The evening's discussions revolved around the importance of acknowledging the past, learning from it, and forging a path towards a brighter future.

As the night drew to a close, both hearts and stomachs were full, filled with hope

for a better tomorrow.

Their coach, well versed in the significance of the day, believed in using this game as an opportunity to educate and unite. As the teams gathered on the field, he called for a moment of unity and reflection. Both teams formed a large circle, embodying the idea of coming together, understanding and supporting one another.

With the entire crowd hushed, the coach shared a heartfelt speech about the importance of Truth and Reconciliation Day. Emotions ran deep as the two minutes of silence began, each second serving as a

One of the most noticeable transformations is the new pavement that now graces the entrance. It is smooth and pristine, a reflection of the mindfulness that has gone into the project.





ATTENTION ALL HARVESTERS

Researchers with Fisheries and Oceans Canada, in partnership with First Nations and the Province of BC, are tagging Chinook and Sockeye salmon with radio tracking transmitters to evaluate adult salmon migration success associated with the Big Bar landslide.

Radio tracking transmitters are either attached to the back below the dorsal fin or inserted into the stomach cavity.





The numbers printed on the radio tracking transmitters uniquely identify individual salmon and their migration behaviour through the Fraser River and its tributaries.

Or turn the tags in with the above information through your local catch monitoring program.

The information will be used to help understand the impacts of the Big Bar landslide and improve our understanding of salmon migration biology.

First Nation Premier Elected in Manatoba

Manitoba has made history, electing its first-ever First Nations premier. Wab Kinew, representing the New Democratic Party (NDP), secured a landmark victory in the provincial election held on October 3, 2023.

Born in Kenora, Ontario, Kinew spent his early years on the Onigaming First Nation before his family relocated to Winnipeg, Manitoba. Proudly identifying as Anishinaabe,

Kinew's personal journey is deeply rooted in his Indigenous heritage, with his father, Tobasonakwut Kinew, having endured the hardships of the residential school system.

While Wab Kinew is the first First Nations premier in Manitoba, he is not the first in all of Canada. That distinction belongs to Richard Nerysoo, who was the premier of the Northwest Territories from 1984 to 1985.

Kinew ran on a platform that pledged to address critical issues such as healthcare, homelessness and the soaring cost of living in the province. His election marks a significant milestone in Canadian politics and offers a beacon of inspiration for all First Nation across Canada.

His inspirational story highlights that with hard work, anyone can overcome anything and make their dreams come true.

Here are some simple tips to get you started:

Prepare your Family.

- Discuss emergency escape plans with your family, including the kids.
- Ensure everybody has a flashlight.
- Ensure everybody has properly fitting winter clothing.

Prepare your Home.

- Clean your gutters and ensure the downspouts are working properly.
- Ensure window and door seals are working properly and replace them when necessary.
- Stock up on emergency supplies: blankets; food (that you can eat when



the power goes out); water; a first aid kit; flashlights; battery lamps; a battery operated radio; candles with proper holders; and more.

Prepare your Vehicle.

- Ensure you have good tires.
- Check, and top up, all your fluids such as oil, brakes, coolant, windshield washer fluid, etc.
- Have an ice scraper, or two, in each vehicle.

- Carry kitty litter for traction if you get stuck.
- Stock emergency supplies in your vehicle: a blanket; water; granola bars; emergency lights; jumper cables; a small shovel; and a mini first aid kit.

Oven Cinnamon Toast



Ingredients

- 4 slices bread
- 1/4 cup (56g) butter softened
- 1/4 cup (50g) sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Instructions

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Place your bread on a broiler-safe ungreased baking sheet.
- 2. In a medium bowl, combine softened butter, sugar, cinnamon, and vanilla. Use a fork to stir until the mixture forms a paste that is uniform in color.
- 3. Divide the mixture evenly between the pieces of bread and spread it over the slices, completely covering the top of each and place them on the baking sheet.
- Place the baking sheet on an upper rack of your oven (in the top half of your oven, at least 5" from the broiler so your bread does not burn). Bake for 10 minutes until the bread is lightly crispy.
- 5. Turn on the broiler and toast for 1-2 minutes until the cinnamon sugar is bubbling. Watch carefully, DO NOT walk away, while it is under the broiler.
- 6. Allow the toast to cool slightly, slice and enjoy!

