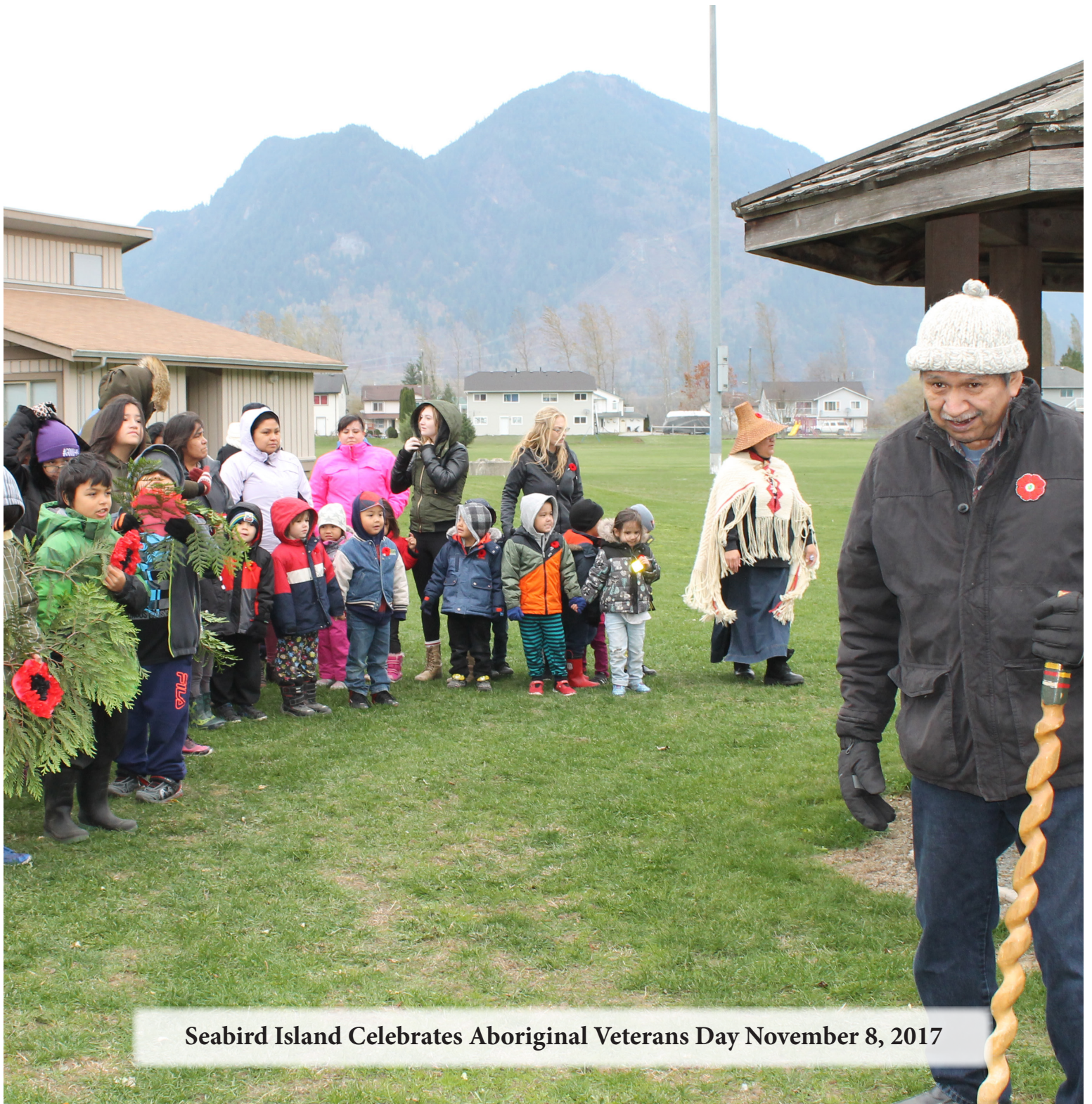

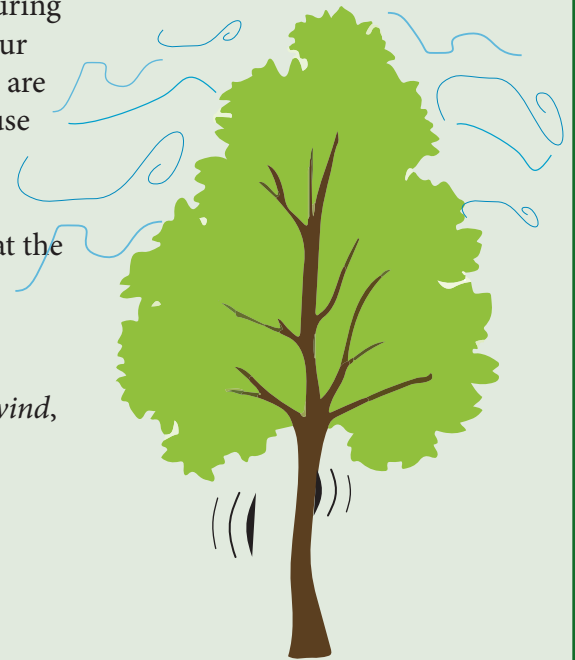

10 Tips for Protecting Personal Information

The following tips offer some general advice to help individuals better protect their personal information.

1. Think twice

Whether on-line or face-to-face, you are asked to provide personal data at every turn. Don't turn it over blindly. Think about why the information is required, how it may be used and by whom. Remember, the Net never forgets. Once information is out there, it's very difficult to get back. Think of the impact certain comments or images could have on your reputation or the reputation of others. Respect other people's privacy.

2. Ask questions

Get in the habit of reading privacy policies associated with the websites and apps you use. Companies should be able to answer any questions you have about how your information will be used and protected. If they can't, or you don't like what you hear, this should raise red flags.

3. Speak up

If you have concerns about the personal information handling practices of an organization, your first step should be to bring it to their attention. Most organizations are sensitive to consumer concerns about privacy. In many cases, a concern you have about how your personal information has been handled by an organization can be quickly and effectively addressed if you raise it directly with them. Positive change to the general policies or practices of an organization are more likely when people speak up.

4. Just say no

Consider subscribing to the National Do Not Call List to avoid telemarketers. Check off the "no thanks" box on forms when asked to provide personal information or leave a brief note stating your refusal to be contacted. You can also get your name removed from many mailing and telephone lists by writing to the Canadian Marketing Association.

