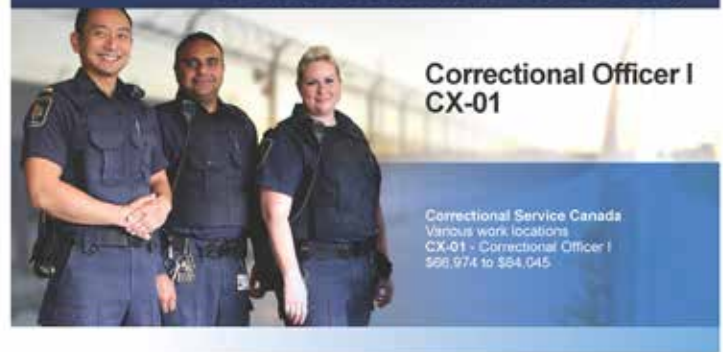

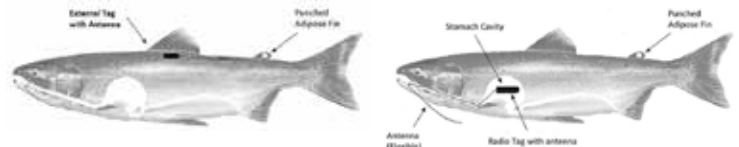

Researchers with Fisheries and Oceans Canada, in partnership with First Nations and the Province of BC, are tagging Chinook and Sockeye salmon with radio tracking transmitters to evaluate adult salmon migration success associated with the Big Bar landslide.

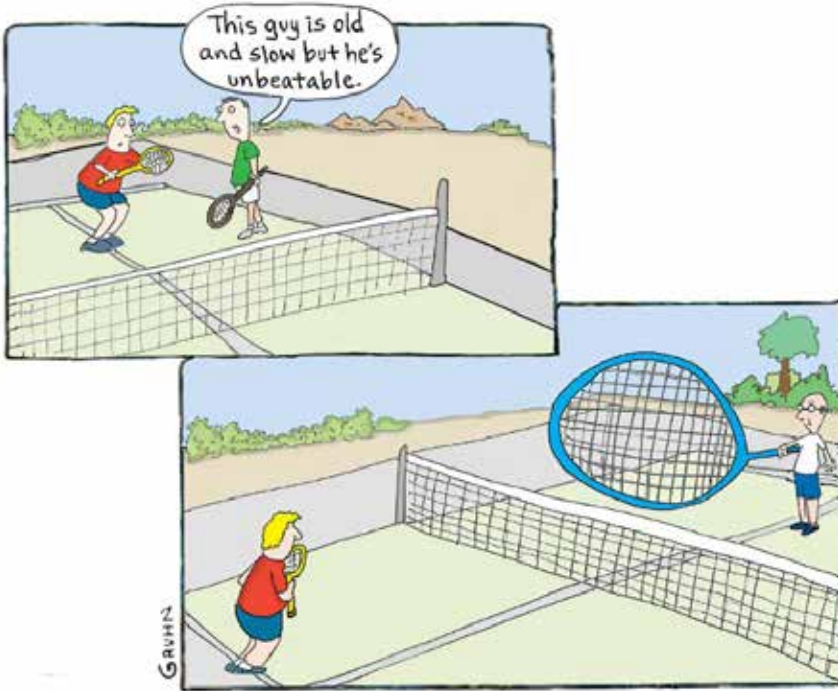

Education

Adult Dogwood Instructor

The Adult Dogwood Instructor teaches a variety of Adult Education courses. This position will assist our students towards their Adult Dogwood Diploma and supports students who seek to obtain a trade or vocational certificate in their work plan. *This is a term position and will end June 30th, 2024, with a possibility of extension.*

Director of Education

The Director of Education will provide leadership and management expertise, in accordance with Band policies. Specifically, the Director shall be responsible to the Executive Director/CAO for the efficient, effective and productive operation of the Seabird Island College, Elementary and High Schools, including oversight of the nominal role, and education programs.

The Director is responsible for researching, requesting and securing funding for all educational programming, which will be of key importance to the Education Department and will be a high priority. The Director will also be responsible for the professional management of all staff and financial resources available to the Department. This will require working closely with Departmental leadership (College Manager, Principal, Vice Principals, and the Human Resources Department).

Education Assistant Grade K4-12

The Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding.

EAs will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, record keeping and data collection.

Grade 6 Teacher

The Grade 6 Teacher will be responsible for providing instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures.

Halq'eméylem Teacher

The Halq'eméylem Language Teacher is responsible for teaching students how to speak, understand, and write Seabird Islands' traditional language – Halq'eméylem. This teacher is an unrelenting advocate for language revitalization and works with staff and administration to promote the language throughout the school.