Bed Bugs

- Bed bugs are small insects that feed on your blood and the blood of animals. They are reddish brown, oval-shaped, wingless, and typically about the size of an apple seed.
- Bed bugs are difficult to get rid of once they infest a home. They hide in the cracks and crevices of beds, box springs, headboards, bed frames, and other objects around a bed, coming out at night to feed on your blood. To prevent an infestation, be cautious about bringing used furniture or items into your home. Regularly inspect your home and any hotel rooms you stay in to avoid bringing them home.

Getting rid of bedbugs:

- Prevent the Spread: Remove all bedding and clothing from the affected room and sealing them in plastic bags.
- Wash and Dry: All potentially infested items on high heat, including bedding, clothing and curtains.
- Vacuum Thoroughly: Use a vacuum to clean the affected area, including the mattress, box spring, bed frame, and nearby furniture. Afterward, dispose of the vacuum bag in a sealed plastic bag and remove it from your home.
- Seal Cracks and Crevices: Seal any cracks and crevices in • your bedroom and the surrounding area, as bed bugs can hide in these spaces, which can lead to future infestations.
- Use Bed Bug Mattress and Box Spring Covers: Cover your mattress and box spring with specially designed bed bug-proof covers to trap any remaining bed bugs and starve them by preventing them from reaching you.
- Wear pajamas: it can make it more difficult for them to get to you.

Bedbug Bites:

The bites may produce symptoms like those of other insect bites and rashes, including:


- Inflamed spots, often with a darker center
- Itchiness
- Arranged in a rough line or cluster.
- Typically found on the face, neck, arms, and hands.
- Some people have no reaction to bedbug bites, while others may experience an allergic reaction that can include severe itching, blisters or hives.

Lice are Back: What Should I Do?

- Check your children's heads daily.
- Ensure they do not share hats with their friends.
- Avoid jackets with furry hoods.
- When they hang up their jackets at school, are they hung up touching another student's jacket? This can cause transfer.
- Keep their hair short.
- Use hair products like mousse, gel or hairspray.
- Pull their hair back tightly into a braid or layers of ponytails so the hair is not loose.

Natural Treatments:

- **Manual Removal:** Wet the hair with a mixture of equal parts white vinegar and water. This helps loosen the grip of nits on the hair shaft. Using a fine toothed comb, like a lice comb or nit comb, carefully comb through the hair to remove lice and nits (lice eggs). Do this over a sink or a white paper towel to easily spot and dispose of lice and nits.
- **Oil Treatment:** Coat the hair and scalp with a thick substance such as olive oil, coconut oil or even mayonnaise. Cover the head with a shower cap and leave it on overnight. The oil suffocates and immobilizes the lice. Comb and wash the hair thoroughly the next morning.
- **Tea Tree Oil:** Mix a few drops of tea tree oil with olive or coconut oil and apply it to the scalp. Tea tree oil has

natural insecticidal properties. Leave it on for 30 minutes to an hour, then comb out the lice and nits.

• Home: Clean all bedding and clothing they have had contact with, using HOT water and dry them on a high heat setting.

Remember, natural treatments may take time and require patience and hard work. Repeating the treatments as needed is essential to ensure all lice and nits are eliminated. If natural treatments are not effective or if the infestation is severe, consult a healthcare professional for advice on additional treatment options.

Tips For Lowering Your Electricity Bill.

Remember to turn off lights when you leave a room. Remind family to turn off lights when not using them.

LED bulbs are the best, yet they can be expensive to purchase, so please consider replacing one or two bulbs per month to reduce the expense. LED bulbs use approximately 75% less energy and last 25 times longer.

Pick the correct wattage for your space. For example, you may prefer a brighter light in your kitchen, as opposed to a softer light for your lamp in your living room.