5. Safeguard your SIN

Your Social Insurance Number is important to privacy protection because it can open the door to your personal information and put you at risk of fraud and identity theft. Your SIN is confidential and should only be collected and used for income reporting purposes. Avoid sharing it with private-sector organizations or individuals such as landlords.

6. Protect your devices

Take steps to protect your privacy online. Ensure your computer, smartphone and other mobile devices are password protected. Only download from reputable sources. Install the latest anti-virus, anti-spam and firewall programs – and ensure you keep them up to date. Consider encrypting sensitive data. Disable Wi-Fi and Bluetooth if not using it. Data is vulnerable when passing through public spaces with open wireless networks. Don't leave mobile devices unattended.

7. Protect your passwords

Ensure passwords are hard-to-guess. Make them eight or more characters. Use a combination of letters, numbers and symbols. Use different passwords for different websites, accounts and devices. If you need to write your passwords down to remember them, keep them off-line in a secret, secure, locked place.

8. Get to know privacy settings

Mobile devices, browsers, sites/apps and other web-enabled items such as video games and cameras often have adjustable privacy settings. For devices, this may include the ability to control everything from location tracking to screen locks. For browsers, users can often control things like cookies and pop-ups, while apps and websites such as social media sites generally allow users to control what personal information others can see about them. Be sure to review and adjust privacy settings regularly and never rely on default settings.

