

# Director's Message

Éy swáyel Seabird Island Community,

Welcome to the latest edition of Toti:lt q'ep tset, our Education Department newsletter. This period has brought exciting developments across all our programs.

At Lalme' lwesawtexw, we welcomed families back with our best-attended BBQ since the pandemic—over 150 families connected with teachers and staff. Our weekly land-based learning Wednesdays now include carving, beading, dancing, drumming, Halg'emeylem, food preparation, and cultural teachings. Students helped create 200 candy bags with medicine wheel stickers and bracelets for the Agassiz Fall Fair Parade, where Seabird—with support from Finance, IGA, Health, Infrastructure, and ECD—won 1st Place for Individual Costume.

Through the Indigenous Education Council (IEC), we have strengthened support for Indigenous students in School District 78. We hired an Indigenous Support Worker Team Lead and added 30 minutes of paid time per day for Indigenous Support Workers. We also increased perstudent funding to enhance cultural programming district-wide.

Our Youth Program continues providing cultural activities, summer employment, and community outreach. Seabird College welcomed new staff and celebrated graduates from multiple programs.

These changes mean students receive more consistent cultural support, families have stronger connections with schools, and our youth maintain their identity while achieving academic success. These efforts reflect our vision: we support learners at every stage to build a strong future for Seabird Island. Thank you to our staff, students, families, and community partners who make this work possible.

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
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## Outdoor Youth Development Program

## **Community Outreach**

The Youth team also participated in the Agassiz Fall Fair Harm Reduction project. The youth team offered support throughout the weekend with safety and harm prevention to youth and families.

Led by local Indigenous artisan Darren Charlie, youth learned to construct hand drums using traditional materials like rawhide and wood. The workshop included teachings about the cultural significance of drums in Indigenous ceremonies and storytelling.

## **Building Connections**

In partnership with Seabird Island Community School, we have also engaged Black Press to provide a year-long advertising campaign; advertisements in the local newspapers, social media and news articles.



## Welcome Back BBQ

On September 9th we hosted our annual welcome back barbeque for families. This event is always a great opportunity for families to meet staff, see the classrooms, and share a meal, in a casual environment, and build connections with new teachers. This event is always well attended, but this year in particular was incredible, with over 150 people attending!

## **Fall Fair Parade**

On Saturday September 13th, Seabird entered a float in the fall fair parade for the second year in a row. The float was a collaboration between the Education Department, the Elders, and the Band office. This year's theme was the medicine wheel, with the float sporting a giant medicine wheel, and candy bags including information about the medicine wheel, as well as information about the school. We had a number of students and staff join the parade, dancing, drumming, singing, handing out candy, or just waving to the parade-goers. The result of this parade was a first-place ribbon, and lots of positive interactions with the community.



## Land-Based-Learning

Throughout September we had three land-based learning days that the whole school took part in. Each day incorporated elements of culture, land, and create. This has been our framework that we have started with for these days. Each section is 90-minutes long and led by different people.



## **Culture**

Incorporates traditional storytelling, Halq'emeylem language, drumming and singing, Slahal, and medicine making. Thus far students have made salve and smudge spray. Senior students also worked with Mark Point to begin building a sweat lodge. Mark took some students to cut down willow trees for the base, and taught students how to bend and tie them together to form the dome of the sweat lodge. This will be finished through November; the hope is that students will be able to participate in sweats with Mark in late November and early December.



### Create

Includes students working alongside our cook to make lunch for the entire school, learning knife skills, measuring, and simple menu planning. Additionally, create has included art projects, such as making keychains for our fall fair parade, painting rocks for decoration, and making cards for the Elders.



#### Land

Classroom teachers utilize this opportunity to do something fun and engaging with their students on the land like canoeing, exploring the slough, mapping and compass reading, photography, fire making with the support of Seabird's Firesmart crew, designing and making walking sticks, and exploring the local land. Students also participate in the school garden and greenhouse to grow, harvest, and maintain the space. Additionally on land-based days classes take turns going to Earthwise farm to learn more about growing, harvesting, and food security and sovereignty. There is also a group that rotates each week to go on a full-day hike at a local trail. This gives students an opportunity to see more than just what is immediately around Seabird.



## **Eymexw Celebration**

On October 8 we celebrated our Eymexw Celebration with the whole school. During this time, we celebrated 55 students who achieved perfect attendance in September! Four classes also achieved an attendance rate of over 90% for the month. This was an incredible start to the school year!

Students who were recognized for positive attitudes will be presented with a sweater, and students with perfect attendance have a chance to win a bimonthly award. Additionally, the class in the high school and the class in the elementary with the best overall attendance won a pizza party. For September, this was the grade 3 class with 92.9% attendance and the grade 8 class with 91.7% attendance. Great work Seabird Students!



## Sto:lo New Year

In October the school celebrated Sto:lo New Year. This day was led by our cultural team and featured many crafts and activities, including rattle making, carving, drumming and dancing, and Slahal. Students learned to make fried bread and tried a variety of salmon that had been traditionally preserved, including smoked, salted, candied, and canned.

The day ended with a full school jam out. Some students invited their families, and many drummers and dancers came in to celebrate with the students. This began outside, but eventually came into the gym, as the drums were getting cold outside. This was a great way to end the day and have all students celebrate Sto:lo New Year together.

## **Spirit Week**

During the week of the 27th – 31st October, the school participated in their annual spirit week. Days included Halloween colours, PJ Day, wacky hair day, and witch and wizard day. On the 31st, students dressed in costume and were invited to the college and band office to trick-or-treat. This was a great experience for the students, and everyone went home with a bag of candy.



## **Community Coat Drive**

One of our grade 12 students, Kya Patterson, is organizing a Coats for Hope Drive at the Hope Recreation Center, a drop box for donations will be in the Rec Centre lobby starting between November 1 – December 21. The goal is to help the unhoused and local families stay warm during the winter months.

## **High School ADST**

During the start of the school year, students in grade 10 and 11 build small walls in the classroom. These walls were wired with a plug, light, and switch. Students had to wire all the elements to code and then plug everything in to see if it would work. All students managed to get their lights to turn on and their plugs to charge their phones.

Next, they will be moving on to full walls through the building of a shed that will include a door and window as part of the design. This course is meant to give students a picture of what a career in trades might look like and also gets them thinking about participating in the trade sampler with UFV when they are in grade 12.