Close curtains each night. This helps keep your home warmer.

Consider replacing your curtains with the blackout type. Not only do they help keep summer heat out of your home, but they also insulate your home by keeping the warm air (heat) in during the winter months. Purchasing one set a month can help with the costs. Blackout curtains are also believed to block out 40% of noise pollution. This could be a great investment for your home.

You can help your dryer work more efficiently by keeping it clean, emptying the lint trap after each load is one of the most important things you can do to stop a dryer from working harder than necessary.

Aim to use cold water when you wash laundry. Why? Because 90% of used electricity to wash a load goes toward heating the water.

Its Okay My Dog Is Friendly

No! It is not okay!

Just because your dog is friendly, does not mean other animals are or that people in the area are okay with dogs.

Traumatized:

There are people in the Community, both adults and children, who have been bitten, chased and attacked by loose dogs. They have been traumatized. Many of these people do not feel safe in their own back yards or when walking around the community, because of loose dogs. They are scared to be attacked again. It does not even need to be the same dog, since some of these people have no trust left for dogs.

Pet Love - Pet Safety:

Ensure your dog safe at home! A loose dog can get into all sorts of trouble. Other animals, both wild and domestic, could attack them. They could be hit by a car, hurt by people defending their property, get into toxic chemicals or hurt by tools and blades left in other people's yards.

Summary:

We are no longer a tiny village of half a dozen homes sharing one to two dogs. We have grown into a larger community of almost 300 homes. Those who want pets, have their own pets, and those who do not have pets, may not want pets; however, loose dogs can disrupt a family and their way of life.

Please respect others and their rights to enjoy their Community and yards. Keep your animals safe at home, whether in the house, in a fenced area or tied on a run.

Two clinics have offered their services to Seabird Island's Community. Please see their websites below.

FCM Community Cat Trappers

FCM Community Cat Trappers is a volunteer-run group dedicated to improving the lives of feral, barn and stray cats in Chilliwack, BC, and surrounding area. We partner with local vets and rescues to ensure cats are treated ethically and given the chance to live their best lives, be that in a colony, a barn or a home. Along with our partner veterinarians, we have launched a spay and neuter program that gives pet owners of Chilliwack and the surrounding area access to low-cost spay/neuter, vaccinations and permanent identification. A portion of each pet's spay and neuter helps to pay a portion for the same for a feral cat. We are currently funded entirely by donations from our community.

Low-cost spay/neutering of cats is available for residents of Chilliwack and the surrounding area. The program provides a low-cost spay/neuter for those who may not be able to access this otherwise. First Native American Saint

Did you know there was a Native Saint?

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, also known as Lilv of the Mohawks, was a Native American woman, who lived in the 17th century, and is recognized as the first Native American Saint in the Roman Catholic Church. She was born in 1656 in the Mohawk village of Ossernenon, which is present day Auriesville, New York, within the territory of the Iroquois Confederacy.

Kateri Tekakwitha was the daughter of a Mohawk Chief and an Algonquin Christian mother. When she was a child, a smallpox epidemic took the lives of her parents and left her with facial scars and weakened eyesight. She was adopted by her uncle and raised in the Mohawk culture.

Later in her life, Kateri embraced Christianity, influenced by Jesuit missionaries, who worked in the area. She was baptized in 1676 and became known for her deep devotion to her faith, her life of prayer and penance, and her care for the sick and elderly.

Kateri Tekakwitha moved to a Christian Native American community called Kahnawake near Montreal, Canada, to live a life dedicated to serving God. She

died in 1680 at the age of 24 and was known for her holiness and devout life. After her death, many reported miracles and graces attributed to her intercession.


In 1980, Pope John Paul II beatified Kateri Tekakwitha, and she was canonized as a Saint by Pope Benedict XVI on October 21, 2012. She is venerated as the Patroness of Ecology and the Environment, people in exile, Native Americans, and those who suffered from smallpox and other diseases.