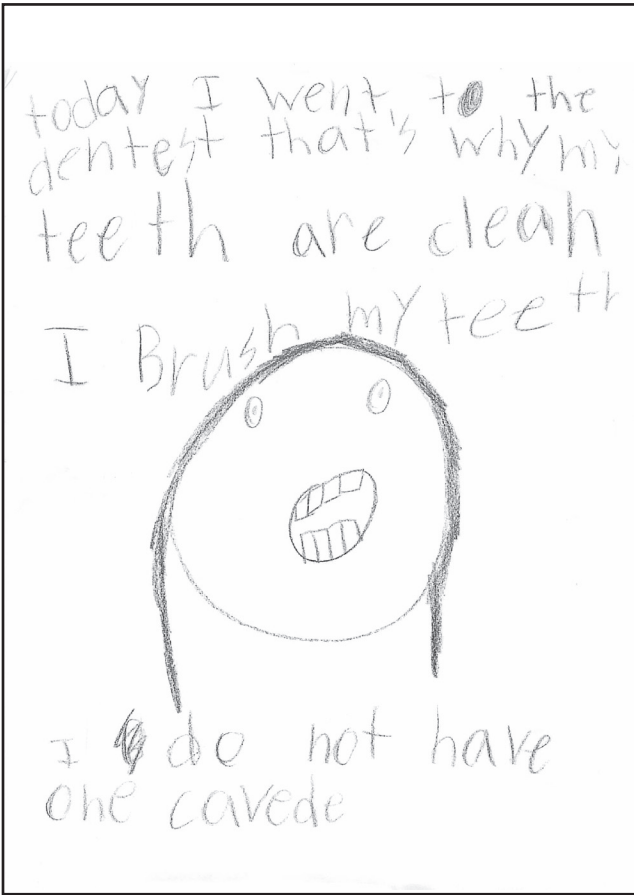
9. Discard with discretion

Make sure data stored on devices you no longer use is properly purged before recycling or discarding. When doing business with a particular company, be cognizant of its personal information retention periods and disposal practices. Ask questions if you are uncertain.

10. Know your rights

Read up on the basics of Canada's federal privacy laws: the Privacy Act, which applies to the personal information handling practices of federal government institutions, and the Personal Information Protection and Electronic Documents Act (PIPEDA), Canada's federal private sector privacy law. Remember, you have the right to access and correct your personal information.

FirstVoices Dictionary Apps Now Available on Android Devices!

FPCC is excited to announce that its ground-breaking FirstVoices Dictionary Apps are now available for free download on all Android devices!

The apps, which were initially launched in 2011, were previously available only on Apple iOS, due to the limited availability of First Nations language character sets in the Android operating system.

The 13 FirstVoices Dictionary Apps are available in the following B.C. First Nations languages: Ehattesaht, Halq'eméylem, Hlgaagilda Xaayda Kil (Skidegate Haida), Ktunaxa, Kwakwaka, Nazko-Dakelh, Nisga'a, Northern St'át'imcets, Secwepemc, SENĆOŦEN, Sliammon, Lílwat-Ucwalmicwts and Xení Gwet'in.

The apps were developed as a mobile version of the language archives available at FirstVoices.com, where First Nations communities can upload words and phrases in their languages. They were built using open-source software and are not only the largest collection of open-source Indigenous language apps in the world, but the first to be available for both iOS and Android.

Each dictionary app uses **customized, language-specific, "approximate-search" algorithms**, which improve accessibility for learners and experts alike. For example, in the Nisga'a language, the word for 'story/legend/history' is written adaawaḱ. The Nisga'a search algorithm has been built to anticipate a search for a word that does not include the special character, so it will still return the result for 'adaawaḱ' even if a user searches for 'adawaḱ'.

For all iOS and Android dictionary apps, users can **sort words and phrases by categories, bookmark items and use the app to make flashcards** to support language learning.