Labour Pool

The spirit of the labour pool is to give Community Members a chance to gain work experience, be provided mentorship and to make some supplemental income.

Teacher Teaching On Call (TTOC)

Teaching Teacher on Call (TTOC) you will provide causal or substitute coverage in various subjects ranging from K4-12.

Income Assistance First Nations Youth Employment Strategy (IAFNYES)

Seabird Island is proud to offer new pilot program called Income Assistance First Nations Youth Employment Strategy (IAFNYES). The goal of this pilot strategy is to support on-reserve First Nations Youth between the ages of 19 and 30 receiving ISC's Income Assistance with a transition to the workforce, or return to school, through their participation in mentored work placements while receiving some case management supports. *This program will be 23 weeks in duration working 30hrs/week not exceeding 720hrs per participant. The program ends March 31st, 2024.*

SASET – Post Secondary Administrative Assistant

The Seabird Island Band is excited to once again be providing Summer Placement Programs for Post-Secondary students. The Administration Assistant will assist in support to the managers and supervisors of various departments, including but not limited to everyday tasks like filing, record keeping, report preparation, scheduling, creating newsletters and data entry. *This is a term position that will end on August 25th, 2023 or when 420 hours has been completed. We are hiring for two vacancies.*

Technology Education Teacher

Technology Education Teacher will provide lessons and activities to help students develop knowledge and understanding of concepts of computers, as well as practical software use, and troubleshooting skills. You'll present a wide variety of beginner to complex lessons that focus on keyboarding, word processing, Microsoft Office and internet basics to software, data processing, hardware and web-design.

Health & Social Development

Family Counsellor

The Counsellor is responsible for providing counseling to families, youth, and children regarding addictions and family issues. Counseling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, families, in groups, circles and couple's counseling. The Counsellor must be able to work from a trauma informed perspective. The Counsellor will provide services to Bands in which the Seabird Island Band provides Health Services to and will involve travel to the communities. The Counsellor will educate the community through workshops to address issues identified. The Counsellor will facilitate daytime and evening education workshops. The Counsellor will make referrals for clients to residential treatment centers as required and help facilitate at the Recovery home.

Recovery Home Support Worker (RSW) – Men's Home On Call

The Residential Support Worker (RSW) promotes recovery, stabilization, and independence by providing comprehensive support to clients. The RSW supports and promotes the following: client safety, assisting with activities of daily living, and encouraging full participation in community activities included but not limited to cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving, and shopping.

Child & Family Services Jurisdiction Team Lead

Under the supervision of the Program Manager of Families & Wellness, the C & FS Jurisdiction Team Lead will work with the jurisdiction team to develop Seabird Island family and jurisdiction laws for the protection of our children in our community. This person will be responsible for the development of the child protection program, engaging with Community Members, the Seabird leadership/governance team, and outreach to other First Nations communities that are developing their jurisdiction program.

The C & FS Jurisdiction Team Lead will need to develop a community plan and work with the province and Canada to come to a coordination agreement for Seabird Island Band.

This is a full-time term position until March 31st, 2024 with a possibility of extension.

Medical Office Assistant (MOA) – Part time

The Medical Office Assistant (MOA) will be responsible for providing front line support to employees and patients of the Medical Office. Support will be required at the Seabird Doctors Office.

The Medical office assistant provides support to doctors and other health-care professionals. You will perform a wide variety of clerical and administrative tasks. These include scheduling appointments, word processing, billing, data entry, filing, and answering telephone calls. You may also be expected to perform minor medical duties. *This is a part time term position working Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 9 a.m.-5 p.m..*

Social Policy / Research Analyst

The Social Policy/Research Analyst (SP/RA) will be tasked with overseeing development of the Child Protection law, policies, and procedure development, as well as developing assessments and practices. The SP/RA will ensure their employment requirements, regulations, policies and procedures and the mission, beliefs, and vision of Child Protection at Seabird Island contributes to establishment of a Child Protection Law.

The SP/RA will connect the dream and goals of Child Protection with meaningful development of laws that are inclusive of our culture, traditions, kinship, practices, and our service delivery approach.

This is a full-time term position until March 31st, 2024 with a possibility of extension.