Her feast day is celebrated annually on July 14 in the Roman Catholic Church. Believers and communities gather to honor her life, virtues and contributions, participating in special masses, prayers, processions and cultural events.

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha is honored as the Patroness of Ecology and the Environment. Her memory is associated with a reverence for nature and environmental stewardship, aligning with indigenous spiritual beliefs and emphasizing the importance of caring for the Earth.

Overall, the memory of Saint Kateri Tekakwitha remains a source of spiritual inspiration, cultural pride





cultural boundaries, fostering unity and understanding among diverse communities.



Health & Social Development

Case Manager - Women's Home

The primary goal of the Case Manager is to support residents with a caring and supported environment in which to address addictions and substance use. Through a variety of programs, the Case Manager will ensure that residents can access health, healing and other services and programs, through programming in the home and through broader community services, to address the underlying causes of addiction and substance use, and to make choices that are life sustaining and positive.

Community Health Representative (CHR)

The CHR's primary goals are to improve the quality of life of the Seabird Island Band community members by assisting them to make healthier lifestyle choices; promote client dignity, independence, comfort, mobility, personal appearance, and safety; and to provide support to the Community Health Nurse(s) (CHN) and/or Home and Community Care (HCC) Nurse. These goals are to be achieved by using professional public health knowledge.

This is a contract position that has an end date of October 27th, 2024, with the possibility of extension.

Family Counsellor

The Counsellor is responsible for providing counselling to families, youth, and children regarding addictions and family issues. Counselling will be provided in a culturally sensitive manner on a one-to-one basis, families, in groups, circles and couple's counselling. The Counsellor must be able to work from a trauma informed perspective, educate the community through workshops to address issues identified, facilitate daytime and evening education workshops, and make referrals for clients to residential treatment centers as required and help facilitate at the Recovery Home. The Counsellor will as well provide services to other communities in which the Seabird Island offers Health Services to

Medical Office Assistant (MOA)

The Medical Office Assistant (MOA) will be responsible for providing front line support to employees and patients of the Medical Office. Support will be required at the Seabird Doctors Office.

The Medical Office Assistant provides support to doctors and other health-care professionals. You will perform a wide variety of clerical and administrative tasks. These include scheduling appointments, word processing, billing, data entry, filing, and answering telephone calls. You may also be expected to perform minor medical duties. This is a part time term position working Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

Recovery Home Supervisor - Women's Home

Under the direction of the Program Manager – Families and Wellness, the A:yelexw Recovery Homes Supervisor (ARHS) will operate efficiently in accordance with the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management. The ARHS will provide administrative and support services to the recovery home staff. The ARHS will provide mental health services to clients and families of the recovery homes. The ARHS will ensure strong cultural values and programming through a client centered approach and be grounded in culture and community supports. The ARHS will monitor weekly and monthly budgets and communicate with other First Nations communicate and external agencies to gage needs and ensure awareness and access.

Recovery Home Support Worker - Men's/Women's Home - On Call

The Recovery Home Support worker position will be a part of an integrated team of individuals that works closely together in a residential setting to provide crisis intervention, coping strategies, education, connections to community services, and support to individuals affected by mental illness, addictions, trauma, and crisis.

The Residential Support Worker (R.S.W.) promotes recovery, stabilization, and independence by providing comprehensive support to clients. The R.S.W. supports and promotes the following: client safety, assisting with activities of daily living, and encouraging full participation in community activities included but not limited to cooking, cleaning, charting, participating in group sessions, driving, and shopping.

Sexualized Violence Prevention Worker

The Sexual Violence Prevention Worker is responsible for assisting with the development and implementation of Seabird Island Band's sexual violence prevention initiatives (training, education, advocacy, and prevention). Working under the direction of the Program Manager - Families and Wellness, this position is primarily responsible for delivery of the projects, events and services contained within the program workplan. This position also has the responsibility of making sure that the administrative requirements of the program are completed correctly, on time, and in accordance with the standards set by Seabird Island Band.