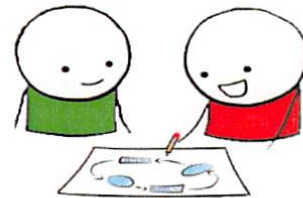

I completed my program within 2 years attending full time at Camosun College I now carry a certificate in Early Childhood Education with a specialization in infant and toddler.

Some of the high points include:

- I received recognition and received an award on behalf of Camosun College, Success by 6 and Coast Capital Savings.
- At our closing ceremony the head of the program read a paper that I wrote to all the first and second year students and all of the ELC instructors. The head of the department has published some well written articles that ELC programs utilize for their institutions. For the head of the program to think so highly of my paper was quite honoring and some of my classmates became quite emotional when my paper was read aloud.
- My final highlight being my eldest daughter walking across the stage at my graduation ceremony with me while we linked arms. Once we got across the stage it was a happy sigh of relief *we did it*. Elders were greeted us with smiles and hugs because she sacrificed just as much time away from me as I did with her. Successfully completing this program was a collaborative effort, so recognition on her part was such a heartwarming and emotional moment.

I learned that balance is key: I wanted to succeed on my academic journey so that I can provide a better future for my girls and I also wanted to show my girls that education is an important part of life and that it takes will and commitment. Yet I wanted to be present and attentive to the needs of my children. I was involved in coaching my daughter's lacrosse team and was actively involved in community functions. I had to set out a schedule that maintained the balance of my academic endeavors and time for my children and my community.

Seabird Island supported me in successfully completing my goals through financial support. I could not have had this opportunity to continue forward with my education without the financial support from the education department. There were a few emotionally difficult times in my two years of education where I felt defeated and to have the verbal and mental support to have someone (Cindy) to pick you back up when you feel like you're ready to tap out is the strongest and most meaningful support I could ask for. I am grateful

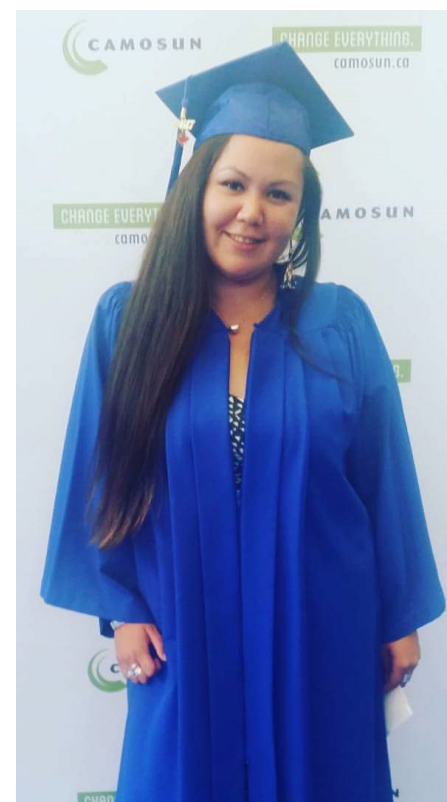


to have had such a strong support system to ensure that I was successful.

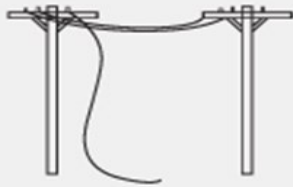
I am one of the main educators at an urban aboriginal childcare center in Victoria, BC. I started working there in April 2017 in their 3-5 year old room which currently has 21 children.

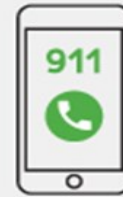

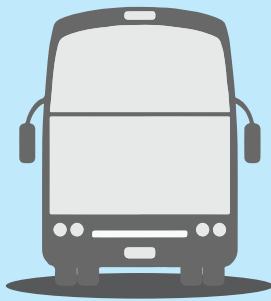