Community Infrastructure

Emergency Preparedness Coordinator

Under the direction of the Fire Chief, the Emergency Preparedness Coordinator plays a central role in developing, planning, implementing and evaluating emergency preparedness activities for Seabird Island Band. This person will deal with emergency responses, to ensure adequate communication with Seabird and with outside agencies, and preparedness that includes fully developed evacuation plans and readiness. *This is a term position and will end August 1st, 2024, with a possibility of extension.*

Forestry and Land Stewardship Intern

The Forestry and Land Stewardship Intern positions (2) are grant-funded term positions intended to build capacity in sustainable forestry, forestry and land stewardship. The internship components are as follows:

- Build capacity in sustainable forestry in the following areas, through coursework and applied learning.
- Coursework – online micro-credit certification.
- Log scaling Coastal Log Scaling | North Island College (nic.bc.ca) 8 mos. (\$7500) Virtual classrooms / directed home study / fieldwork in Nanaimo on weekends for 12 weeks.
- GIS – training to access data on GIS platform.
- Work under mentorship of Seabird Island Limited Forestry Partnership staff in day to day technical, field and office work.

Major Projects Team Lead

Under the direction of the Lands Manager, the Major Projects Team Lead will follow the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by management. The Major Projects Team Lead is responsible for coordinating, supervising, and implementing projects within the Lands Program, including administration of projects, leases, major infrastructure projects, environmental projects, additions-to-reserve, right-of-way expansions, and agreements. The Major Projects Team Lead will provide necessary technical support and supervision of projects with regards to Lands, conducting meetings and coordinating field inspections related to projects and inquiries. This position will interact with various departments throughout Seabird Island and will liaise with municipal, provincial, and other stakeholders regarding inquiries and to ensure the effective implementation of projects.

Early Childhood Education

Head Start Assistant

The Headstart Assistant will be responsible for ensuring the children have a safe, fun and educational environment to encourage their learning through the developmental stages.

Preschool Assistant

The Preschool Assistant position plays an integral role in the cultural and social development of our preschool children. Under the direction of the Preschool Teacher, the Assistant will help to guide children's behavior, ensure safety, assist children through their stages of development and prepare them for school. *Please note: There are two positions open, one is full-time permanent and one is part-time 21hr+.*

Supported Child Development Worker

The Supported Child Development program provides services to Aboriginal and Non-Aboriginal children who require extra support due to physical, social, intellectual, emotional, and developmental challenges. Children are provided support in a variety of ways to support them to meet their full potential in inclusive childcare centers.

Early Childhood Educator

Working within the Early Childhood Education (ECE) department, Under the direction of the Daycare Supervisor, the Early Childhood Educator will provide hands-on childcare to children in Seabird Island Band's Early Childhood Education programs, in accordance with all childcare licensing requirements and the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management.

Executive

Food Services Program Manager

Reporting to the Executive Director the Foods Services Manager is responsible for all SIB food services and catering operations. The Manager is responsible for fiscally responsible decisions related to the provision of food services, in support of internal and external sales.

This position will have a direct impact on Food Services Leadership and the support it provides enables staff to achieve their goals and contributes to the successful operations of the Food Services Department. As the Food Services Manager, you are responsible for the well-being of our community and staff through the preparation and delivery of home-cooked meals, cultural meal preparation as well as leadership of the food services team. The Food Services Manager directly supervises staff and ensures staff are fully informed and compliant in all food regulations and best practices.

Inter-Government Affairs

Junior Biologist

The junior biologist will provide technical capacity to manage food, social and ceremonial fisheries, habitat preservation and restoration, and lobbying the issue of rights and title where required with the agencies that need to hear the First Nations voice and stand. This will include traditional land use parameters, and criteria adherence for development and aquatic habitat restoration.

The position will include research, reporting, documenting, and liaising with staff and professional consultants, to meet deliverables like mitigation plans, community engagement, and environmental sustainability.

Policy Writer

In this role, you will develop, review, modify, and maintain new and current company policies and guidelines. As the Policy Writer, you will work under the Policy Analyst and develop strong and effective working relationships with colleagues, partners, and organizations, including federal, provincial and external stakeholders. You will work with teams across the organization to plan policy development. Your main responsibility is to ensure that company policies are clear and easy to understand by employees and those they affect, including clients, members, and external bodies. You will oversee keeping records of any policy timelines, changes, including revisions, amendments, updates, and deletions.

Business Liaison & Referrals Officer

The Business Liaison and Referrals Officer (BLRO) will work to protect and advocate for Aboriginal rights and title in business and development. The BLRO will ensure that all referrals and development ventures that may impact SIB rights and title are assessed and subject to SIB best interests and long-term sustainability. The BLRO will confer on development upstream and downstream from Seabird Island traditional lands. Issues such as environmental impacts, access, resource and revenue sharing will all be managed by this position.

Human Resources

HR Administrator

The Human Resources Administrator will be the first point of contact between an employee and the company.