Education

Case Worker - Pre-employment Supports Program (PESP) Term ends March 31st, 2024

Working within the Education department The Pre-Employment Support Case Worker is responsible for working with clients one-on-one and in small groups to assist them to overcome one or more barriers that are inhibiting their ability to gain employment. Clients will range from 19-24 and 25-49 years of age. The Case Worker will provide education, information and assistance to clients on all aspects of employment, education, training, and life career planning. The Case Worker takes a hands-on approach to assisting their clients in exploring careers and finding employment including building relationships with potential employers. This employment agreement will end March 31st, 2024.

College Instructor

This College Instructor position will tutor students in anatomy, physiology, and biology to prepare them for their upcoming entrance into the Licensed Practical Nursing program. The College Instructor will collaborate with other instructors, create engaging and encouraging learning environment for students, and provided evaluations of students to support their improvement. This is a term position that ends December 31st, 2023 with a possibility of extension.

College Registrar

Under the direction of the Vice Principal of the College, the Registrar is responsible for the orderly registration, enrollment, reporting processes and daily administration of Seabird College and Adult education programs. The Registrar will work to assist with student registrations and records for Seabird College student intakes and their completion/certifications, all in accordance with the directives set forth by various funding and accreditation bodies, and the philosophies, policies and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management. This is a term position that ends March 31st, 2028 with a , possibility of extension.

Education Assistant Grade K4-12

The Education Assistant (EA) will work with students individually or in small groups to deliver activities that reinforce and advance the educational program and make the educational experiences of the children more rewarding. EA's will assist teachers in student assessment and evaluation through observation, record keeping and data collection.

Grade 6 Teacher

The Grade 6 Teacher will be responsible for providing instruction, preparation, assessment, classroom management, professional development and school meetings, community and parental relations and adherence to all Seabird Island Community School and BC Ministry of Education policies and procedures.

Income Assistance First Nations Youth Employment Strategy (IAFNYES)

Seabird Island is proud to offer new pilot program called Income Assistance First Nations Youth Employment Strategy (IAFNYES). The goal of this pilot strategy is to support on-reserve First Nations Youth between the ages of 19 and 30 receiving ISC's Income Assistance with a transition to the workforce, or return to school, through their participation in mentored work placements while receiving some case management supports. This program will be 23 weeks in duration working 30hrs/ week not exceeding 720hrs per participant. The program ends March 31st, 2024.

Receptionist and Secondary Student Support

The Student Services Receptionist will be solely responsible for managing all telephone inquiries, handling students and visitors, and undertaking other general "front of house" administrative tasks that ensure the effective working of the College on a day-to-day basis. The Student Services Receptionist is often the first point of contact for potential students and the public, and plays a role in general office appearance, organization, and professional impression.

Student Career Counsellor

Under the direction of the Director of Education, the Student Career Counsellor is responsible for developing and delivering student counselling and guidance programs for high school and post-secondary students at Seabird Island Community School and Seabird College.

The goal will be to help students determine their career goals and then advise both students and parents, in collaboration with school and college staff, on how to achieve those goals. This position is part of the College team and may aid Seabird College when necessary. This role will also have the chance to work one-on-one with individual students, playing an important role as a mentor in helping these individuals shape their futures. This is a term contract with an end date of August 31st, 2024, with the possibility of an extension.

Teacher Teaching On Call (TTOC)

Teaching Teacher on Call (TTOC) you will provide causal or substitute coverage in various subjects ranging from K4-12 .

Technology Education Teacher

Technology Education Teacher will provide lessons and activities to help students develop knowledge and understanding of concepts of computers, as well as practical software use, and troubleshooting skills. You'll present a wide variety of beginner to complex lessons that focus on keyboarding, word processing, Microsoft Office and internet basics to software, data processing, hardware and web-design.

Vice Principal - College Admin

The Vice Principal assists the Principal in the administration, leadership, supervision and operation of College. The Vice Principal provides quality curriculum in a learning environment that promotes language and reinforces the personal values of self-reliance, generosity, honesty, adaptability, and respect for self, others and the environment. The Vice Principal must fulfill their responsibilities with high ethical and moral standards and service as a positive role model for staff and students. *This is a term position ending June 28th*, 2024, with a possibility to extend.

Economic Development

Production Supervisor - Nations Creations

The Production Supervisor will be responsible for organizing and overseeing the manufacturing of goods. You will be ultimately responsible for the smooth running of all production lines and the quality of output. We expect you to have deep know-how in production procedures. The ability to direct personnel toward maximum performance will set you apart as a leader. Decision-making and problem-solving will take up a great part of your day.

SQDC - Business Support & Outreach Coordinator

The SqDC Business Coordinator (BC) will take a proactive role in the smooth operation of the SqDC business functions. The BC performs a range of routine and non-routine tasks including implementing and maintaining business processes and supports, preparing reports, and

developing and maintaining systems. The BC will also be responsible for supporting external communications, website content management, creation of the Annual Report, planning and deployment of conferences and events, and marketing and sales support. The Sq'éwqel Development Corporation (SqDC) is the mechanism to empower the SIB people and ensure their economic independence. SqDC's main objectives are to pursue business, investment and economic development opportunities that will grow SIB's wealth and assist it in providing quality programs that support the Nation.

SqDC employees and the Board of Directors are fully committed to fulfilling its mission of identifying suitable business opportunities and undertaking economic activities that create profitable businesses, create wealth and provide new jobs all of which focus on developing and strengthening the Seabird Island economy for the benefit of Seabird Members, while respecting Stó:lõ culture, traditions and values.

Early Childhood Education

Early Childhood Educator (Infant/Toddler)

The Early Childhood Educator will provide hands-on childcare to children in Seabird Island's Early Childhood Education programs, in accordance with all childcare licensing requirements and the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by Seabird Island Band Management.

Preschool Assistant

The Preschool Assistant position plays an integral role in the cultural and social development of our preschool children. The Assistant will help to guide children's behavior, ensure safety, assist children through their stages of development and prepare them for school.

Please note: There are two positions open, one is full-time permanent and one is part-time 21hr+.

Speech and Language Pathologist

The Speech-Language Pathologist provides a wide range of clinical services that focus on promoting communication, language and speech and that contribute to a client/ patient's overall cognitive, physical, social and emotional well-being. The speech and language pathologist works closely with babies, children who have various levels of speech, language and communication problems. The successful candidate will provide assessments to children (0-6 years old) referred to the Ey Qwal Speech and Language Program.

Finance & Administration

Receptionist - Administration

The Front Desk Receptionist is responsible for a wide variety of clerical office duties in support of Band administration. Includes communicating office activities, greeting, and screening visitors, answering, and referring inbound telephone calls.

This is a Term position with an end date of June 30th, 2024, with the possibility of extension. The hours for this position are 12:30pm - 4:30pm Monday-Friday.

Purchasing Agent

Under the direction of the Purchasing Supervisor, the Purchasing Agent will verify goods and service orders; prepare and forward purchase orders; verify receipt of goods and services; and authorize payment for goods and services. The goal is to acquire goods and services that are critical for the success of operating standards, with the best price and quality standards.

The Purchasing Agent ensures that corresponding departments at Seabird Island Band, have the materials and services they need to function on a day-to-day basis. The Purchasing Agent performs extensive research to find the most cost-effective materials, supplies, goods and services, which requires that they stay up to date on marketing and pricing trends.

Inter-Government Affairs

Project Manager (Aboriginal Rights & Titles)

The Project Manager (Rights & Titles) will work to protect and advocate for Aboriginal rights and title in business and development. The Project Manager (Rights & Titles) will ensure that all referrals and development ventures that may impact SIB rights and title are assessed and subject to SIB best interests and long-term sustainability. The Project Manager will confer on development upstream and downstream from Seabird Island traditional lands. Issues such as environmental impacts, access, resource and revenue sharing will all be managed by this position. Seabird Island Band holds the inherent right to our traditional land and territory, and jurisdictional authority over those lands, territories and interests as recognized in Delgamuukw v British Columbia [1997].

Executive

Food Services Program Manager

Reporting to the Executive Director the Foods Services Manager is responsible for all SIB food services and catering operations. The Manager is responsible for fiscally responsible decisions related to the provision of food services, in support of internal and external sales.

This position will have a direct impact on Food Services Leadership and the support it provides enables staff to achieve their goals and contributes to the successful operations of the Food Services Department. As the Food Services Manager, you are responsible for the well-being of our community and staff through the preparation and delivery of home-cooked meals, cultural meal preparation as well as leadership of the food services team. The Food Services Manager directly supervises staff and ensures staff are fully informed and compliant in all food regulations and best practices.

Community Infrastructure

Animal Wellness Guardian

Responsibilities include applying for funding initiatives, organizing training, promoting 'One Health' and educating the community on animal wellness tips. The Animal Wellness Guardian recognizes that animals are individuals, not objects and works to empower our community to resolve local animal issues, working together toward common solutions. In collaboration with the Lands Manager, the Animal Wellness Guardian will administer the Dog Licensing & Animal Management Law regarding stray, dangerous, nuisance and unwanted domestic animals; investigating complaints; conducting patrols assigned areas; capturing animals; and performing other duties related to humane animal protection and control.

This is a term position with an end date of March 31st, 2024, with the possibly of an extension.

Housing Program Administrative Assistant

The Housing Program Administrative Assistant reports to the Housing Program Manager for all tasks related to clerical functions within the Department. Primary duties include but are not limited to: Answering phone calls from tenants and those individuals waiting for housing; Develop and maintain all files; Develop and maintain databases for Housing Programs; Executing the application process; Assisting tenants, staff and other department staff as required.

Major Projects Team Lead

The Major Projects Team Lead will follow the philosophies, policies, and objectives established by management. The Major Projects Team Lead is responsible for coordinating, supervising, and implementing projects within the Lands Program, including administration of projects, leases, major infrastructure projects, environmental projects, additions-to-reserve, right-of-way expansions, and agreements. The Major Projects Team Lead will provide necessary technical support and supervision of projects with regards to Lands, conducting meetings and coordinating field inspections related to projects and inquiries. This position will interact with various departments throughout Seabird Island and will liaise with municipal, provincial, and other stakeholders regarding inquiries and to ensure the effective implementation of projects.

Public Works Assistant - Skills Link

The FNESC skills link program (SLP) was developed to assist eligible First Nation youth (15-30 years of age inclusive) to prepare for future entry into labour market. The goal of the program focuses on providing work experience and developmental learning for the participants. The Mentor/ Mentee relationship provides a forum for knowledge sharing and collaboration in a supportive environment. The Assistants primary duties include but are not limited to answering phone calls, assist with file maintenance, assisting public works manager/staff as required.

This program will be 22 weeks in duration working 30hrs/week not exceeding 720hrs per participant. The program ends March 31, 2024.

Human Resources

HR Administrator

The Human Resources Administrator is an entry-level position. The Human Resources Administrator will be the first point of contact between an employee and the company. The Administrator's primary task will be a helping hand to the Human Resources division to complete administrative functions related to **Employee Relations including attendance** management, medical tracking, follow-ups from case management, documentation, and collaboration with internal teams. Typical duties include updating daily Human Resources documents, answering employees' questions, and keeping trackers accurate and updated.

The Human Resources Administrator will develop a calendar and assist employees on their medical leave. The Human Resources Administrator will handle most of the documentation related to Employee Relations functions, training, exiting, and reporting.

Culture & Community Services

Elders Mobility Program Coordinator

The Elders Mobility Program Coordinator is a role model for health and wellness, who is passionate about helping Elders to pursue overall improvements in health through engagement in activity. This position will design, instruct, schedule and coordinate recreation programming for the Elders. Working closely with the Elders Day Program Coordinator, the Mobility Coordinator will implement impactful mobility programs that will engage Elders, in all our partner communities, to participate in activities that benefit their mobility and social interactions.
